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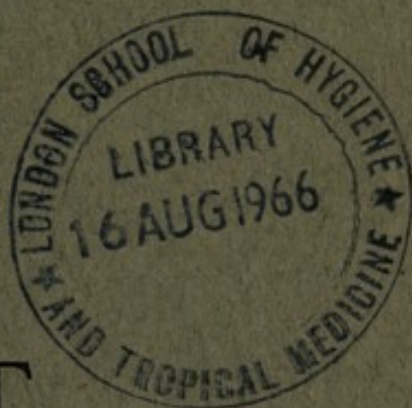

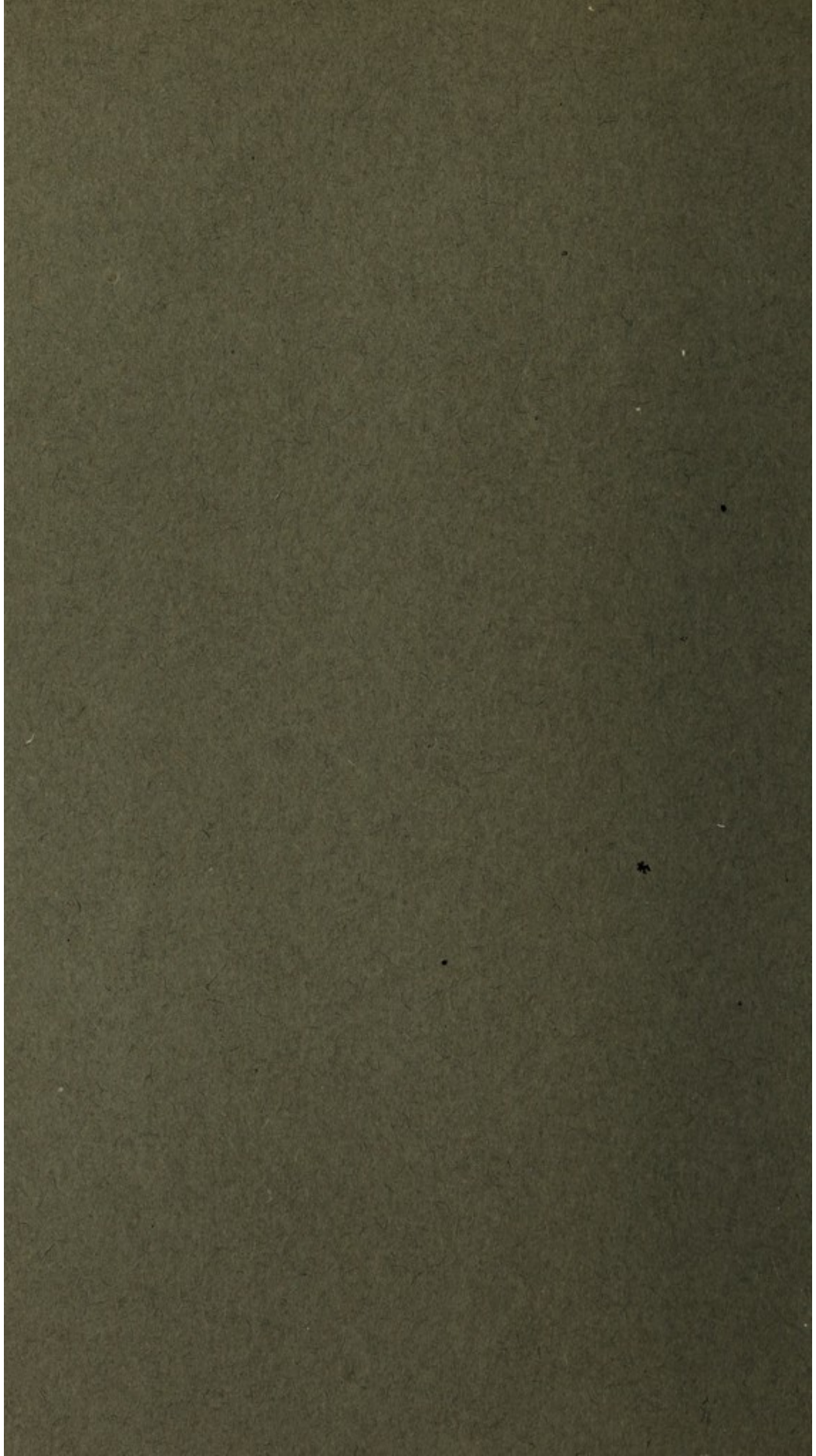

Section 2.

TEXT.

Staff.—Dr. G. Wynne Griffiths returned to duty on the 1st February, 1947, on his demobilisation from H.M. Forces.

On the last day of the year the Nursing Staff sustained the loss of three valued Officers by the retirement, on superannuation, of Nurses Elizabeth Jones (Hawarden), L. Reynolds (Holywell) and M. Lloyd Taylor (Mold). The vacancies thus caused were subsequently filled by the appointment of Nurses Owen, Pearse and Whitaker.

