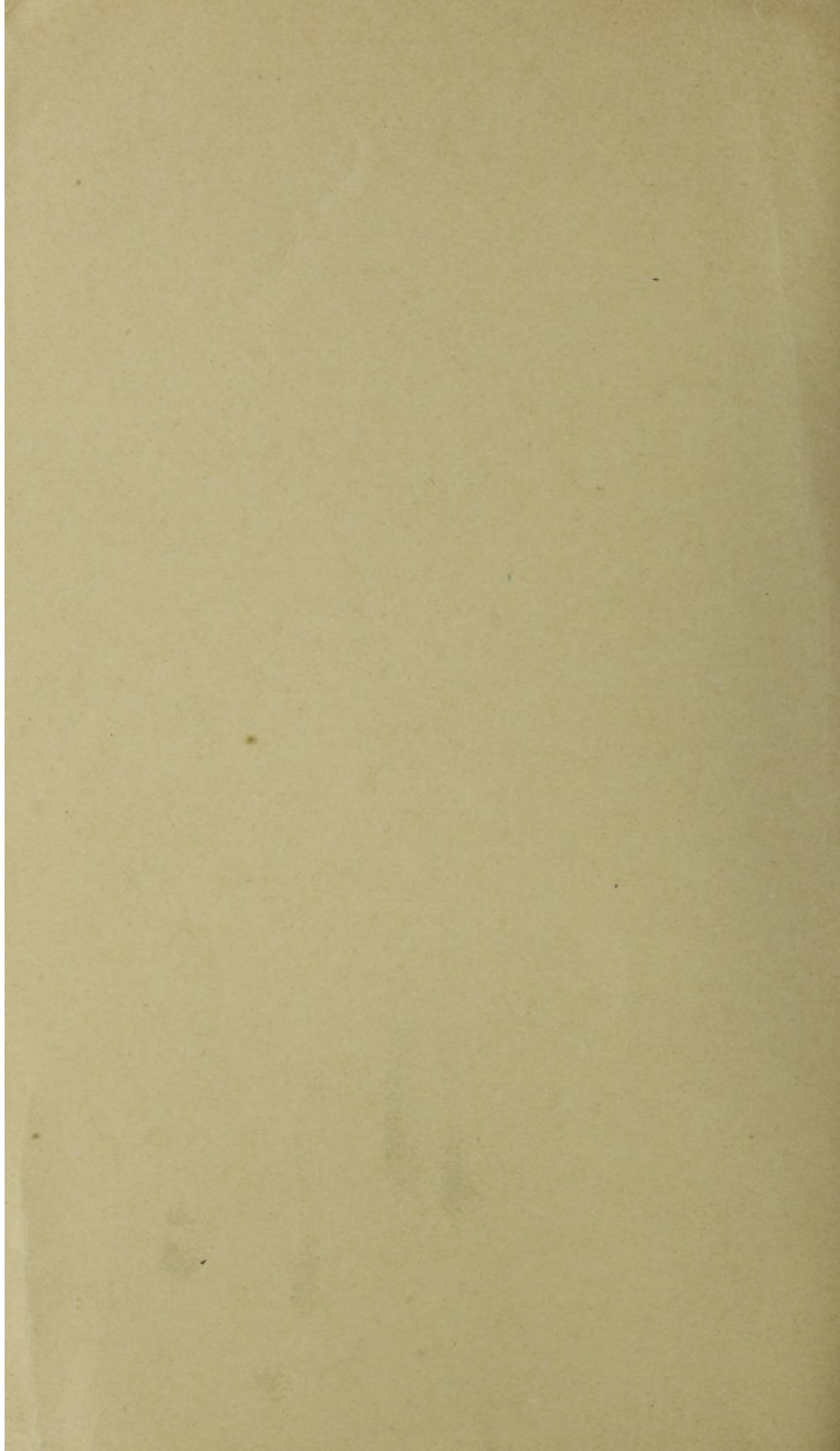

The present refuse tip is nearing the end of its life. Thinking in terms of 5 - 10 years ahead, preliminary steps require to be taken for an alternative tip, or an alternative method of disposal.

There has been no evidence of any serious degree of Air Pollution during the year. Reference, however, has been made to the rather high ratio of Respiratory Cancer deaths. Further study in the relation of these statistics is required before any conclusion is reached.

The excellent housing programme of the Council has resulted in a large proportion of the community enjoying a high standard of living. There are still a few problem families, but time and patience are gradually reducing difficulties involved.
