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

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I beg to submit my annual report on the sanitary conditions and the state of the public health in the Llanwrtyd Wells Urban District during the year 1957.

In the preparation of this report I have endeavoured to deal briefly with all matters within my responsibility regarding public health and preventive medicine and I have included all the subjects specifically requested in Circular 1/1958(Wales) by the Welsh Board of Health.

Section 1.General and Vital Statistics.

The Urban District of Llanwrtyd Wells forms part of the County of Brecon and is situated in the northern part of the County. The surrounding country is agricultural in nature and farming is the predominant occupation of the inhabitants. The Urban District is a well known holiday resort where advantage is taken of the medicinal springs in the locality.

Population.

As will be seen from above, the population in the district is slowly but surely dropping.

The corresponding rate for England and Wales was 16.1. The district rate was therefore lower than the national average and, as will be seen, was also much lower than the district death rate.

The corresponding rate for England and Wales was 22.4. The district rate was therefore lower than the national average.

The district rate was therefore higher than the national average and regrettably also much higher than the district birthrate. Infantile Mortality. This is the number of deaths occurring in children of under one year of age. No such death occurred in the district during the year whereas the national rate was 23.0 per 1000 live births. Maternal Deaths. No deaths occurred which could be attributed to childbirth. This is a very satisfactory feature. Deaths from Special Causes. Infectious Disease ......Nil. Cancer.....Nil. Section 2.General Provisions of Health Services.Mr.H.Longden, remained as your Public Health Inspector until the end of November, when he resigned, mainly for health reasons. The position was not filled at the end of the year. There are no Committees, as such, concerned with health matters, the full Council deal with all matters. Laboratory Facilities. During the year laboratory facilities were available at Cardiff, Newport, Carmarthen, Swansea and Aberystwyth. The laboratory of the Public Analyst for the County of Carmarthen was available for water samples whilst any investigation required in the control of infectious disease was performed by the Public Health Laboratory at Carmarthen. Mursing Facilities etc. The County Council are responsible for the provision of ambulance facilities, home nursing, maternity and child welfare, immunisation, and the treatment of minor ailments, dental, eye and orthopaedic defects. Hospitals. The hospital needs of the residents of the district, for all diseases apart from infectious disease, are provided by the local hospital at Builth Wells. The arrangements for the treatment of infectious disease remain the same as in previous years.Merthyr Borough Council treat the patients from the district suffering from infectious disease and these are conveyed to Merthyr in ambulances maintained by Merthyr. These arrangements are proving extremely satisfactory. For the treatment of smallpox cases arrangements have been made by the Welsh Board of Health for beds to be available at the Penrhys Hospital, Rhondda. Hereford Fever Hospital also is able to take cases of infectious disease.

Disinfection. The methods used for any required disinfection have been fumigation and spraying.

Section 3. Sanitary Circumstances.

Water Supplies. The water supplies to the district are now administered by the Builth and District Joint Water Board. The major water scheme for the district received approval during the year but, at the end of the year, had not been put out for tender.

It is to be hoped that this or some other scheme be implemented as soon as possible as there is no doubt that the water supply to Llanwrtyd is far from satisfactory.Considerable difficulty is experienced in supplying the upper reaches of the district.Whilst the quality is unsatisfactory, there being no treatment works.

Drainage and Sewerage. The drainage of the district and the excellent sewage disposal works continued to function satisfactorily during the year. Certain works of maintenance previously authorised were completed by the end of the year.

Public Cleansing. There was no change in the methods adopted for the collection and disposal of house refuse. This is collected twice weekly by a Contractor in the district and disposed of by tipping.

Sanitary Inspection of the Area. The sanitary inspection of the area was undertaken by the Public Health Inspector, The following details give information relating to the work of the Public Health Inspector during the year.

Houses let in Lodgings. It is not considered that any of the houses in the district are of such a nature as to require control under byelaws made under Section 6 of the Housing Act, 1936.

Eradication of bed bugs and steps taken to combat infestation.

One premises was found to be verminous during the year, and was disinfested.

Rodent Control. This work is performed by a Council Workman.

The sewers were also treated during May of the year.17 manholes were baited; there was a small take of poisoned bait in only one.

Legal Proceedings. No legal action was taken during the year.

Section 4.Housing.No Council or private houses were built during the year.Judging by the applications received for tenancies of the Council houses, the housing need of the district is not great.

Housing Consolidated Regulations, 1925.Article 31.At the request of the Welsh Board of Health, details of action under these regulations are reintroduced.As far as the year under review was concerned, proceedings were commenced with the view of demolishing one house.

Section 5. Inspection and Supervision of Food.

In connection with clean food no educational activity occurred during the year. The number of food premises, by type, in the district were: 6 Licensed Premises, 2 bakehouses, 3 butchers, 6 cafes and 7 others carrying on a "mixed" business.

Food & Drugs Act, 1955. Section 16. The premises registered under this section were 5 ice cream premises and 3 butchers.

Milk.Since the coming into operation of the Milk and Dairies Act, 1944,the Council is left with the registration and supervision of milk distributors.The results of samples taken during the year are shown below.

Meat.There is no slaughterhouse in the district, and meat is supplied to the district from the Ministry of Food Slaughtering Points at Builth Wells and Brecon.

Ice Cream Premises. In view of the possible occurrence of infectious disease caused by ice cream 18 visits of inspection were made by the Public Health Inspector.

# Section 6. Prevalence and Control of Infectious Disease.

The following cases of infectious disease were notified during the year.

As will be seen the district was again practically free from infectious disease during the year. One case of measles was removed to Hereford Hospital where complete recovery resulted. One of the cases of pneumonia proved fatal.

Venereal Disease. The County Council has an agreement with the General and Eye Hospital, Swansea, for the treatment of such cases. The tracing of contacts and the following up of defaulters is the responsibility of the County Council.

Tuberculosis. The following details show the position as regards tuberculosis in recent years.

Diphtheria Immunisation. As a result of the National Health Service Act, 1946, the County Council were responsible for the immunisation of children against diphtheria and details for the district will be found in the annual report of the County Medical Officer of Health.

Facilities for immunisation are now available at the ordinary Maternity and Child Welfare Clinics, at the schools during the school medical inspections, and also by the general practitioners.

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It is pleasing to see that the incidence of diphtheria continues to fall. The object of the immunisation campaign, however, remain the same: to secure the immunisation of not less than 75% of babies before their first birthday. It must be remembered that diphtheria still kills and that elimination of the disease is conditional upon the maintenance of an adequate level of immunisation. If parents leave their children unprotected there may be a return of diphtheria outbreaks.

No cases of diphtheria were notified during the year.
