Mortuary and Post Mortem Facilities. During the year, with the kind co-operation of the County Welfare Committee, a room at Cockcroft house continued to be used. Hay R.D.C. also use this building for the same purposes. During the year, alternative post mortem facilities were discussed, and arrangements were made for future post mortem examinations to be performed at Hereford Hospital.

Section 2. General Provisions of Health Services.

Public Health Officers. There were no changes in your public health officers during the year, Mr. W.D.Morgans remaining as your Public Health Inspector. Owing to the absence for the greater part of the year of Mr. W.D.Morgan, caused by illness assistance was given by Mr. Davies and the P.H.I's of Brecknock R.D.C.

Laboratory Facilities. During the year laboratory facilities were available at Hereford, Cardiff, Newport, Carmarthen, Swansea and Brecon. All water samples were sent to the Public Health Laboratory at Hereford, whilst any investigation required in the control of infectious disease was performed at the Public Health Laboratories at Cardiff and Hereford.

All the milk testing was done by the Public Health Laboratory at Carmarthen.

Nursing and Other Facilities. The County Council is responsible for the provision of the ambulance and home nursing services. The County also administer the maternity and child welfare clinics, where treatment is available for minor ailments, dental, eye and orthopaedic defects. Immunisation against diptheria is also carried out at these clinics.

Hospitals. The hospital needs of the residents of the district for all disease apart from infectious disease are provided by Hereford Hospital and Brecon War Memorial Hospital. Merthyr Isolation Hospital receive cases of infectious disease.

Section 3. Sanitary Circumstances.Water Supplies

The domestic water supply for the two is collected from streams and springs and piped to storage reservoirs. The water is then filtered and chlorinated by drip-feed method and then supplied to the consumers by gravitation.

The two sand filters at the Hay Common Works were cleaned out twice during the year with clean washed sand added.

Owing to the rainfall being above average during the summer no daytime restrictions on consumption were necessary, but the water was turned off at nighttime (10 p.m. to 7 a.m.) from 15th June to 15th September to prevent undue wastage.

Northwest and East North Counties. During the year, with the kind co-operation of the County Health Committee, a report of the County Health Officer, also was this building for the year. Hay R.D.C. also was this building for the year. Section 2. General Provisions of Health Services.

Public Health Officers. There were no changes in your public health officers during the year. Mr. W.D. Morgan remains as your Public Health Officer. Owing to the absence for the greater part of the year of Mr. W.D. Morgan, caused by illness, assistance was given by Mr. Davis and the R.H.I.'s of Brookwood R.D.C.

Laboratory Facilities. During the year laboratory facilities were available at Hay County Hospital, Hay County, Georgia, Swain and Brown. All water samples were sent to the Public Health Laboratory at Hay County, which any investigation required in the control of infectious disease was performed at the Public Health Laboratory at Hay County and Hay County. All the milk testing was done by the Public Health Laboratory at Hay County.

Funeral and Other Facilities. The County Council is responsible for the provision of the ambulance and home nursing services. The County also administers the cemetery and child welfare clinics, where treatment is available for minor ailments, dental, eye and orthopedic defects. Immunization against diphtheria is also carried out at these clinics.

Hospital. The hospital needs of the residents of the district for all disease apart from infectious disease are provided by Hay County Hospital and Brookwood Hospital. Hay County Hospital receives cases of infectious disease.

Water Supply

The domestic water supply for the two is collected from streams and springs and piped to storage reservoirs. The water is then filtered and chlorinated by baby-foot method and then applied to the consumers by gravitation. The two main filters at the Hay County works were cleaned out twice during the year and cleaned water tank added. Owing to the rainfall being above average during the summer no filtration restrictions on consumers were necessary, but the water was turned off at night (10 p.m. to 7 a.m.) from 15th June to 15th September to prevent undue wastage.

Hay Area Water Scheme

The contractors appointed for carrying out this scheme were Messrs. Grocock & Day of Leicester who started work during the year. The construction of a number of service reservoirs were undertaken and sections of mains laid in the Hay Rural and Painscastle Rural Districts and satisfactory progress has been maintained. Tenders have been invited for the Treatment Works at Llanbwchllyn Lake and River Wye Intakes and exploratory soundings taken of the bed of the Lake.

Radnorshire and North Breconshire Water Board.

The Board was formed in August 1965 and will take over all existing and proposed schemes on 1st April 1966 when the Urban District Council will cease to be responsible for water supplies in their district.

Drainage and Sewerage - Hay Sewerage Scheme.

Further engineering details were prepared during the year by Messrs John H. Haiste & Partners, the Council's Consulting Engineers, and submitted to the Welsh Office of the Ministry of Housing & Local Government and to the Wye River Authority. The Welsh Office stated that authority would be given to invite tenders for the scheme as soon as agreement had been reached on the Trade Waste disposal from the two small factories and slaughterhouse.

Public Cleansing.

Twice weekly collection of house and trade refuse is undertaken in the town by the Council's lorry and workmen jointly with Hay and Painscastle R.D.C. under the supervision of the Public Health Inspector. The refuse being disposed of by controlled tipping on the Clyro refuse tip in Radnorshire about one mile from the town; the tip at Hay having been filled and closed.
