Population middle of July 1925. Firth and Death rates are calculated on the estimated population in the middle of July of the same year. Registrar-General estimate for middle of July 1925 was 12470.

Deaths and death-rate. There were 155 deaths registered of persons belonging to the District during the year, 71 males and 84 females, this being equal to a rate of 12.4 per 1000.


The rate is lower than that for the year 1924 which was 13.3 and practically the same as that for England and Wales for 1925 which was 12.2.

Births and Birth-rate. There were 203 births registered in the District during the year, 95 males and 108 females, five of the births were illegitimate (3 boys and 2 girls). The rate for the year is 18.2, for England and Wales for the same period 18.3 and for the District for the previous year there rate was 19.2.

The rate for England and Wales is a very low one and as will be seen the rate for this District is still lower.

Deaths of Infants under one year of age. There were 15 deaths of Infants under one year of age registered in the District during the year, 7 boys and 8 girls this being equal to a rate of 73 per 1000 births. For England and Wales for the same period it was 75 per 1000 births and for the District for the previous year it was 105 per 1000 births.

The rate is therefore slightly lower than that for England and Wales for the same period and considerably lower than that for the District for the year 1924.



In the Report for 1934 the following appears " in spite of all that is being done the rate for the District is disappointing and unsatisfactory", but it must be admitted that the rate for 1935 is comparatively satisfactory and it is to be hoped that the improvement will be maintained and even improved. There is no question but that the Infant Clinios are responsible to a great extent for the lessened death-rate.

It is unfortunate that Diphtheria should occur every year in the District. 31 cases were notified, fortunately there has never been a widespread epidemic of this disease in the District. It is spread by the mild ambulatory cases which parents often mistake for numps and the children often attend school right through the course of the disease.

Nost of the cases of Tubercular disease were seen by the Tuberculosis Medical Officer and were treated at the Special Hospitals and Sanatoria.

The usual proceedures in dealing with cases notified have been carried out, premises visited and inspected and any sanitary defects discovered are remedied. Inquiries are made as to sourse of infection, milk supply, schools and chapels attended, and at the termination of the cases the premises are disinfected.

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It is satisfactory to find that some use has been made of the Druid Isolation Hospital as some cases from the District have been admitted. The Hospital was provided by the County Council and is situate about 12 miles from Holyhead, a Hospital built within the Urban area would meet the needs of this District far better than the one distant 12 miles.

Inspection of houses in the District.

Swifts Square and Church Lane which were mentioned in the report of 1934 and which required to be put into a proper state of repair are provided with W. O's have been much improved, a main drain having been provided.

Llanfain and Llaingoch Some of these houses have been visited and inspected, but they can never be much improved until proper drainage is provided.

Houses were also inspected in Edmund Street, Gollege Lane, Eurp Street and Waterside.

Forty-three new houses were completed mking during the year. They could hardly be called Working -hens houses as the cost was such that the rents above the means of any ordinary working man.

A number of old houses will have to be condemned but this cannot be done before at least a hundred working men's dwellings are provided.

Inspection of Cowhouses, Slaughterhouses, Bakehouses, Parket, and Workshops.

As will be seen in the Report of the Inspector of Muisances these places have been visited and inspected and 74 notices and letters sent also many personal interviews. The notices mostly concerned nuisances, provision of proper water supply, converting privies to W.C's and general repairs to premises.

During the year the L.M.S.Railway slaughterhouse was frequently visited and a number of carceses of beef and mutton condemned, the carcases were afterwards burnt at the Destructor.

A Special complaint was made regarding a slaughterhouse in Cambria Street as to insufficient accommodation for animals awaiting slaughter, the place was visited by your Inspector and myself and other out-buildings were found suitable for the animals.

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Provision of Public Elaughterhouse: In July a Special heeting was held to consider a letter received from Doctor Wade regarding the provision of a public slaughterhouse, after discussion it was decided not at present to proceed with the ratter.

Analysis of foodstuffs. As you will see in the Inspectors report 27 samples of food stuffs were taken for analysis but in no instance was anything found calling for presecution.

