NATURAL AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS

During the year 1968 the health of the inhabitants young and old varied little from previous years. No illness could be said to have been directly attributable to poor housing, lack of nutrition, lack of hygiene or major infection.

There were no excessive mortality or epidemics and the health of the townspeople was generally good.

The townspeople were fully employed throughout the year and unemployment of employable men and women was negligible. The opening of the Board of Trade Advance Factory in the manufacture of office equipment has increased the range of employment for men and women and it is notable that those previously in seasonal part-time employment at Hotels are now generally taking up full time employment and that hotel staffing is trending towards the engagement of Italian and European employees.

Otherwise the employment of townspeople is generally as previously indicated in the distribution trades, administrative professions and national undertakings.

2. Laboratory Facilities

The examination and analysis of water, sewage effluents and stream contamination are carried out by the Public Analyst of the County Laboratory, Carmarthen - Analyst:- H.J. Evans & Partners.

3. Health Services

The following services are carried out by the Radnorshire County Council under the National Health Service Act, 1946 and Mental Health Act, 1959. The County Council services are efficiently and well organised.

- (i) Maternity and Child Welfare.
- (ii) Clinics.
- (iii) Dental care for expectant mothers and nursing mothers and young children together with School Dental Services.
- (iv) Midwives Service, delegated to the Radnorshire County Nursing Association.
- (v) Health Visiting delegated to the Radnorshire County Nursing Association.
- (vi) Vaccination and immunisation of children under five and of school age is carried out by Registered Medical Practitioners of the parents' choice or by the County Medical Officer.
(The vaccination of adults is carried out by Registered Medical Practitioners.)
- (vii) Ambulance Service .
- (viii) Prevention of illness, Care and After Care of persons suffering from tuberculosis, mental illness or defectiveness and other types of illness is organised under the aegis of the County Health Committee.
- (ix) Domiciliary Health Services.
- (x) Home nursing delegated to the Radnorshire County Nursing Association.
- (xi) Health Education is carried out by the Radnorshire County Council.
- (xii) Mental Health.
- (xiii) Chiropody Service.
- (xiv) Arrangements for fluoridation of public water supplies.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

The water supply undertakers for the district are the Radnorshire and North Breconshire Water Board.

The purification and clarification of the water, as taken from the River Ithon, - Quality was not always satisfactory due to river conditions and lack of settling tanks - Quantity was sufficient. The only way of providing clear water from river sources is to settle with alum then filter. As we are going on to the Birmingham water supply one hopes this matter will be improved.

A notification from the Engineer Manager of the Water board dated the 27th November, 1968 indicated that 22 samples had been analysed and were bacteriologically satisfactory.

No action was necessary by the Health Authority in connection with any form of contamination.

Analysts report on sample taken in August, 1968 is detailed in Table 3.

Chemical Analysis - Nil. No flouridation is carried out to the water supplied for domestic use by the Radnorshire and North Breconshire Water Board.

SWIMMING POOL

The swimming pool operated privately by The Hotel Metropole during the summer of 1968 was maintained to a reasonably satisfactory standard. The surface is beginning to roughen and will start to cause injuries very soon. The admission charge was too high for children to go often enough to learn to swim.

It is hoped that the matter of a new swimming pool in conjunction with the Education Authorities will be given high priority.

The water supply to the pool of 133,000 gallon capacity was taken from the domestic water supply and the pool replenished as necessary. The water was treated by straining and filtration, sterilization being by injection of chlorine. Alkali as sodium carbonate was added as necessary.

Daily tests were made with comparator for free chlorine and alkalinity.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERS

1. Drainage (a) Generally no major difficulties were experienced on the sewer systems of the town. Back flooding of basement rooms occurred in premises at Temple Street caused by large volume of storm water entering sewer system.

(b) The extension of the public sewer system into the housing development estate at Cefnlllys Lane was put out to tender during the year and was carried out by Contract.

(c) Consideration was given to the provision of surface water drainage at Oxford Road and Oxford Avenue to remove surface water now passing into the foul water sewers and which with other storm water causes overflow of sewer at a manhole in lower part of Oxford Road.

2. Sewage Disposal The disposal works were operated satisfactorily during the year. The results of analysis are given below.

The sample taken on 10th July at 9.10 a.m. was immediately after a rainfall of 1.01 inches and from discussion with the River Board Representative it was agreed that the surge of storm water into the works had caused disturbance of the system.

Rivers and Streams Inspections of river and streams in the Urban District were carried out. No action on pollution was necessary.

Public Cleansing (i) The collection and disposal of household refuse has continued on the same principle as other years. No variation in collection of domestic properties once each week and twice each week from certain trade and hotel premises has been necessary.

During the year mechanical defects of the Refuse Collection Vehicle interfered with the regular collections. It was necessary for me to adversely report to you on the untidy and over-full condition of the Incinerator Site and during the year you commenced negotiations with the Rhayader R.D.C. on the possibility of using that Authority's tip at Nantmel.

(ii) The collection and sale of salvaged materials comprising bottles, waste paper, broken glass, scrap iron and tins has continued.

During the year you dispose of:-

29 tons 19 cwt. of waste paper
4 cwts scrap metal
24 tons 13 cwts baled tins and scrap iron

(iii) Street Cleansing In order to provide more frequent and efficient street cleansing services, you purchased during the year a mechanical sweeper and tractor for towing it. This new system proved more efficient and regular to that of the hand sweeping system.

(iv) Civic Amenities Act, 1967 Your arrangements for use of tip at Brookland Road for Civic Amenities tip were completed and the tip became in use for householders of the town.

(v) Fouling of Pavements by Dogs The necessary Byelaws made by the Radnorshire County Council came into force making it an offence to allow a dog to foul the public pavement.

Common Lodging Houses There are no common lodging houses in the Urban District.

FOOD

Food Hygiene The enforcement of the food hygiene regulations was carried out by inspection.

Special inspections were made of the kitchens and food preparation establishments of the four large hotels and catering establishments. No prosecutions were found necessary.

Following receipt of circular letter from the Welsh Board of Health, appropriate printed cards were issued to all food shops and restaurants with my signature requesting that dogs be not taken into such premises.
