By far the greatest number of deaths took place again this year among men and women over 65 years of age, and they died of diseases associated with advancing years, e.g.

Violence and indefinable causes accounted for 5 deaths in the Rural District and 1 in Pennal R.D.

There was an unusual number of deaths of infants at birth - 3 in the Rural District and 3 in Pennal C.P. Such a large number affects the death rate considerably and makes the rate per 1,000 look very high. It should, of course, be borne in mind that neither births, deaths nor illegitimacy would ever reach 1,000 in any one year.

Sanitary Conditions of the Area.

SANITARY INSPECTOR -

In November a full time Sanitary Inspector commenced duties and he set out to make a thorough inspection of housing conditions. (The Sanitary Inspector's Report is included in this Report).

WATER SUPPLIES -

Water Supplies are satisfactory in quantity and quality, and every effort is made to maintain these in a clean condition and periodical examination of the supplies show that the water is fit for human consumption. Winter frosts did considerable damage to pipes and certain villages suffered from scanty supplies for considerable periods because of the scarcity of skilled plumbers. Steps were taken to increase the supply of water for Pennal.

The Water Supplies under the control of the Council were inspected and kept under observation throughout the year.

REFUSE REMOVAL -

House Refuse is removed by carting in the various villages and deposited at remote distances from habitations. In Llanbrynmair District no applications to cart refuse away have been received for 3 years.

PUBLIC CLEANSING -

There has been no change in the practice adopted during 1939.

CESSPOOLS -

Closet accommodation in general is of the dry variety. In the villages where the water supply is sufficient some of the houses are fitted with Water Closets which are connected to a cesspit placed at approved distances from the dwellinghouses. These are cleaned out periodically by the Owners.

RIVERS and STREAMS -

There is no evidence that measures are necessary to check pollution.

SHOPS and OFFICES -

Small and one man owned.

SEWERAGE and DRAINAGE -

One new drainage system was constructed during the year. This was built by private enterprise.

SECTION "E"

Inspection and Supervision of Food.

MILK SUPPLY -

During the year 3 new Dairies were registered. Most of the cowsheds and dairies were found defective on inspection, but were remedied on the service of informal notices. Each dairyman was interviewed and instructed in the production of clean milk. It is pleasing to report that producers of milk are falling into line with greater readiness than used to be the case some years ago.

ADULTERATION -

The County Council is the Authority responsible for the collection of samples under the Food & Drugs (Adulteration) Act, 1926.

MEAT and OTHER FOODS -

The matter of Meat and other Food is being dealt with by the Sanitary Inspector of the Urban District Council of Machynlleth.

SECTION "C"

Prevalence of and control over Infectious & Other Diseases.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES -

During the year 4 cases of Diphtheria and 15 cases of Measles were notified in the Rural Area; and 2 cases of Pneumonia (both of whom died) and 2 cases of Measles were notified in Pernal C.P. Several Swabs were submitted to the new Pathological Laboratory opened by the Ministry of Health at Aberystwyth. In every case submitted to them for examination, the result, if positive, was communicated to me within 24 hours after the despatch of the swab, as compared with 48 hours which usually elapsed before getting results when swabs were sent to Manchester.

TUBERCULOSIS.

It is regrettable that this year the Rural District failed to keep up its proud position of Nil deaths from Tuberculosis. There were two such deaths but one of these was notified within a few weeks after coming to live here, and must have been infected before he came.

Pernal also lost its record of 10 years without a death from Tuberculosis. But the deceased person was 77 years of age and had suffered from Bronchitis for many years. Such cases afford no criterion of the extent of the disease.
