GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

PUBLIC HEALTH OFFICERS OF THE AUTHORITY.

- (a) LABORATORY FACILITIES.

This is carried out by the Emergency Public Health Laboratory Service, Conway.

- (b) AMBULANCE FACILITIES.

There is no Ambulance. Hospital Ambulances are sent for serious cases to Liverpool and Chester.

- (c) NURSING IN THE HOME.

Voluntary organisations provide existing facilities.

- (d) TREATMENT CENTRES AND CLINICS.

Administered by the Flintshire County Council.

- (e) HOSPITAL.

There is no hospital in the area.

SECTION C.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

WATER SUPPLIES.

The following Companies supply water within the area:-

Brymbo Water Co.,
Hawarden and District Water Co.
Mold Gas and Water Co.
Birkenhead Corporation. (in bulk).

The Council have also supplies of their own and all supplies have been well maintained.

SEWERAGE AND SEWERAGE DISPOSAL WORKS.

All sewers and Disposal works have been well maintained.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Scavenging of the whole district is undertaken by the Council. The work is carried out by means of Contracts and for this purpose the area is divided into 15 separate districts. Generally the work was carried out satisfactorily. Difficulties were experienced in some districts due chiefly to the lack of adequate and suitable labour.

RIVER AND STREAMS.

No complaints were received.

SHOPS INSPECTION.

All shops were inspected and the statutory provisions relating thereto enforced.

CAMPING SITES.

Sites used for camping were on the whole, well maintained. Licences issued numbered 17. These sites are regularly inspected and no cause of complaint was noted.

SMOKE ABATEMENT.

No complaints relating to smoke nuisances were received. There are a number of Factories in this district and the absence of complaints can be viewed with satisfaction.

ERADICATION OF BED BUGS.

One complaint was received and investigated. Action was taken and no further complaint was received.

SCHOOLS.

All schools are periodically visited and inspected, the water supply and sanitary arrangements being supervised.

SECTION D.

A great deal of the department's time is taken up with the inspection of dwelling houses. Some difficulty is experienced in getting satisfactory repairs carried out to properties due to the fact that suitable materials and adequate labour are not available.

SECTION E.

Inspection and Supervision of Food.

Milk Supply. Cowsheds and Dairies.

Cowsheds and Dairies are regularly inspected. Samples of the Milk produced are taken and the Analyst's results tend to show that generally, milk is produced in a satisfactory manner.

Some producers have given more trouble due probably to their lack of knowledge of the methods of obtaining clean milk. Advice has been given and close observation kept.

Structural alterations have been carried out to a number of cowsheds and Dairies relating chiefly to drainage and water supply.

The cases of Scarlet Fever were distributed during the 12 months and were of a mild form. There was an incident of Measles in the early part of the year. There was no deaths.
