I beg to present my Annual Report for the year ending December 31st, 1938.

SOCIAL CONDITIONS INCLUDING CHIEF INDUSTRIES.

This is chiefly an agroultural area besides which there are Quarrying, Lead Mining, Iron, Coal and other activities in connection with the rich mineral deposits. Silk Works and Iron Works in the adjoining area give occupation to large numbers of the inhabitants of this area. Unemployment has steadily diminished except for the depression in a Lead Mine, which employed several hundreds.

This is administered by the Flintshire County Council.

SECTION C.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

WATER.

A very large part of this area is now supplied by the Birkenhead Water Company, which is yearly extended, the Council have therefore concentrated more attention to the many wells and small sources of water.

Water Supplies.

The following companies supply water within the District:-

BIRKENHEAD CORPORATION (To the Council in bulk).

In consequence of building developments a number of extensions were carried out during the year.

A scheme of water supply for the village of Nannerch consisting of 1629 lineal yards of 3 in. diameter pipes and 1024 lineal yards of 12 in. diameter pipes has been carried out during the year.

Schemes have also been approved for the relaying of the mains at Mostyn and at Penyffordd, Ffynnongroew.

All the principal supplies have been satisfactory as regards quality and quantity.

As will be observed in other paragraphs a number of samples were taken for bacteriological analysis.

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

All sewers and outfall works have been well maintained. Extensions have been carried out to the sewers and outfall works at Newmarket Village.

Part of Upper Gronant has also been sewered.

Schemes are also prepared and adopted by the Council for the sewering of Leeswood and Gwernaffield.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Scavenging of the whole area is done by the Council, the District being divided up into 15 areas for the purpose. The work is carried out by means of contracts.

With the exception of Districts Nos. 10 and 11 the work has been carried out satisfactorily. A large number of complaints were received from the areas 10 and 11 on account of the irregular manner in which the Contractor dealt with both bins and pails. Considerable inconvenience was experienced by many ratepayers of these areas.

CLOSET ACCOMMODATION.

In non sewered areas the pail system is adopted. In sewered areas several closets have been converted to the water carriage system.

All new property erected is provided with closets of the water carriage type.

RIVERS AND STREAMS.

No complaints have been made with respect to the pollution of Rivers and Streams. The River Dee Catchment Board have made great progress in cleaning the River Dee by Cooperation in the Council's area. Small water courses have been cleansed and water logged areas improved. The difficulty however exists, of guarding against deposits and refuse dumping, as this cannot be supervised in such a scattered area. Camps cause consistent anxiety in this respect, and the new Regulations are welcome.

SHOPS INSPECTION.

The provisions of the Shops Act, 1934, relating to this District are enforced. Notices have been served upon occupiers to provide suitable and sufficient sanitary accommodation, which were complied with. Where washing facilities were found to be inadequate, notices were served and complied with.

CAMPING SITES.

The known number of sites in the area used for camping is from 35 to 40. The majority of these are for a period of less than 42 consecutive days and less than 60 days in the year. The sites are, on the whole, well maintained. In one case only was there cause to complain of the dampness of the site and the insanitary conditions prevalent in the camp. This site was not licensed. The nuisance was abated by the owner on receipt of a letter from the Sanitary Inspector, and no further camping took place during the year.

The number of camping sites in respect of which licences were issued was 17. These were well maintained.

There are several sites in the area on which camping takes place, and which are under the control of various organizations. These are, as one expects, kept in a very satisfactory condition.

The maximum number of campers resident in the area at the peak period is from 3,000 to 4,000 persons, and in one area it is estimated that the number of persons on the site during the August Bank Holidays is from 1,500 to 2,000 persons.

SMOKE ABATEMENT. No complaints relating to smoke nuisances were received during the year. There are many factories in this area and the absence of complaints in this direction points to a fairly high standard of efficiency on the part of the persons operating the furnaces and boilers. SWIMMING POOLS AND BATHS . There is only one Swimming Pool within the District. This is privately owned and open only during the Summer months. ERADICATION OF BED BUGS . No complaints of this nature were received during the year. SCHOOLS . All schools are periodically visited and inspected, water supply and sanitary arrangements being supervised. Generally conditions were found to be satisfactory, where otherwise the matters calling for attention were reported to the proper quarters and remedied. SECTION D. SECTION E. INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD. MILK SUPPLY. The majority of cowsheds and dairies in the districts were inspected during the year, Milk production has shewn considerable improvement recently, the majority of producers making efforts to give the consumers clean milk. Where any signs of laxity on the part of the dairyman or cowkeeper are seen, every effort is made to keep the offenders under observation. Structural improvements have been made to a number of cowsheds during the year, chiefly relating to lighting, ventilation and drainage systems. There are 99 producers of accredited milk and 4 producers of Tuberculin Tested Milk in the District. Twenty samples of milk were sent for bacteriological examination during the year. Four samples showed a rather high coliform contont. MEAT AND OTHER FOODS. Slaughterhouses and butcher's shops are visited regularly. An effort is made to inspect all animals slaughtered in the district. The most generally is of a high standard, and in sound condition. All places where food is produced, stored or exposed for sale have been visited during the year and are in the main quite satisfactory. CHEMICAL AND BACTERIOLOGICAL EXAMINATION OF FOOD.

The examination of milk is carried out at Bangor University. There has been no occasion for other food examination.

NUTRITION.

So far, nothing has been undertaken by this Council.

SHELL FISH.

The Shell Fish layings in the area are few; there has been no pollution of the beds. The Markets to which they are sent are Manchester, Liverpool and Birmingham.

The layings (from which cockles and mussels are derived) are situated at Mostyn.

SECTION F.

PREVALENCE AND CONTROL OF INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

The Council provides Antidiphtheria Scrum which is therefore used in every case. During the year 23 cases of Diphtheria and 27 Scarlet Fever were notified. These cases are spread over 12 months and there was no epidemic, 10 cases were admitted to hospital.

In the Winter Months 28 cases of Pneumonia were notified with 13 fatal cases. This compares favourably with any other area, where facilities for isolation might be considered more extensive, and I consider that the Council have every reason to be satisfied with the results of the year.