The Water Supply. Complaints were received from residents of the Kingsland District regarding the inadequate supply of water. With your Inspector the District was visited and it was found that the supply in most of the taps was unsatisfactory. It was suggested as a remedy that the Waterworks Company should join the Kingsland main to the Trearddur Bay main, this in the meantime I am informed has been done and no complaints have since been received.

The question of the quality of the water was also considered and a copy of a report of the analysis of a sample sent by the Waterworks Company was considered by your Committee.

hessrs J.G. Thresh and J.F. Beale very Eminent Authorities on water and water-supplies in their report stated as follows:-

"This is a faintly peaty water of very good quality, pure and wholesome and well adapted for all purposes of a public supply"

The Committee accepted the report as satisfactory and no recommendation was made to send any further samples for analyses. Public Health Officers of Holyhead Urban District. Re Appointment of Assistant Inspector of Mulsances with special knowledge of meat Inspector. In July a Special heeting was held to consider the appointment of Assistant Inspector as recommended in a letter from Doctor Wade. This arose out of the question of the desirability of regular inspection of neat and foodstuffs which landed from Ireland in transit. The present Inspector with his duties as Surveyor expressed his inability to carry out these duties as the Steamers arrive both by day and night.

After discussion it was decided not to make the appointment.

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port Sanitary Work. There is no regular inspection of ships carried out. The only ships that come alongside a quay are the L.M.& S.Railway Steamers and for a few weeks in May and June some steamers which land Hersey potatoes. For your personal observations the sanitation of these vessels is attended to as they are kept clean and sanitary. The other steamers and sailing ships come to the Harbour for shelter in stress of weather and to have them regularly inspected it will be necessary to have a special officer to do so.

All the existing connections to the old sewers were reconnected to the new sewers whilst the work was being carried out. Twenty one (21) privies were converted into W.C's and Two hundred and eighty nine (289) choked drains and sewers attended to.

House Scavenging. There were Four hundred and forty nine (449) ashpits emptied and Four thousand and eighty two (4092) loads of refuse delivered at the Destructor and Three hundred and eighty nine (389) loads of refuse delivered at the tips.

Analysis. The following samples were taken for Analysis: - Fish Paste 2, Fresh Milk 16, Lemon Cheese 1, Coffee Essence 1, Fresh Butter 2, Tinned Fruit 2, Lemon Squash 2, Sausages 1.

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Disinfecting. Thirty six (36) houses were disinfected after cases of Infectious diseases.

Gowhouses, Slaughterhouses, Bakehouses, harkets and Workshops.

Inspections were made of the above, Seventy four (74) Notices and

Letters were sent to abate nuisances, provide water supply, convert

privies into W.O's and carry out repairs, in addition to personal

interviews regarding complaints.

Forty three (43) New houses were completed during the year within the Urban Area, the drains of which were connected to the sewers direct, Drain of one Bungalow discharging into a desepool was relaid and connected to sewer.

Inspections of houses were made in Swift Square, Church Zammass Lane, College Lane, Waterside, Llaingooh and Harp Street.

On the whole satisfactory. Sixteen samples were analysed during the year and found satisfactory.

3. Statement on Conditions in the Schools.

Since the establishment of School Olinics there has been much improvement in the health and cleanliness of the elementary School children. The Schools are also better cared for under the supervision of the County Ledical Officer of Health the is also the Ledical Officer for the Schools.

4. Amount empended in Poor-Law relief during 1925.

The sum of £2740 = 8 = 11 was spent in poor-law relief during 1925 in the Holyhead Urban Area.

5. Vaccination.

There has been no cases of primary or secondary vaccination performed by the hedical Officer of Health during 1925.

6. Nursing Arrangements in the District.

No arrangements are made by the Urban District Council, but there are two district nurses and two certified midrives provided by the District Nursing Committee and by the Committee of the L.I.S.

Railway Nursing Committee.

7. Hospital Accommodation.

None supplied by the Urban District Council, but there is an Isolation Hospital at Gwalchmai (10 miles distant from Holyhead) provided by the anglesey County Council. There is a small Hospital at Holyhead "The Stanley Sailors Hospital" about 8 beds mostly used for sick and injured sailors from vessels in the harbour.
