I have the honour to submit the Annual Report for the year ended 31st December, 1966.

Once again the Registrar General's estimation of the population decreased, though ot as sharply as formerly, the number being 120.

There were 11 fewer live births a decrease less marked than in the previous year hen the figure was 75. The number of births has now reverted almost to the level of en years ago as may be seen in Table 1V of the report.

The number of domiciliary births was 18, the lowest yet recorded. Though the actual onfinements did not take place at home, domiciliary midwives are responsible for much nte-natal supervision, and for the care of early discharges from hospital, the number f which is increasing. The Council has decided that midwives should attend consultant nits, in order to keep abreast with delivery techniques, in addition to the statutory effective courses.

Still-births at 3 were 8 fewer, while there were 3 more early neo-natal deaths. The erinatal mortality rate was therefore reduced from 23.38 to 14.62. The causes of death a the neo-nates were due to developmental defects, and not as was formerly the case by affection. This is also reflected in the survivors, and out of every 1,000 babies born live 30 are malformed about a quarter of whom die in the first year of life. The revention of this situation, and the early detection of defects is now a very important ield of work in public health.

An epidemic of measles was carried over from the previous year occurred in 1966, here is still some controversy over the efficacy of general vaccination against this isease, although for "at risk" children it is of value. These cases may be immunised their own practitioners to whom vaccine is available. In view of this, and of the midance given by the Ministry of Health, the Authority has decided that as yet it will at amend its scheme for immunisation.

There was a substantial fall in the number of notifications of Tuberculosis. The umber of cases on the register again decreased this year by 34.

There was an increase of 45 in the number of deaths. The general pattern of causes f death were much the same as in previous years. The number of deaths from cancer was me more than in the previous year. In this category, cancer of the stomach were 2 fewer ad cancer of the lung 4 more than previously.

The demands on the domestic help service was substantially similar - the number f cases being exactly the same as in the previous year, although the distribution in the ifferent categories except for those aged over 65, was slightly different.

Once again there was a substantial increase in the number of patients carried by the abulance Service. In spite of this, however, the number of journeys, and the total ileage involved in carrying them out, was less than in the previous year.

I wish to thank the County Council members and especially the members of the Health ommittee for their support and encouragement. I am grateful to the General Practitioners ther County Council Departments, voluntary workers and members of my Department for their elpful co-operation.

Mothercraft Classes

Mothercraft Classes are held at Blaenau Ffestiniog weekly, and the Health Visitor takes charge of these classes. These classes have proved very popular and during the year 51 patients made 208 attendances.

Family Planning Clinics

The Family Planning Association continues to hold clinics at Blaenau Ffestiniog and Dolgellau, and the County Council provides accommodation, free of charge, for the clinic at Blaenau Ffestiniog. An annual financial contribution is given to both these clinics by the County Council.

The clinics are held at :-

Dolgellau Hospital 2nd Wednesday and 4th Mondays in the month from 2 - 4 p.m.

Isallt Clinic, Bl. Ffestiniog lst and 3rd Tuesday in the month from 6 - 7 p.m. 2nd and 4th Wednesday in the month from 2 - 3 p.m.

During the year, the Blaenau Ffestiniog Family Planning Clinic initiated a cervical cytology service, and specimens for testing for an indication of early cancer of the cervix were taken at this clinic. It is hoped that two further clinics will be in operation in the near future.

Child Welfare Clinics

There were fourteen Child Welfare Clinics in the County, and there was a total of 239 sessions held at these clinics during the year. The Local Medical Practitioners act as Medical Officers for these Clinics except at Abergynolwyn, where the Assistant Medical Officer of Health attends. The attendances at all Infant Welfare Clinics throughout the County continue to be good, and a total of 1061 children attended during the year. Table XVII gives the number of children who attended each clinic.

Congenital Malformations

The County Council is required to submit monthly returns to the Registrar General reporting all congenital abnormalities in live and still births observed in new-born babies. This information is sent to the Local Health Authority by the Hospital Consultants, Doctor or Midwife.