Apart from the foregoing, no change occurred in the Staff personnel during the year under report.

Administration.—Routine examinations of children attending the Authority's Schools were carried out as required by the Ministry of Education, the selected age-groups being :—

- (a) The aged 6—Children admitted for the first time to a maintained School. ;
- (b) The aged 8—Children of an early " intermediate " age.
- (c) The aged 11—Children about to leave a maintained Primary School.
- (d) The aged 14—Children about to leave a maintained Secondary School.

It is pleasing to be able to report the continued interest of the parents. During the year under report no fewer than 2,602 (56.9 per cent.) attended the routine medical examination of their children.

The diseases and defects found at the inspections are shown in Table 2.

Nutrition.—Reference to the following Table shows that the nutrition of the children in the County was well maintained throughout the year—in fact, a certain amount of improvement is indicated :—

The findings are given in detail in Tables 3(a) and 3(b).

Good progress has been made by the Authority in providing School Meals in more of their Schools, and this is undoubtedly one of the factors which have produced this result.

I must, however, again call the Authority's attention to the fact that many children are suffering from the lack of sleep, which is so necessary for their growth and development.

Vaccination.—During the routine medical inspection of the children a record is kept, in the case of each child, as to whether there is evidence of satisfactory vaccination, and it is to be regretted that the percentage of children examined who show evidence of successful vaccination has fallen considerably. In 1929 the percentage was 60.4 ; by 1946 it had fallen to 41.

The general public has been allowed to forget that vaccination has been the means of stamping out smallpox in the country. Exemption has been too easily obtained.

When the National Health Service Act, 1946, becomes operative, vaccination will no longer be compulsory, and it is more than possible that the Minister of Health has repealed the Vaccination Orders owing to the success which has been achieved by voluntary immunisation against Diphtheria.

It is hoped that voluntary vaccination will achieve similar results.

Immunisation against Diphtheria.—The immunisation of children of school age against Diphtheria is at present the duty of the County District Councils, and the work has been carried out very successfully. According to the latest available figures 79.6 per cent. of the school children in the County have been successfully immunised.

When the National Health Service Act becomes operative immunisation against Diphtheria will be the duty of the Local Health Authority (the County Council) and proposals for carrying out this work are shortly to be submitted to the Ministry of Health for approval.

Provision is made in these proposals for giving reinforcing doses to children immunised in infancy when they reach the age of 5, and again at 10 years.

Ear, Nose and Throat Defects.—Previous to the operation of the Education Act of 1944, the Authority only accepted financial responsibility for the operative treatment of cases of Chronic Tonsillitis and Adenoids, but this scheme has now been extended, with the approval of the Minister of Education, to include all Ear, Nose and Throat Defects.

Mr. McCay, the Ear, Nose and Throat Surgeon of the Chester Royal Infirmary, was appointed as Consultant Surgeon for this purpose.

Defective Vision.—Owing to the large number of cases attending the Ophthalmic Clinic at the Chester Royal Infirmary, arrangements were made for the attendance of an Ophthalmic Surgeon at four Clinics in the County. These are held at Shotton, Mold, Holywell and Rhyl, and the children attend by appointment.

By this means congestion is avoided and parents and children do not have to travel the distance they had to formerly.

An Ophthalmic Surgeon attends the Clinics and is remunerated on a sessional basis.

Child Guidance.—During the year arrangements were made with the Medical Superintendent of the North Wales Counties Mental Hospital, Denbigh, for the establishment of a Child Guidance Clinic at Rhyl.

At this Clinic a Psychiatrist, an Educational Psychologist, and a Psychiatric Social Worker attend weekly.

This Clinic serves the western part of Flintshire and the eastern portion of Denbighshire, and commenced operations on the 1st January, 1947.

A similar Clinic had been established in Wrexham during the year (1946) and arrangements were made for reference to this Clinic of cases from the eastern part of Flintshire.

Attendances of children are, of course, by appointment.

Hospital Treatment.—During the year under report the Authority approved a scheme under which it accepted responsibility for the hospital treatment—in-patient and out-patient—of children attending maintained Schools, the scheme to be retrospective to the 1st April, 1946.

Payment for this service is made in accordance with Ministry of Education Circular 102, and financial responsibility is accepted for the treatment of such cases as the School Medical Officer approves at those hospitals where visiting surgeons and physicians of consultant status regularly attend.

Financial responsibility is also accepted for cases of accident during, and out of, school hours, and also for emergency operations.

The approval of the Minister to these arrangements has been received.

Dental Treatment.—The valuable work carried out by our Staff of School Dental Surgeons can be ascertained by reference to Table 10.

Clinics.—Prior to 1939 the Authority had adopted a plan for the building of School Clinics in various parts of the County, but this scheme was interrupted by the war.

Although the difficulties of building are fully appreciated it is hoped that the Authority will press forward with this scheme as soon as possible.

The raising of the school leaving age has resulted in more and more schools being overcrowded, and it is almost impossible to find accommodation for the Medical Officer when carrying out routine medical inspections, and more especially for the School Dental Surgeons for dental treatment.
