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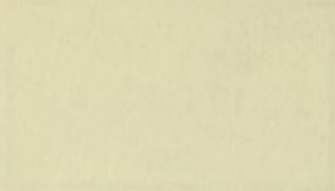

for the Year 1957

To the Llandeilo Urban District Council.

The Registrar General's estimated population figure was again twenty fewer than in 1956.

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STATISTICS

The Area of the Urban District is 311 acres.

The estimated population for 1957 is 1840 a further drop of twenty.

There were also no deaths resulting from Pregnancy or Childbirth in the Area during 1957.

DEATHS FROM ALL CAUSES AT ALL AGES

There were 34 deaths during the year, 16 male and 18 female. This is an increase on the previous year when the total was 26.

26 of the 34 deaths (11 male and 15 female) were over 65 years of age i.e. 76% of the total deaths. 62% (8 male and 13 female) were over 70 years and 41% (5 male and 11 female) were over 75 years and 32% (4 male and 7 female) were over 80 years.

CANCER

PREVALENCE OF AND CONTROL OVER DISEASES OTHER THAN TUBERCULOSIS

In common with the rest of the country some cases of influenza occurred in the late Autumn - affecting firstly the school children and then some of the adults. Tests carried out showed it was due to the Asian strain of the influenza virus which had spread to this country from the Far East. The illness was of a mild character and caused no deaths in this area.

Only four cases of infectious diseases were reported during the year - two cases of measles - one of pneumonia and one of erysipelas .

FOOD POISONING

No cases were notified in the Urban During the year.

DIPHTHERIA

It is gratifying to report again that at least for ten years no cases of diphtheria have occurred in the area, but to maintain this freedom from the disease it is necessary that children should receive the full course of inoculations. These inoculations are given by the local Medical Practitioners and at the Infant Welfare Clinic which is held on alternative Wednesdays from 2 - 4 p.m.

Some of these received combined inoculations against Diphtheria and Whooping Cough.

Vaccination against Small pox - A number of infants received vaccinations against Smallpox. Separate figures are not available for Llandeilo but in the whole County 1027 infants were vaccinated - 43.72% of the registered births for the year.

Poliomyelitis - Vaccination against Poliomyelitis was given to children in certain age groups. The numbers of the whole County were:-

MASS RADIOGRAPHY

The Mass Radiography Unit was stationed in the Town for two days during June this year. 809 were examined - an increase of 42 on the previous visit. 274 were senior school children - ten of whom were referred for further observation - one has since been admitted to Hospital for treatment. Of the total number examined 14 or 1.73% required further observation at the Chest Clinic and 120 or 14.83 were found to have some abnormality - 106 of whom (13.10%) had an abnormality of the chest.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES IN THE AREA

WATER

The supply of water to the Town is obtained from two sources (a) Maesevan Reservoir and (b) Llandyfan Spring.

Maesevan Reservoir is situated $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles from the Town at 397 O.D. and 110 feet above the highest point of the Town. The supply is derived from land springs above the reservoir the latter having a capacity of 1,000,000 gallons.

Llandyfan Spring is situated $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles from the Town at 480 feet O.D. and 193 feet above the highest point of the Town. The supply is derived from a spring in a limestone stratum, with an estimated overflow of 1,000,000 gallons per day.

Both supplies are conveyed by gravitation to the Town in 5" cast iron pipes. The Maesevan pipe line is approximately 100 years old. Examination of the interior surfaces of the pipes show considerable incrustation. The Llandyfan mains are in good condition although 60 years old. This supply is chlorinated at the rate of .3 parts per million, with a Wallace and Tiernan plant at Dowwydd.

The Town mains supply parts of Ffairfach and Rhosmaen in the Llandcilo Rural Area and the total population supplied is approximately 4,000. The average daily estimated consumption is 90,000 gallons. All Town properties have a piped supply.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

The Sewers of the Town are combined, taking both sewage and surface water. The sewers serve the Town with the exception of several houses in the Nantyrhibo area, Brookland Terrace and the lower part of Bridge Street.

The sewers are constructed in stoneware pipes and culverts.

At present the sewage discharges untreated into the River Towy. A new Scheme for relaying the sewers is in progress and the outlets will be linked with the new trunk main (now nearing completion) to discharge into the new purification plant constructed under a Joint Scheme with the Town and the Rural District Council. On completion the sewer will take the drainage from Brookland Terrace and the lower part of Bridge Street referred to above.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

A twice weekly collection of household refuse is carried out throughout the Town by direct labour. The purchase of a second hand vehicle by the Council in 1956, for this purpose has proved very successful. It is probable that a new and more modern vehicle will be purchased in the near future.

Disposal is carried out by depositing in tips outside the Town on land privately owned. The tip is regularly inspected and treated against Rodent infestation.

RODENT CONTROL

The Council employs a full time female operator. The services of the operator are free in respect of dwelling houses and a charge is levied in respect of business and other premises.