Care of Unmarried Mothers and their children

All unmarried expectant mothers are brought to my notice by the Health Visitors, District Nurses and Midwives, and arrangements are made for the admission of the patient to Bersham Hall, Wrexham, which is a Home for Unmarried Mothers. If the child is to be placed for adoption, the mother is advised to contact the Secretary of the Bangor Diocesan Council for Moral Welfare which is a registered Adoption Society. The child then comes under the supervision of the Children's Officer, and reports are submitted regularly by the Health Visitor. Five unmarried expectant mothers were admitted to Bersham Hall during the year.

The illegitimate birth rate for the County in 1966 was 71.29 per 1,000 total live and still births.

Dental Care of Mothers and Young Children

It is not generally known in the County that free dental advice and treatment is available at the dental clinics for expectant and nursing mothers, and pre-school children. Now that the dental staffing position is better, fuller use might be made of the facilities provided.

Advantage has always been taken of offering dental advice to mothers when attending the clinics. When pre-school children accompany their clder brother/sister to the clinic they are encouraged to have a ride in the chair, to play with hand instruments and in general to "condition" themselves for future treatment. I consider this to be well worthwhile although to a certain extent time consuming.

Distribution of Welfare Foods

Welfare Foods (National Dried Milk, Cod Liver Oil, Orange Juice and A. & D. Tablets) are distributed at Welfare Clinics and at other centres in the County. This work is carried out by voluntary workers and the help given by them is greatly appreciated.

The total quantities of Welfare Foods distributed during the year is shown in the following table, together with the figures for the previous year. As will be noted there is quite a decrease in the sale of all these foods during the year.

At the majority of Infant Welfare Centres in the County, special brand baby foods are also available for sale to parents who have been advised to obtain a particular food for an infant. These foods are supplied in special clinic packs at a reduced cost to which is added a small charge to cover administrative costs.

MIDWIFERY

The Midwifery and Maternity work was carried out by seventeen Full-time District Nurses/Midwives assisted by two Part-time Relief Nurses/Midwives. The number of cases delivered at home decreased to eighteen during the year. 242 Cases delivered in Maternity Hospitals and Maternity Homes discharged home before the 10th day were attended by the District Nurses/Midwives. The number of visits paid to such cases were 963. The Midwives accompanied 92 cases to Maternity Hospitals in the Ambulances.

Maternity Outfits were issued, free of charge, to domiciliary midwives and 41 were issued during the year.

The Deputy Non-Medical Supervisor of Midwives also attended a Midwifery Refresher Course in London.

Four Midwives attended Refresher Courses during the year.

HEALTH VISITING

The Health Visiting duties were carried out by five Full-time Health Visitors and nine District Nurses/Midwives/Health Visitors, who carried out 8384 visits in the homes to all categories of cases. The scope of the Health Visitor as a Health Teacher and qualifi Social Worker is expanding as the care of the family as an unit is emphasised.

Many talks on health and allied subjects have been given by the Health Visitors to Women's Institutes, Mothers Unions, British Red Cross Society branches and films have been shown.

Mothercraft classes and discussions have been arranged at the County Council, Genera Practitioners and at a hospital clinic. The formation of Mothers or Young Wives Clubs ha been approved by the County Council. It is hoped to start on these projects during the coming year.

The Health Visitors co-operate with the Family Planning Clinics. Talks and films dealing with this matter was attended by the Health Visitors during the year.

Miss M. Wynne Evans, the Deputy Superintendent Nursing Officer attended the Annual Conference on Maternal and Child Welfare in London in July. One Health Visitor attended a Course on Audiology and Education of the Deaf at Manchester University in March and a short Course on Hearing Testing Techniques held at the Institute of Laryngology and Otology. University of London in November.

Phenylketonuria

Health Visitors undertook the routine testing of babies for phenylketonuria This is a disease which affects the brain at a very early age and if left undiagnoso and untreated, gives rise to severe mental abnormality. No case was discovered di the year.

HOME NURSING

The County is divided into fourteen districts served by twenty-one Nurses during the year. Ten were engaged in combined work - Home Nursing, Midwifery/Maternity and Health Visiting. Six were engaged in combined duties of Home Nursing and Midwifery/Maternity. Three carried out General Nursing only. The service is staffed by a good percentage of highly qualified Nurses.

During the year 1828 cases were attended to which 37,841 visits were paid. A high proportion of the work consisted of general nursing of the elderly and long-term illness and Hypodermic Injections.

No nurse attended a Refresher Course during the year, but several talks were given in conjunction with the Merioneth Branch of the Royal College of Nursing.

