HAY RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL.Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health.1942.

Mr. Chairman, Mrs Watkins and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my report for the year 1942. This report is prepared on the lines indicated in Circular 2605 (Wales) and is again therefore very restricted. The opportunity is taken, however, of dealing briefly with subjects in which the public have shown special interest during the year.

Infectious Disease.

The following cases of infectious disease were notified to me during the year.

Scarlet Fever.....4 cases.

As will therefore be seen the district was free from any severe outbreak of infectious disease during the year. Cases of infectious disease could still be admitted, as in previous years, into the Hay Urban Isolation Hospital.

Diphtheria Immunisation.

During the year under review monthly clinics were commenced for the purpose of immunising children against diphtheria. The response has been satisfactory and as a result a recent survey showed that 78 % of the school children had been immunised. The response in the under five group has also been good and it is to be hoped that the response will continue to remain satisfactory so that the present high immunising rate may be maintained.

Scabies.

A fairly large number of cases of scabies came to my notice during the year. The cases occurring in evacuee children were admitted to the Sick Bay at Sonnybridge while the non-evacuee cases were dealt with by the County Health Visitor.

Tuberculosis.

The following details show the position as regards tuberculosis in the district.

Venereal Disease. The Breconshire County Council have an agreement with the General and Eye Hospital, Swansea, for the treatment of these cases.
