Gentlemen,

Belatedly I offer you my report for 1939. The Delay is not however due to inadvertence on my part but to difficulties inherent in war, whereby the Registrar General was late in sending to me the computations, statistics and instructions upon which partly this report is founded.

I embody in this report the fact that our Country entered in September upon a state of war, a condition which produced certain unusual circumstances in the area :-

(a) There was an influx of 771 dispersed adults and children, many of these people were in ill-health and excited; a large number of the children were verminous, suffered from itch and sores (scabies and inpetigo) and added largely to the work of social servants. The pupils of a large secondary school were also placed here and their health was most carefully and conscientiously looked after by their accompanying teachers.
The same is to be stated regarding the teachers and nurses who under much greater difficulties had charge of children from among the less affluent class; these nurses had a good deal of unpleasant work to do and did it very well. One complimented also the hosts and hostesses who upon the whole acted admirably towards the forlorn, but one must not forget those whose duty it was to receive and arrange for the placing of the immigrants followed by many roadjustments necessitated by incompatibilities; often under harrassing conditions calling for great tact and good temper which however were always forthcoming at any time of night or day when pecasion called. Various buildings viz: Rehobeth Schoolroom and Bathel

(b) Mobilization in September brought hither also about 1000 of H.M. Troops. Various Buildings were occupied by the Military Authorities viz: your own Assembly Hall, Town Hall, Church House, Pendre, Strand Farm, The Hospice, Desmond House, Claremont House, Poplars, Holway House, Glasfryn and Islwyn.

Lluesty was crowded and for a time during the emergency much overcrowded by a large number of sick soldiers.

One records in this report also the strange sight of some buildings being heavily protected by sand encased in bags and by corrugated external shutters over windows.

Mention is also made in this record of the Institution of Obscuration of artificial light known generally as "the Black out". The face of the Town clock too ceased to be illuminated. All this called for extra activities on the part of your officials, the Police and of the Public. Instruction in A R P work including First Aid and Fire Services was instituted by your Council. V A D classes which for many years have kept in being were enlarged and form an admirable nucleus of well instructed and certified Red Cross nurses.

Chapel Schoolroom, were utilized as extra schools.

The Public responded with an enthusiasm which speaks well for the patriotism and self sacrificing spirit of

our population.
Circular 1961 (Wales) from the elsh Board of Health requires information to be submitted to you in the following form which I now offer. It is to be noted that where as normally the deaths in the area of persons from other districts are transferred to their home areas and are not included in the statistics of this area. This rule is altered as from Oct 1st 1939; the effect of this is that deaths in Lluesty of persons from other districts go to increase our death rate. This applies to other districts, but computation is randered slightly more difficult.

SECTION "B".

- (1) Public Health Officers of the Sanitary Authority consist of one part time Medical Officer of Health, C. E. Morris, M.R.C.S, L.R.C.P London and one full time Sanitary Inspector D. L. Morgans B.Sc.
- (2). (a) Laboratory facilities No Change.
 - (b) Ambulance A R P services have an ambulance which is strictly reserved for war emergencies only.
 - (8) Nursing in the home, carried out by one District Nurse. There is much enthhsiasm shown by a large class of V.A.D of the Red Cross Association, which will tend to provide an extension of nursing care in the home.
 - (d) Treatment Clinics are conducted by the staff of the County Council.
 - (e) Hospitals One public hospital which contains no accommodation for normal or serious emergencies in obstetrics. In my opinion it is time that the County Authorities provided in this centre where the birth rate is high suitable hospital accommodation for serious cases. At present much money is expended in transport to Mancot and St Asaph distant Moreover friends and relatives of Hospitals. patients find it difficult to visit especially St Asaph, because the Railway journey thither through Rhyl is devious and expenesive, especially the obstetricians of this District have no accommodation for Hospital treatment of their patients when the sudden emergencies, inseperable from this work do unfortunately occur. One Voluntary Hospital whence all confinement cases (whatever the emergency) are specifically excluded.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Extension of sewage system for Greenfield under construction. Ditches in the marsh are very foul and call loudly for cleaning.

Water Supply. During the latter part of the year, owing to the increased population and decreased pressure at which water was delivered to the Urban District Reservoir from the Birkenhead Waterworks, it was found impossible to maintain a continous supply of water to the District. Steps were taken to augment the supply by boosting of a temporary nature. A scheme involving the laying of extra supply mains for a distance of approximately 2 miles is now in course of submission to the Ministry of Health and it is hoped that this will be in operation during the current year.

Sewerage and Drainage. Works of sewerage for Greenfield and Holywell are now in course of erection. Under this scheme it will be possible to convert the village of Greenfield into a water carriage system.

Infectious Diseases. 14 cases of Scarlet Faver and 23 cases of diphtheria were notofied during the year. In addition to 7 deaths from tuberculosis, 3 cases of scarlet fever and 1 case of diphtheria included on the above figures occurred amongst evacuated school children from Liverpool.

Generally. The outstanding events of the year were the declaration of war of Septr 3rd 1939, the arrival of approximately 800 evacuees on the same date, and the arrival of certaicompanies of troops on Septr 2nd. The evacuation scheme and the reception of the children was supervised from this department and the billeting was completed for each batch before nightfall, many members of the Council and the general public giving every assistance.
