

SECTION C - SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

1. (i) WATER. The Town's supply is obtained from wells in different parts of the district, and from deep seated springs tapped and delivered by east iron mains to the Town. All supplies are constant.

CAPEL SUL SUPPLY. This yields a minimum supply of about 30,000 gallons per 24 hours.

MILLANDS SUPPLY. During the summer months this supply is used to augmen the Capel Sul Supply. During the year 1949 the pumps were used for 2394 hours as compared with 1833 hours in 1948.

CAE CEFN SUPPLY. This supply gives a minimum flow of 30,000 gallons per 24 hours. Improvements of this supply are under consideration.

MAESGWENLLIAN SUPPLY. This is from deep seated springs tapped in a disused Silver Mine idit Level, giving a minimum supply of about 25,000 gallons in 24 hours. There is storage for 10,000 gallons.

CHLORINATION OF SUPPLIES. The three supplies are constantly chlorinated and chlorination tests of water are taken weekly.

CONSUMPTION OF WATER. The estimated consumption of water for the year was:-

Domestic consumption......28.13 gallons per head per day. Industrial consumption......4.05 gallons per head per day. Total consumption......32.18 gallons per head per day.

The supplies have been satisfactory in quantity. 18 samples of water were taken during the year and found to be satisfactory. Examinations are made by the Emergency Public Health Laboratory, Carmarthen. 2 examinations were made of raw water. The water are not liable to have plumbo-solvent action on lead.

All houses have direct supplies except 102 which are supplied from standpipes. The population supplied by standpipes is 350 which is 11.79%.

RIVERS AND STREAMS. No action was necessary during the year.

- (b) PUBLIC CONVENIENCES. There are two Public Conveniences in the Centre of the Town, which are cleaned and disinfected daily.
- (c) SCAVENGING. House refuse is collected weekly from all houses in the Borough by motor lorry and is tipped on the Morfa Mawr Embankment.

SMOKE ABATEMENT. Smoke fees not give rise to any nuisance.

SWINNING BAIMS AND POOLS. There are no such baths in the Borough but a donsiderable amount of sea-bathing is enjoyed during the surmer months by the inhabitants.

SGECOLS. The three schools in the Borough are Primary. They are kept in a sanitary condition. The water supply is from the Council's main and is satisfactory. The kitchens are used daily to feed all children attending the schools.

The Schools Medical Officer is Dr. Ress Evans, Dr. D.G.G.Jones, Deputy School Medical Officer. The School Dentist is Mr.G.Uncoed Griffiths, L.D.S., R.C.S., and I work in conjunction with them. It has not been necessar; to close the schools on account of any epidemic as suggested in a memorandum on Closure and Exclusion from School 1927, the powers to exclude any individual children and contacts is used to the best advantage.

93 children from the Borough attend Burry Port Central School. They are conveyed to and from school by 'bus'.

HEALTH AND EDUCATION. Lectures are given periodically on infant fooding, auto-notal hygience etc.,

MILK SUPPLY. There are 18 registered milk vendors in the area.
Licences are granted on the lines of the milk and dairies Order 1926. One Licence was issued under the Milk Special Designation Order 1936.
Examination of all registered precises with regard to cowsheds and dairies are made by the Sanitary Inspector. The dairies are kept in a very good condition and particular attention is paid to cans and utensils Number of notices served to repair cowsheds
Under the Sale of Food and Drugs act, County Inspectors take samples of milk for examination in regard to addition of water and percentage of fat. 23 samples of milk were taken under the National Milk Testing and Advisory Scheme and sent for examination. Examinations are made at the Public Health Laboratory, Carmarthen.
4 samples were submitted for tuberculosis examinations, all of which were found to be negative to mycobactorium tuberculosis.
BUTTER FACTORY. There is one Butter Factory in the Borough. Number of Notices served to carry out repairs

NUTRITION. Advantage is taken at the Welfare Centre of instructing mothers as to the value of nutrition.

SHELL-FISH . (Molluscan) There are no Shell-fish beds in the district .

SECTION F. - PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER, INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

Diptheria antitoxin is supplied at the Council's expense when necessary, but owing to the immediate admission of cases of Diptheria to the County Isolation Hospital, few cases receive antitoxin before admission. No cases were notified during the year.

There have been no cases of Diptheria and no cases of Malaria or Dysentry notified during the year.

According to Infectious Diseases Regulation 1927, a supply of Forms is provided for notification of Malaria, Dystentry, acute Primary and acute Influenzal Rheumonia.

No action has been necessary under the Public Health (Small-Pox Regulation 1917). Disinfection of premises and articles exposed to infection is carried out by the Council.

DIPTHERIA IMMUNISATION. Children on reaching the age of 10 months are now immunised against Diptheria by their own family doctor.
