There have been no alterations of Legislation in force (local Acts, Bye-laws, etc.) since the last Survey Report. The district is purely Agricultural and immune from any smoke nuisances and is a small Country Town.

There is a part-time Medical Officer of Health who does not hold a Diploma in Public Health, and part-time Sanitary Inspector who does not hold a Certificate under the Sanitary Inspectors Institution.

There has been no unusual or excessive mortality during the year which has received or required

There have been no cases of sickness or invalidity which have been specially noteworthy in the borough during the year, neither have there been any conditions of occupations or environment which appeared to have had a prejudicial effect on health, and there is no evidence, statistical or otherwise, that unemployment has exercised any significant influence on the health or physique of children or adults.

Laboratory.

There are no Laboratory facilities in the borough.

Ambulance.

There is one Motor Ambulance in the Borough which is supported by voluntary subscriptions. Nursing in the Home is provided for by the Llandovery Nursing Association. There are no Treatment Lectures and Clinics. There is one small Voluntary Hospital.

Lodging Houses.

There are now no Registered Houses. New Casual Wards at Tanybryn have been constructed at a heavy expenditure, and are now open and these will give sufficient accommodation for Casuals.

House Refuse and Scavenging.

Scavenging is done regularly by the Council workmen, and the streets are kept clean. People should

however avoid dropping paper about the roads as receptacles are now provided by the Council.

House refuse is regularly cleared in the principal streets, and there is also a better clearance in the back Streets. The drains in Stone Street are much better since attention has been paid to them by the County Council by placing new Gullies there.

Food and Drugs Act.

There have been some inspections made, but everything was found to be normal.

Zymotic Diseases.

There were two cases of Scarlet Fever, four Pneumonia and one Erysipelas cases notified in the Borough, and every precaution was taken to avoid a spread of the diseases. One death occurred from Scarlet Fever

There is no Institutional provision for Mothers of children. There is however a part-time Health visiting Nurse. There is only one Clinic in the Borough, ante-natal and child welfare.

There are no Nursing Homes under the Registration Act, 1927.

There is no infectious Diseases Hospital in the Borough, but an Isolation Hospital has recently been open at Tumble, near Llanelly, where cases from Llandovery can be accepted.

There is no organisation for child life protection. There are no facilities for Orthopædic treatment.

Meat and Food.

No action is taken with regard to Meat and other Food inspection or under the Food and Drug Act.

Schools.

The College, County School and Council School have been visited and found satisfactory. In the Senior School the Lavatory system was not good, but the Managers have now provided new Lavatories at considerable expense. Neither of the Schools were closed on account of infectious diseases.

Factory and Workshops.

All these have been found clean and well ventilated.

Cow Sheds in the Borough have all been inspected. One new Shed has been constructed causing a much desired improvement.

Water Supply.

No Bacteriological or analytical examination was made during the year as the service was quite satisfactory, and no chemical analysis made during the period. The water supply in the Borough is fairly satisfactory and the matter is receiving the attention of the Town Council, who will probably cause new and larger pipes to be laid throughout the Town.

Drainage and Sewerage.

There has been no extension of Sewerage, and no progress made in improving the character and sufficiency of the arrangements for drainage, sewage and sewerage disposal in all parts of the Borough.

Rivers and Streams.

No pollution of Rivers and Streams has occured and consequently no action was necessary. No complaints were made by any persons of this.

Slaughter Houses.

There are 5 Slaughter Houses in the Town. On inspection all have been found clean. The Slaughter of Animals Act which has been adopted by the Town Council is proving of great service in many respects.

Bakehouses.

These have been inspected and found perfectly clean.

Tuberculosis.

It is gratifying to state that there has been only one death from Tuberculosis during the year.

Bed Bugs.

There has been no action taken for the Eradication of bed bugs.

Blindness.

There has been no action taken for the prevention of blindness or for treatment of persons suffering from any disease or injury to the eyes.

Swimming Baths.

There are no Swimming Baths and Pools in the area.

Maternity and Child Welfare.

This continues to do very useful work in the Town and District, and is much appreciated and found of considerable help by the mothers. The Centre is well attended and keen interest is taken by the mothers and officials. Sessions are held every fortnight at which short Lectures are delivered by the Medical Officer of Health. Afternoon Teas are also provided by the Committee. There has been do development or change in the Maternity and Child Welfare Centre in the Borough.

Inspections made by Sanitary Inspector.

The Sanitary Inspector has made 20 Inspections, and practically all the suggestions have been carried out after notice given to the owners. Drains are frequently disinfected, and the Cattle Market is kept clean, notwithstanding its frequent use for Marts, Fairs, and Stock Sales. The Roadways in the Market have been tar macadamised. The nature of the Inspections comprised drainage; cesspits; slaughter houses; bakehouses; troughings on houses and loose slates on roofs. House Refuse is now dumped in a field situated a considerable distance from the town. The placing of offensive rubbish on the highway has been practically stopped. Caravans are not permitted to remain near dwelling houses. The old Workhouse buildings are to be demolished, as owing to rats it was a nuisance to the Cottage Hospital and neighbours.

Housing Conditions.

1. The Houses erected in the Borough are similar to those erected in a Borough of similar size.

2. (a) There seems a sufficient supply of houses in the Borough, provided some undergo the necessary repairs. At present there are about 35 persons on the waiting list for Council Houses but many of whom reside in decent houses. There are also a number of small vacant houses, some of which should be repaired and reconditioned.

(b) There is practically very little change in the population, neither is this anticipated in the future as there are no industries other than Agriculture. It is a small Country Market Town.

(c) Suitable sites are somewhat difficult to obtain.

3. Most Houses have a fair internal Water Supply, whilst other Houses have a supply of water quite near at hand. 503 Houses possess Water Closets; 76 Houses Deep Pit Closets; whilst the 54 erected under the Housing Act 1919, have a bucket System, which is cleared nightly. There have been no conversions. There is no extension or improvements for public cleansing.

. There are no what one may term unhealthy areas in the Borough, but the Council propose taking the

necessary steps under the Slum Clearance Act by erecting ten houses.

 There are no Bye-laws in the Borough, but the Council have under consideration the adoption of the same, particularly relative to new streets and buildings.

Meat Market.

The Council have renovated this building and this should prove of great service, and a much needed improvement in the Borough. Its construction cost at least £1000.

Public Conveniences.

The Council have provided an up-to-date Public Convenience in the Borough, which was much required. This has been found very serviceable, but persons who create damage there should be prosecuted.

Milk and Dairies Act.

In this Borough a great deal of Milk Selling takes place. The milk is of good quality on the whole and no complaints have been made. The Cow Sheds are now kept clean as they should be. The walls white washed oftener. The owners have kept their promise to improve matters. Steps were taken to have a Bacteriological examination of Milk, and the Milk was found of good quality. There are no Tubercular persons employed in the Milk business.

Shop Acts.

No action has been taken under the provisions of the Shop Act, 1934, regarding ventilation and temperature of Shops and Sanitary arrangements.

Cancer.

There has been no campaign against Cancer.
