	I beg to submit my report on the sanitary conditions and the state of the public health in the Hay Urban District during the year 1964.
	In this report I have endeavoured to deal briefly with all matters within my responsibility regarding public health and preventive medicine and I have included comments on all the subjects specifically requested in Circular 1/65(Wales) by the Welsh Board of Health.

Mortuary and Post Mortem Facilities. During the year, with the kind co-operation of the County Welfare Committee, a room at Cockcroft house continued to be used. Post mortem examinations can also be carried out in the same building. Hay R.D.C. also use this building for the same purposes. Towards the end of the year, alternative post mortem facilities were discussed.

# Section 2. General Provisions of Health Services.

Public Health Officers. There were no changes in your public health officers during the year, Mr. W.D. Morgans remaining as your Public Health Inspector.

Laboratory Facilities. During theyear laboratory facilities were available at Hereford, Cardiff, Newport, Carmarthen, Swansea and Brecon. All water samples were sent to the Public Health Laboratory at Hereford, whilst any investigation required in the control of infectious disease was performed at the Public Health Laboratories at Cardiff and Hereford.

All the milk testing was done by the Public Health Laboratory at Carmarthen.

Nursing and Other Facilities. The County Council is responsible for the provision of the ambulance and home nursing services. The County also administer the maternity and child welfare clinics, where treatment is available for minor allments, dental, eye and orthopaedic defects. Immunisation against diphtheria is also carried out at these clinics.

Hospitals. The hospital needs of the residents of the district for all diseases apart from infectious disease are provided by Hereford Hospital and Brecon War Memorial Hospital. Merthyr Isolation Hospital receive cases of infectious disease.

#### Section 3. Sanitary Circumstances.

Water Supplies. The domestic water supply for the town is collected from springs and streams and piped to storage reservoirs, the water is then filtered and chlorinated by drip-feed method and the whole system is by gravitation.

The two sand filters at the Hay Common works were cleaned

out twice during the year and clean washed sand added.

1964 was a very dry year, the rainfall being well below average and this necessitated turning off the Hay Common supply at nightime from 21st. July until 1st. November. The quantity in storage dropped to a very low level in October and pumping was carried out with equipment loaned by Cardiff Corporation and this prevented daytime restrictions being imposed.

Hay and Painscastle Area Water Scheme . Tenders were received for Contract 1 for this scheme which

included Exploratory Works at the various sites of the proposed pumping stations and reservoirs and along the routes of the water method work was carried out and report submitted to the Council by the Consulting Engineers. Plans and schedules of boreholes were forwarded to the Brecon and Radnor County Councils, Post Office Telephones
Department and Electricity Board and approval for this work was received from these authorities. The plan showing farm supplies at Llanbwchllyn Lake was also submitted and the positions of drinking troughs etc. had been agreed with farmers concerned.

The Ministry of Housing and

The Ministry of Housing and Local Government gave approval to the obtaining of tenders for the whole of the scheme and the Consulting Engineers invited tenders for the Treatment Plant at Llyswen and Llandilo-Graban. Tenders were also invited and obtained for laying of the mains and constructions of reservoirs and pumping stations.

The Radnorshire County Council have granted planning permission for the reservoirs, pumping stations and treatment plant in the Painscastle Rural District.

# Drainage and Sewerage. Hay Sewage Disposal Scheme.

A Public Inquiry was held during the year into the Council's proposal to construct a Sewage Disposal Works on land in the parish of Cusop near the River Wye. This dealt with planning objections, Compulsory Purchase and Engineering details. The Minister of Housing and Local Government gave approval to the scheme and further engineering details are being prepared by the Council's Consulting Engineers.

Public Cleansing. Twice weekly collection of house and trade refuse is carried out in the town. This service is undertaken by the Council's workmen and lorry jointly with Hay R.D.C. and Painscastle R.D.C. under the supervision of the Public Health Inspector The refuse being disposed of by controlled tipping on the Hay and Clyro refuse tips.

Rodent Control. One full-time operator is engaged by the Council jointly with Hay R.D.C. and Painscastle R.D.C. and works under the supervision of the Public Health Inspector.

A total of 15 sewer manholes were treated during the year and 8 showed evidence of rat infestation. Eight road gullies were also treated and 6 showed infestation.
Legal Proceedings. No legal proceedings were undertaken by the Council during the year.
Section 4. Housing. There were 33 applicants on the Council's "Waiting List" for houses at 31st.December, 1964; and these
6 in one bedroom flats or bungalows 18 in two bedroom houses 6 in three bedroom houses
3 in four bedroom houses.
None of these applicants were living in rooms, but 16 were living in houses which are considered to be unfit.
