FOR THE YEAR 1955.

To the Chairman and Members of the Council,

Mr. Chairman, Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my annual report for the year 1955.

During the last year, there has been a decrease in the number of births registered as compared with the figures for the preceding four years.

The death rate shows an increase on previous years but the present figure (16.0 per 1,000 population) compares favourably with the figure for the County of Anglesey. Of the causes of death the major contributing group was that associated with the heart and vascular lesions of the nervous system. There were no maternal deaths and no deaths occurred due to Respiratory Tuberculosis. Only one new case of tuberculosis was notified during the year.

From the table of infectious diseases, it will be noted that there was an epidemic of measles during the year. One case of paratyphoid and two cases of dysentery were notified.

The sanitary condition of the district, as reported by the Public Health Inspector appears satisfactory, but there are still overcrowded families living in substandard dwellings who must be considered for rehousing.

In conclusion, I would like to thank you, Mr. Chairman, for your interest, and the Clerk and Public Health Inspector for their co-operation and help.

DRAINAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

The town sewage is disposed of direct to sea by four outfalls, the Main outfall being 2ft in diameter and the other three 9inches.

During the year a 9" sewer was laid to the new houses at Tyddyn To and further extension of 9" pipes at Cae Tros Lon.

No major schemes or improvements are contemplated at present.

All built up areas are connected to the main sewer but in the outlying areas there are:-

- 16 houses with septic tanks
- 16 houses with dry closets.

All refuse bins are collected weekly and the arrangements with Beaumeris Corporation regarding the combined use of refuse lorry is working satisfactorily. The refuse tip at Refail Newydd is constantly receiving attention.
