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


Chairman and Members of the Montgomery County Council.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for 1957. The work of the Council's Health Department continues to increase in all sections.

VITAL STATISTICS: (pages 1 and 16-20)

Population: The Registrar General's estimate of the population for mid-1957 at 44,930 shows a very slight decrease over 1956 and is the lowest population for the County since 1945 (44,680).

Births: There were 684 live births during the year (15.22 per 1,000 population.) From 1941 to 1947 there was a general tendency towards an increase in the number of births each year, but since then the number has tended to decline. The provisional Birth Rate for England and Wales during 1957 was 16.1 per 1,000 population.

Infantile Mortality Rate (i.e. deaths of infants under one year of age per 1,000 live births.) (pages 2 and 3.)

During 1957 fifteen infants died before reaching one year of age, giving an Infantile Mortality Rate of 21.93 per 1,000 live births as compared with a Rate of 23 for England and Wales. The Rates for this County and for the country as a whole are the lowest ever recorded, and it is encouraging to note that the County Rate is lower than the national figure. It is interesting to note that the Infantile Mortality Rate has been decreasing since the beginning of this century. The Rate for the whole of Wales was 28.

Neo-natal Mortality Rate. (page 3)

Of the 684 infants born alive during the year, 13 died within 4 weeks of birth, giving a neo-natal mortality rate of 19.0 per 1,000 live births (1956 rate - 23.7). Two infants only died after reaching 4 weeks and before reaching 12 months of age.

Stillbirths.

There were 26 stillbirths during the year, giving a Stillbirth Rate of 0.58 per 1,000 population. Stillbirths per 1,000 total live and stillbirths were 37. The number of stillbirths in 1956 was 12 giving a Stillbirth Rate of 0.27. The marked reduction in the Infantile Mortality Rate during the past 50 years has been confined mainly to the saving of infants after the first week of age. There were no stillbirths to unmarried mothers and of the 23 illegitimate births, all survived to one year of age.

General Mortality (page 2 and 16-20)

There were 531 deaths from all causes during the year giving a Crude Death Rate of 11.82 per 1,000 population. It will be appreciated that the Death Rate of a community depends to some extent on the age constitution of that community, e.g. a community with a larger proportion of old people should have a higher Death Rate, everything else being equal, than another community with a smaller proportion of old people. In order to use Death Rates as an indication of health conditions in a community, it is necessary to take into account the proportion of people in all age groups in the community. The Registrar General has provided a "comparability factor" for the Crude Death Rate in this County. When this factor is applied to the Crude Death Rate of 11.82 per 1,000 population, a Death Rate of 10.75 is obtained, with a Death Rate of 11.5 for England and Wales. This Death Rate of 10.75 is the lowest ever recorded for this County.

The chief cause of death was heart disease, including coronary disease (58 cases), hypertension with heart disease (16 cases) and other heart disease (102 cases.)

While the Death Rate tends to fall and the expectation of life is increasing, it should be appreciated that the proportion of elderly people is increasing, and this factor alone will result in an increased proportion of deaths due to diseases to which the elderly are more prone. This is a factor in the apparent increase in the incidence of Cancer and deaths therefrom.

The Medical Research Council has recently reported a very great increase in deaths from lung cancer in males during the past 25 years, and that although a proportion of these cases can be attributed to specific industrial hazards and may be due, in industrial and large urban areas, to atmospheric pollution, evidence from different countries indicates that a major part of the increase is associated with tobacco smoking, particularly in the form of cigarettes. Action is being taken to bring this information to adolescents and young adults.

Maternal Mortality.

There was no death during the year due to pregnancy, childbirth, etc.

Accidents.

There were 7 fatal accidents in connection with motor vehicles, but there were 9 fatal accidents of other kinds. It has been pointed out that there are more fatal accidents in the home, which affect particularly young children and the elderly, than there are road accidents. One death is attributed to "Homicide and operations of war" in the tabulated Causes of Death. This was due to late effects of war gas in World War I.

General advice regarding the Prevention of Accidents in the home is given by Health Visitors and District Nurses when making their routine visits to homes. Posters are being displayed at the Infant Welfare Centres.

Vaccination and Immunisation (pages 6-8)

Vaccination against Smallpox.

Vaccination against smallpox is carried out in this County mainly by general medical practitioners. The proportion of children being vaccinated against smallpox is increasing steadily, but it is impossible to obtain an accurate record at any given time, as some General Medical Practitioners are tardy in submitting their records of vaccination. The Council pays a fee of five shillings for each record of vaccination and steps have been taken to encourage practitioners to submit their records within a reasonable time.

Advice is given to parents by Health Visitors and District Nurses and the need for vaccination and immunisation is stressed.

Immunisation against Diphtheria.

Immunisation against diphtheria is carried out mainly by the Council's own Medical Officers, although this may be done by General Medical Practitioners. The proportion of children being so immunised remains high. It will be noted on page 6 that there has been no case of diphtheria or death therefrom in the County since 1947.

Immunisation against Whooping Cough.

Immunisation against whooping cough is offered but not pressed. In many cases it has been given combined with diphtheria prophylactic. If these antigens are given separately, at least 2 injections must be given against diphtheria and at least 3 against whooping cough, making a total of 5 injections in all. If they are combined, the number of injections can be reduced to 3. There are, however, several objections to using the combined prophylactic and the future tendency will be to use them separately.