The Town sewers are treated twice yearly in accordance with the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries instructions. During the year extensive infestation was noted throughout the Town. This was effectively dealt with by your operator.

Rodent Control (Cont.)

It is clear that this infestation was largely due to rats gaining access to the Town via the stone culverts from the river. This infestation should fall sharply when the new sewers are constructed.

FOOD

The Council owns a commodious Market Hall divided into Stalls. Four of these Stalls are occupied by Caretakers and one by a caterer.

A sink, wash hand basin and a constant hot water supply has been provided for the use of the Stallholders and Caretaker.

Stalls

Two food stalls are erected outside the Market on Market days. The washing facilities in the Market are available for these Stallholders.

Following written notices served last year, the Stallholders have now provided screens around the Stalls.

Shops

During the year, considerable progress was made in the provision of wash hand basins, sinks and hot water supplies in the various shops in the Town. Cordial co-operation was experienced in all cases.

A Notice is outstanding in respect of one shop. Improvements to this shop estimated to be over \$1000 are nearing completion. The work involved includes new sanitary accommodation, washing facilities, hot water supply and refrigerated food storage.

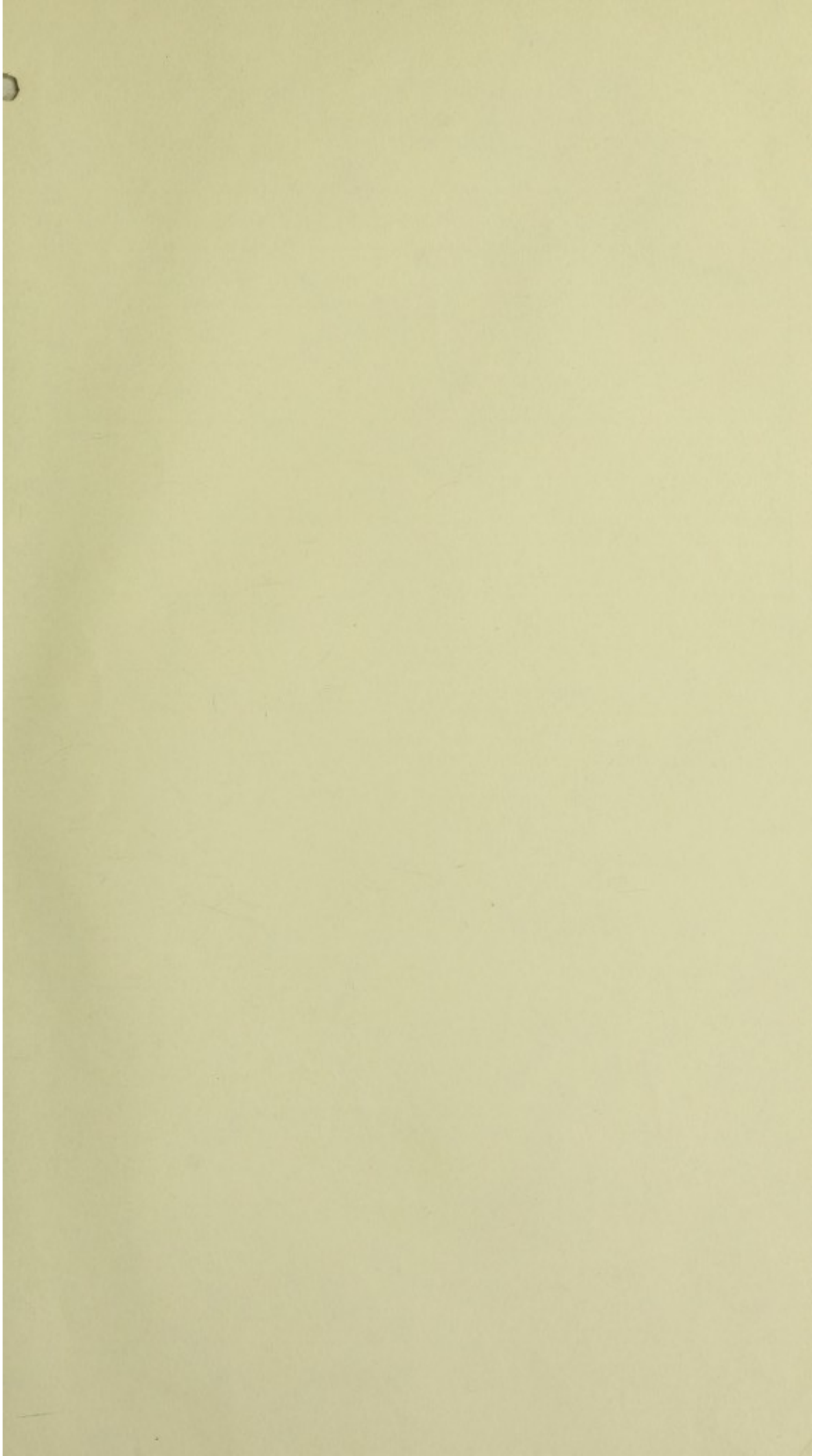