Several Nurses gave talks on Home Nursing, Safety in the Home, and films provided by the department were shown to Women's Institutes, British Red Cross Classes and Mother's Union.

Inco-Pads for the use of incontinent patients were in great demand by the Nurses during the year and minimised the work of the Nurses and relatives particularly where laundry facilities were difficult.

One State Registered Nurse/Midwife was sponsored for District Training during the year.

HOME HELP SERVICE

The Home Help Service has been provided as in previous years under the supervision of the Superintendent Nursing Officer and Deputy Superintendent Nursing Officer acting as Home Help Organisers, with the occasional assistance of the Health Visitors and District Nurse/Midwives when required, supported administratively by the Clerical Staff. The Home Helps have given invaluable service during the year.

The case-load and type of cases assisted has remained much the same as in previous years with the emphasis on the elderly, infirm and long-term illness. The Home Helps are all engaged on a part-time basis involving much work in recruitment, organisation and supervision. This is off-balanced by the considerable help that the service affords those in need and by the fact that many are able to enjoy the comfort of their home surroundings, and by the gratitude of the recipients. From the Officers and staff point of view the "job satisfaction" is most rewarding.

There has been seasonable and temporary difficulty of recruitment in some areas, but every effort is made to ensure that no real hardship has occurred. There is a small percentage of cases where difficulty has arisen owing to the temperament of the applicant.

Transport problems have been overcome by the provision of taxi service or the use of the Home Help's own car where absolutely necessary.

It was not possible to commence in-service training during the year, but it is hoped to include this in the near future.

Mrs. E. Owen, the Home Help Organiser attended a Refresher Course for Home Help Organisers during the year.

General

Each year since the 1959 Mental Health Act came into force has brought increasing recognition of the need for Local Health Authorities to provide hostels, training centres and the qualified staff to provide the community care for mentally ill and subnormal persons as envisaged in the Act. The emphasis on care in the Mental Health field is moving from the hospital to the community and this is reflected in the increasing number of psychiatric patients who are cared for in their own homes without being admitted to a psychiatric hospital. It is also reflected in the increase of training and care of subnormal and mentally ill people in local authority training centres and hostels, and in the number of both mentally ill and subnormal patients who, after very often almost a lifetime in hospital, are now being discharged into the care of the local authority mental health services

This authority has recognised the need for trained and qualified staff from the beginning and has undertaken secondment of staff to suitable courses wherever possible, two persons having been seconded to courses for teachers of mentally handicapped children and two to train as Social Workers. In addition it was handicapped this year, that a member of the staff be seconded for agreed in principle this year, that a member of the staff be seconded for training as a supervisor for an adult training centre when this course becomes available.

Unfortunately for the first six months of the year, following the resignation of the previous worker, we were without the services of a qualified Mental Health Worker, and this is reflected in the statistics by a considerable drop in the number of patients visited and referral to the department. Routine and emergency visiting was ably carried out by the Welfare Assistant, but a small service like this is severely handicapped by the loss of one worker.

A qualified social worker who had been seconded for training by the authority, was appointed Mental Health Worker in July and the service came slowly back to normal as contact was re-established with hospitals and doctors. This resulted in an increasing number of referrals to the department from all sources by the end of the year.

Junior Training Centre

The Junior Training Centre at Barmouth continued to operate very successfully throughout the year. At the suggestion of the Supervisor a bath was installed, and the end of the year a classroom adjoining the present Centre was decorated and made ready for use so that the children might be split into two groups for play and teaching purposes. A new appointment to the staff of part-time caretaker/cleaner was also made.

We were unfortunate to lose the services of the Supervisor who resigned on the 4th January, to take up another appointment. The Assistant Supervisor, who has previously been seconded for training by the Authority and obtained her Diploma the previous year, was appointed in her place, and a qualified infants teacher was appointed as Assistant Supervisor.

The Authority reviewed the staffing of the Centre and decided to appoint a trainee supervisor to second for suitable training. This was done, the trainee appointed was accepted by the college for training, and began her two year course for teachers of Mentally Handicapped Children at the College of Commerce in Cardif in September. The Assistant Supervisor resigned in July and an unqualified but experienced woman was appointed temporary Assistant Supervisor for a period of two years.

