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

Section 2.

TEXT.

Administration—Fortunately, there have been no changes in the medical staff of the Authority during the year, and in consequence the work of the School Medical Service has been able to proceed without interruption. As a result, the number of school children examined shows a considerable increase over the previous year:—

It will be noted that it has been found possible during the year to examine two age groups in the Secondary (now Grammar) Schools.

Findings of Medical Inspection—These are shown in Table 2 of the Report.

Minor Defects—Cases of Scabies and Impetigo still account for approximately 60 % of the skin diseases found at special examinations, and both are the cause of much unnecessary "absenteeism." All cases of Scabies are notified to the Medical Officer of Health of the Local Sanitary Authority.

Nutrition—The nutrition of the children in the fifth and part of the sixth year of the War has been well maintained as is shown by the following camparison with 1943 and the pre-war yars:—

Dental—Both the number of children inspected and the number treated shows an increase on the previous year. In spite of repeated efforts, it was not found possible to secure the services of an additional dental surgeon during the year. Early in 1945, however, Mr. W. B. Glynn Jones, L.D.S., was appointed and took up his duties on 22/1/45. During 1944, the Authority agreed to the appointment of three Dental Attendants, who took up their duties in September. Their assistance is greatly appreciated by the School Dental Surgeons.

School Premises—The sanitary and hygienic conditions of all schools are inspected and reported upon by the examining medical officer at the time of the routine medical inspections.

During the War it has only been possible to rectify major defects, but the passing of the Education Act, 1944, and the submission by the Minister of Education of Regulations prescribing standards for school premises should bring about a much needed and long delayed improvement. These Regulations call for a complete survey of all the Schools in the County and will probably involve the Authority in an extensive and costly programme of adaptation and reconstruction.

The Education Act 1944—The provisions of the Education Act, 1944, with regard to handicapped pupils, medical inspection and treatment go far beyond those of the Education Act of 1921, the chief points of difference being outlined in the paragraphs which follow.

Medical Inspections—It is now obligatory upon the parent to present for medical inspection any child who is in attendance at a maintained school. Failure to do so renders the parent liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding £5.

Medical Treatment—Formerly it was the duty of the Authority to provide medical treatment only for children attending public elementary schools, but they had the power to make similar provision for children at secondary and other schools. Now it is the duty of the Authority to provide free medical treatment for all pupils in attendance at any school or county college maintained by them. Formerly, the cost of treatment had to be recovered from the parent, whereas now no charge is to be made to the parent. Likewise it is now the duty of the Authority to encourage and assist pupils to take advantage of the treatment facilities provided, though it is not obligatory upon the parent or pupil to accept such treatment facilities.

Handicapped Pupils—It is now the duty of the Local Education Authority to ascertain what children in their area require special educational treatment, and, having ascertained, to provide that special educational treatment. Formerly the duty to provide such treatment was only in respect of children over 7 years of age; now the duty is in respect of children over 2 years of age.

Draft Regulations have been drawn up and submitted to Parliament governing the conduct of medical inspections, the catagories of handicapped pupils, the special methods of education required for such handicapped pupils, etc., and these provide that the Authority shall submit for the approval of the Minister of Education as soon as possible after April 1st, 1945, their proposed arrangements for discharging their functions in carrying on the School Medical Services.

The provision of free medical treatment for all pupils, and the provision of special educational treatment for handicapped pupils, have such wide implications that a special report is being drawn up and will be submitted in due course for the consideration of the Authority.
