PREVALENCE AND CONTROL OF INFECTIOUS DISEASE (other than tuberculosis)

During the whole year only one case was notified - Measles in a young child.

DIPHTHERIA AND WHOOPING COUGH IMMUNISATION.

For another year again it is gratifying to be able to report that there were no cases of Diphtheria or Whooping Cough. Inoculations against these two diseases were given by the Medical Practitioners and at the Infant Welfare Clinic. This is held on alternate Tuesday afternoons. Parents are advised to take the opportunity of protecting their children in this way, particularly as a small, but increasing number of cases of diphtheria have occured in many parts of the country during the year - usually in children who had not been immunised or had not received the full course of inoculations. Parents should therefore ensure that their children have received all their inoculations. The number for the Borough for the year wore: -

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR AND WATER ENGINEER FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER 1960.

Mr. Mayor, Mrs Halliday and Gentlemen,

I submit for your consideration my Public Health Inspector's Annual Report for the year ending 31st December 1960.

WATER SUPPLY.

The water supply for the Borough of Llandovery for the year 1960 was obtained mainly from the Tonn Borehole an estimated small quantity of about 20,000 gallons was delivered into the Service Reservoir from the Cynnant Main during the year. This being a negligable quantity compared with the 33,919,000 gallons which was pumped from the Tonn Borehole in the same period. Five dwellings and one farm in the Borough of Llandovery are supplied directly from the Cynnant Main. To maintain sufficient pressure to provide the Bronhaul Housing Estate, Cynghordy which is owned by the Llandeilo Rural District Council with sufficient pressure it has become necessary to shut off the flow from the Cynnant Main into the service reservoir. This increased pressure on the Cynnant Trunk Mains is causing frequent breakdown in the weakening sections of the water main and the water services. The Town of Llandovery is now supplied entirely from the Tonn Borehole situated North of the Town in the land of the Tonn Farm. The pumping equipment used in 1960 was housed in a temporary pump house since January 1952. Work was started on the 23rd May 1960 on the construction of a permanent pump house and provision of two new submersible pumps, a new control panel, water recording equipment chlorinating plant and lime saturating plant. This work was in progress at the end of 1960.

TREATMENT OF SUPPLY.

The water has been chlorinated/causing a solution of chloros to drip into the service reservoir from a 40 gallon jar. The corrosive properties of the water has been treated by a similar arrangement using a solution of Sodium Carbonate and Sodium Silicate. This new equipment being installed in the new permanent pump house is a chlorine gas apparatus supplied by Candy Filter Co.Itd. A lime saturating plant is being installed to correct the pH. of the water of the Borehole.

THE QUANTITY OF SUPPLY.

The quality of the water is very satisfactory and the quantity of water available is sufficient for the future need of the Borough of Llandovery.

CYNNANT SUPPLY.

The delivery of water to the service reservoir supplying the Town of Llandovery has been stopped. Sufficient pressure has been built up in the water mains to supply Bronhaul Estate, Cynghordy. As you are aware these water pipes have been scraped twice and are badly coroded internally. This water main is now subjected to continuous high pressure. The slightest leak in any water service to premises or in the water mains results in the pressure drop depriving the Bronhaul Housing Estate of their water supply.

Any disturbance of the water in the mains also causes excessive discolouration of the water supplied through the taps. The days of usefulness of this trunk mains are numbered. It is hoped that no major breakdown will occur before the section of the comprehensive water scheme of the Llandeilo Rural District Council, covering this area, has been completed.

CONSUMPTION.

The total quantity of water supplied to the Borough of Llandovery was 33,913,000 gallons an average of 92,940 gallons per day, an increase of 7,940 gallons per day as compared with 1959.

SUPPLY.

The whole district with the exception of one farm and three isolated houses have water from the Borough piped supply

WATER SAMPLING.

The water is checked for residual chlorine and pH. value three times weekly with Lovibond Comparator. A residual chlorine reading of .05 p.p. million and pH reading of 8 is maintained. Two bacteriological samples were sent for analysis. The results were very satisfactory. One chemical sample was submitted to the Public Analyst and two submitted to Messrs. Candy Filter Co.Ltd. The observation, of the Public Analyst was as follows:-

"The Chemical Analysis indicated that this water was of very high organic purity free from any indication of polution".

SEWERAHE & SEWAGE DISPOSAL SCHEME.

The sewerage and sewage disposal scheme is now receiving and disposing of the foul drainage of the town and part of rain water from roofs.

The Closet Conversion and Connection Scheme has been substantially completed. Difficulty has been experienced in drying and stacking the sludge from the disposal works. As you are aware a scheme has been submitted to the Ministry of Housing & Local Government increasing the drainage area of sludge beds from the estimate design area of lsq. yd per 7 persons to one square yard per 5 persons When these proposed works have been approved and carried out the sludge will be easier to handle. No area of land was allocated for the final drying of the sludge when the Sewerage & Sewage Disposal Scheme was approved and constructed. It is hoped that the proposed provision of a compound with the construction of brick wall will provide sufficient final drying of sludge for its removal from the site without nuisance.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Household refuse is removed twice weekly and deposited in the area of Llandeilo Rural District. Planned control tipping is difficult as the land is not owned by the Council. The Council have inspected the area of the Borough for a suitable refuse tip and have resolved to negotiate for the purchase of land adjoining the existing refuse tip. When this land is obtained controlled tipping of refuse will be properly carried out.

The refuse was collected with/KarrierGamecock Refuse collecting motor vehicle. A new Karrier Bantam was purchased in June 1960. The sweeping of Borough roads is carried out by Borough Council employees and the County reads by Borough employees on behalf of the County Council.
