Mr. Chairman, Lady and Gentlemen,

I beg to submit my report on the sanitary conditions and the state of the public health in the Hay Urban District during the year 1961.

In this report I have endeavoured to deal briefly with all matters within my responsibility regarding public health and preventive medicine and I have included comments on all the subjects specifically requested in Circular 1/62(Wales) by the Welsh Board of Health.

Section 1. General and Vital Statistics.

The deaths are classified under the headings given in the new Abridged List of Causes of Deaths.

Mortuary and Post Mortem Facilities. During the year, with the kind co-operation of the County Welfare Committee, a room at Cockcroft House continued to be used. Post mortem examinations can also be carried out in the same building. Hay R.D.C. and Painscastle R.D.C. also use this building for the same purposes. During the year five post mortem examinations were made in these premises.

Section 2. General Provisions of Health Services.

Public Health Officers. The same arrangements existed during the year as in previous years. Mr. G. G. Evans acted as your Public Health Inspector, and was employed in a similar capacity by the Rural District of Hay and the Rural District of Painscastle.

Laboratory Facilities. During the year laboratory facilities were available at Hereford, Cardiff, Newport, Carmarthen, Swansea and Brecon. All water samples were sent to the Public Health Laboratory at Hereford, whilst any investigation required in the control of infectious disease was performed at the Public Health Laboratories at Cardiff and Hereford.

All the milk testing was done by the Public Health Laboratory at Hereford.

Nursing and other Facilities. The County Council is responsible for the provision of the ambulance and home nursing services. The County also administer the maternity and child welfare clinics, where treatment is available for minor ailments, dental, eye and orthopaedic defects. Immunisation against diphtheria is also carried out at these clinics.

Hospitals. The hospital needs of the residents of the district for all diseases apart from infectious disease are provided by Hereford Hospital and Brecon War Memorial Hospital. Merthyr Isolation Hospital received cases of infectious disease.

Disinfection. In the main the methods used for any required disinfection have been fumigation and spraying.

Section 3. Sanitary Circumstances.

water Supply. The water for the town is taken from springs and streams and thence to . storage reservoirs, the water being filtered and chlorinated. The water is supplied solely by gravitation. The two sand gravity filters at the Hay Common Works are used alternatively to allow periodical cleaning and relaying. 1961 being a drier year than usual, it was necessary to operate early restrictions on the consumption of water, and from the 15th. June the supply to the town was turned off at nightime from 10.0pm. to 7.0am. The amount in storage continued to fall during the summer and it was found necessary further to restrict the supply; the water being turned off from 10.0 am. to 4.30 pm. and 7.30 pm. to 7.0 am. from the 24th. August to 12th. October; thus over this period only 6 hours of water were given to the town. Rain falling during the first fortnight in October increased the quantity in storage, and a full supply was then available. Generally the Hay Common Works supplied the southern half of the town, and the Llangwathan works supplied the northern half.

Hay Area Water Supply Scheme. Negotiations have proceeded during the year between the District Valuers and the various landowners for the acquisition of land for the construction of reservoirs and pumping stations, and consultations have also taken place with the landowners adjoining Llanbuchllyn Lake regarding the supply of water to fields near the lake. The Council's Consulting Civil Engineers are now preparing further details for the scheme.

Drainage and Sewerage. The Herefordshire County Council have given approval to the proposed site of the sewage disposal works for the town of Hay, and approval for the site is now awaited from the Ministry of Housing and Local Government in Whitehall. A Ministry Enquiry to be held at a later date will cover engineering, planning and compulsory purchase. Further revised plans and data have been prepared and consultations have also taken place with representatives of Dore & Bredwardine R.D.C. in whose area the Works are to be situated,

Public Cleansing. There was no change in the methods adopted for the twice weekly collection and disposal of house refuse. The work is done by the Council's employees under the supervision of your Public Health Inspector. The refuse is then disposed of by controllectipping. Waste paper is collected and some 14 tons was sent to the mills in 1961.

Sanitary Inspection of the Area. The sanitary inspection of the area was undertaken by the Public Health Inspectors. The following details give information relating to the work of the Public Health Inspector during the year.

Section 6. Prevalence and Control of Infectious Disease.

The following cases of notifiable infectious disease were reported to me during the year:-

The district experienced a severe epidemic of measles in the months of April, May and June. The cases of food poisoning were mild and the causal agent was never discovered. No cases were removed to hospital and no deaths occurred as a result of infectious disease.

Venereal Disease.

The County Council has an agreement with the General and Eye Hospital, Swansea, for the treatment of these cases. The tracing of contacts and the following up of defaulters is the responsibility of the County Council.

Diphtheria. As a result of the new Health Act, the County Council were responsible for the immunisation of children against diphtheria and details for the district will be found in the annual report of the County Medical Officer of Health. Facilities for immunisation are now available at the ordinary Maternity and Child Welfare Clinics and also at the schools during the school medical inspections.

It is pleasing to see that the incidence of diphtheria continues to fall. The object of the immunisation campaign, however, remains the same: to secure the immunisation of not less than 75% of babies before their first birthday. It must be remembered that diphtheria still kills and that elimination of the disease is conditional upon the maintenance of an adequate level of immunisation. If parents leave their children unprotected there may be a return of diphtheria outbreaks.