The Consultant in Subnormality visited the Centre during the year to examine children, and to discuss with parents the development and future prospects of their children.

There were six children attending the Centre at the end of the year and it was hoped that three more would be starting soon. Three children who had previously been attending were resident in the special children's unit at Eryri Hospital. These children are undergoing special training and assessment and will return home to attend the Centre in due course.

Mentally Subnormal

A well equipped and staffed Junior Training Centre catered for most of the mentally subnormal children of school age, and in cases of special difficulty arrangements were made for some children to attend special units in hospitals. Pre-school age children were referred to the Consultant in Subnormality for assessment, and their parents were visited by members of the department for guidance and support.

Friendly supervision and support was continued for mentally subnormal adults, most of whom are quite well integrated into the community, many doing simple work on farms. The generally increasing level of unemployment however made the task of finding suitable sheltered employment for these handicapped people much more difficult, and underlined the need for a Senior Training Centre or sheltered workshop within the fairly near future. This need is further endorsed by the discharge from hospital of mentally subnormal adults who are considered to be no longer in need of hospital care. These, in many cases, have been in hospital since youth, are thoroughly institutionalised, and are difficult to integrate once more into what has become over the years a strange, and in many cases estranged, family and community environment.

Some cases of severe subnormality are cared for at home and require extensive support and often utilisation of several branches of the statutory and voluntary social services. In some cases where the need has arisen it has been possible to arrange short-term accommodation in hospital.

Mentally Ill

Referrals of mentally ill people come into the department from a variety of sources, but mainly from hospital psychiatrists following the patients' discharge from hospital, or attendance at out-patients' clinic. These are usually individuals and their families who require case-work help with the emotional and material problems underlying or attendant upon their illness. In many cases it is possible by attendance at out-patients' clinic and close co-operation between psychiatrist and community services, to treat the patient without the need for hospital admission. Where there is need for admission, the vast majority of patients are now admitted informally and only in a very few cases is compulsory admission found to be necessary.

The problem of finding suitable, or indeed, any employment for mentally ill people is, as in the case of the mentally subnormal, an increasing one in spite of close co-operation from the local offices of the Ministry of Labour and the Group Disablement Resettlement Officer. In some suitable cases the authority arranges for admission to a Flintshire Hostel where the patient can live and go out to work until he or she can be found lodgings. There are however a few cases who would benefit from the opportunity offered by a local sheltered workshop.

There was continuing close liaison with the Consultant for Subnormality, the North Wales Hospital, Denbigh, the North Wales Child Guidance Service, General Practitioners, and other statutory and voluntary Health and Welfare agencies.

Tuberculosis

There was a decrease in the number of cases notified during the year as compared to the previous year, and there is also a considerable decrease in the number of cases on the register at the end of the year. Where necessary, and on the advice of the Chest Physician, the Local Health Authority will provide Tuberculosis patients with extra nourishment. These patients are visited regularly by the Health Visitor, and given advice as to contacts and preventive measures which should be taken. B.C.G. Vaccination

The B.C.G. Vaccination scheme for the thirteen year age group continued to make good progress.

The more forceful policy in getting acceptances introduced last year, has been followed and a greater number of children were vaccinated than in 1965. The number and proportion of positive reactors has fallen and this is a good indication that Tuberculosis is being brought under control although much more work is required before it is eliminated. The number of positive reactors found by the Chest Physician would also appear to be falling.

The Chest Physicians carry cut B.C.G. Vaccination of child contacts of Tuberculosis patients. 105 children were skin tested by them during the year of whom 40 proved positive. Of the 65 who proved negative 60 were successfully vaccinated.

Chiropody Service

The Council's scheme, which was taken over from the Merioneth Rural Community Council in 1960 continued to function well. At the end of the year, four part-time Chiropodists were employed - the ones in the Northern and Southern parts of the County being directly employed by the County Council, and the Chiropodist for the Eastern part of the County through the agency of the Merioneth Rural Community Council.

The following groups are entitled to take advantage of the service :-

- a) Old Age Pensioners
- b) Expectant Mothers
- c) Physically Handicapped Persons.

Domiciliary visits were also paid to certain patients whose medical practitiohers certify that chiropody treatment must be provided in the patient's home because they are medically unfit to attend a clinic. This treatment is given at no extra cost to the patient.
