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The Annual Report of the Public Health Inspector for the

Mr Mayor and Gentlemen,

I submit for your attention and consideration the Annual Report of the Public Health Inspector for the year ending 31st December 1962.

Water Supply.

Tonn Borehole Supply.

The main source of supply of water for the Town of Llandovery is the Tonn Borehole.

The total quantity of water pumped from the Tonn Borehole was 41,129,000 gallons an average of 112,711 gallons per day.

The daily quantity of the water pumped increases by approximately 10,000 gallons per day between January and December.

The quantity for this source is sufficient for the foreseeable future need of the Borough of Llandovery.

The water at source before treatment is soft.

The comments of the Public Analyst after the chemical and bacteriological examination of this supply before treatment and after treatment is as follows:-

Before Treatment.

The Borehole water has a total hardness of 35 parts per million and would be classified as soft. It had a slight acid reaction and negative saturation index which shows aggressive tendencies towards metals. Bacteriologically and organically it was of high quality.

After Treatment.

Treatment had resulted in converting the water from being slightly acid to slightly alkaline in reaction, hardness had gone up to 65 parts per million and would be classified as moderately soft, This had also corrected the corrosive tendency of the water.

Organically this water was of the highest chemical quality and its bacteriological condition was equally satisfactory.

The Tonn Borehole is a 18" diameter slotted steel tube lined Borehole 47'-6" deep in gravel extracting water from the subterranean stream of the River Towy.

The water is treated in the brick building at the head of the Borehole by chlorination with chlorine gas and the correction of the corrosive nature of the water by the addition of powdered hydrated lime through a lime saturator.

I check the water supply every two days for residual chlorine content which is kept between 0.05 to 0.1 part per million and the pH of the water which is kept between 7.5 and 8.0.

Cynnant Supply.

This supply is only used to supply farms and dwellings on the route of the 4" trunk main, 50 dwellings and 9 farms on the Llandeilo R.D.C. area and four dwellings and two farms in the Borough of Llandovery.

Distribution.

All the premises in the Borough are supplied with water from the piped public supply with the exception of one farm and three houses, the farm and two houses have their own supply piped into the house.

Other houses connected to the piped public supply all are

supplied direct into the houses over sinks except 11 who are supplied by stand pipes in their back areas.

### Sewerage & Sewage Disposal.

Excessive infiltration of subsoil water into the trunk sewer was detected in five sections. At the end of 1962 these areas of infiltration had not been repaired. The sewerage scheme appeared to be working efficiently with exception of the facility for the disposal and drying of sludge. A scheme for the improvement and reforming of the sludge beds with brick partitions was prepared and substantially completed approximately doubling the effective drying area of the sludge beds.

Three samples of the effluent from the Sewage Works were taken at the discharging point into the river Bran. One was taken by the South West Wales River Board and I collected two samples which were submitted to the Public Analyst.

From the samples taken the South West Wales River Board considering the result of the sample unsatisfactory but the Public Analyst considers the effluent satisfactory, one very satisfactory.

### Public Cleansing.

The household refuse is collected weekly and combined trade and household refuse from business premises is collected twice weekly. The refuse is tipped on a site in the Llandeilo Rural District Council area, East of the Borough in the Glangwydderig Farm area. The refuse is spread after each daily collection and covered with quarry waste. Flies and crickets are controlled with regular application of powder insecticide applied with a high pressure blower and rodent population by monthly Rodent Control treatments.

### Street Cleaning.

The sweeping of Borough Roads is carried out by Borough Council employees and the County Roads by Borough workmen on behalf of the County Council.

### Caravan Sites.

Two Caravan Sites are licenced under the Caravan Site and Control of Development Act 1960. One is a Holiday Caravan Site for fifteen caravans. One a residential site for one caravan with temporary licence for one year.