Poliomyelitis Vaccination.

By the end of the year vaccination had been practically completed of those children born between 1st January 1947 and 31st December 1954 whose parents had agreed to vaccination.

Late in 1957 the Ministry extended their arrangements to include all children over 6 months old born subsequent to 1st January 1943, expectant mothers and doctors and their families. The acceptance rate for these classes has been very high and during 1958 very good progress has been made in the vaccination programme.

Epidemiology. (pages 8-10)

There was again a considerable epidemic of measles during the year. Of the 468 cases notified, 224 were in the Llanfyllin Rural District, 85 in Llanfyllin Borough and 82 in the Fforden Rural District. There was, unfortunately, one death from measles.

There were also 41 cases of whooping cough, mainly in the Fforden and Llanfyllin Rural Districts.

Five cases of poliomyelitis were notified, with one fatal case in the Machynlleth Rural District.

Tuberculosis. (pages 8 and 9)

There has been a very remarkable reduction in the deaths from tuberculosis during the past 50 years, and the reduction has been even more remarkable in the past 10 years. During 1957 there were 4 deaths from tuberculosis in Montgomeryshire, all due to respiratory tuberculosis. This gives a Tuberculosis Death Rate of 89 per million population.

The following table provides evidence of the remarkable reduction in the Tuberculosis Death Rate referred to above :-

The mortality of a chronic disease such as tuberculosis is not a sound indication of the incidence of the disease, because of the time lag between infection and death, and because improved treatment has lessened the proportion of cases which die. Nevertheless it is apparent that remarkable success has been achieved in recent years in the prevention of tuberculosis. The following table shows the actual number of new cases notified and deaths registered from pulmonary and non-pulmonary tuberculosis since 1938:-

The number of new cases of pulmonary tuberculosis rose remarkably during the war and post-war years, but since then there has been a marked reduction in the number of cases notified. The reduction in the number of non-pulmonary tuberculosis cases notified is even more marked, probably due to the improvement of milk production, particularly "Tuberculin Tested" milk and "Pasteurised" milk.

Whenever a new case of tuberculosis is notified, a visit to the home is made by the Health Visitor who endeavours to trace the source of infection and to persuade every member of the household to visit the Chest Physician's Clinic, with a view to discovering any source of infection in the household or any secondary cases of infection from the notified patient.

The Chest Physicians' Clinics are attended by the Health Visitors

concerned who can advise the Chest Physician on the home environment, sanitary conditions, etc. and who can be instructed by the Chest Physician with a view to advising members of the household on the prevention of spread of infection.

Maternity and Midwifery Services (pages 3 and 4.)

The number of women confined in hospital continues to increase - 527 in 1957 - as compared with 166 women confined at home. The Home Help Service can and is playing an important part by caring for the rest of the family when the mother is being confined.

Maternity outfits are distributed by the District Nurse-Midwives for domiciliary confinements. Gas and air analgesia was administered to 110 patients in their own homes during 1957, and pethidine was administered to 74 patients. The Superintendent Nursing Officer continues to act as Non-medical Supervisor of Midwives and carries out regular inspections of all midwives in the County who have notified their intention to practice, including those midwives employed in the local hospitals. Three unmarried mothers were admitted to Bersham Hall during the year. No cases of ophthalmia neonatorum were notified during the year.

Ante-natal and post natal clinics are conducted by general medical practitioners, either in the local hospitals or in the patients' homes. The district nurse-midwives carry out ante-natal examinations of expectant mothers, who have not booked a doctor, in their own homes.

Arrangements have been made with Drs.J.J.O'Dwyer and S.H.Dallas to hold their ante-natal clinics at the Council's Clinic in Newtown. These Clinics are staffed by the doctors themselves and hospital and domiciliary midwives. It is hoped that similar arrangements might be made at some of the other Clinics in the County.

Home Nursing: (page 1)

The nursing of the chronic sick and elderly continues to form a large part of the nurses' work - 599 patients were over the age of 65 years at the time of the first visit during the year and a total of 11590 visits were paid to these patients. Close liaison is still being maintained by both the nursing and home help staff. Many of these chronic sick patients are nursed at home, although these conditions and home circumstances are such that admission to hospital would be advisable. This is due to the continued shortage of hospital accommodation for the chronic sick.

Nursing appliances which may be loaned to patients are available, and such articles as mackintosh sheeting, bed pans, urinals, backrests, and air cushions form part of the nurses' equipment. Further supplies are available from the British Red Cross Society and the St.John Ambulance Brigade. I should like to take this opportunity of thanking the officers of both these organisations for their continued and valuable assistance at all times.

The proportion of injection work continues to vary. The analysis shows the type of injection given, the number of cases and the total number of injections given.

No special arrangements are made for the nursing of sick children at home, but children discharged from hospital are referred to the County Health Department by the Almoner for special supervision.

Dental Services:

It has still not been possible for the Council to provide a priority dental service for expectant and nursing mothers and pre-school children. Such a service could not be provided at present without seriously affecting the School Dental Service.

Post Graduate Courses:

Five district nurse-midwives attended approved refresher courses for midwives.

Child Welfare:

Reference has already been made to the remarkable reduction in infantile mortality during the past 50 years, but it is apparent that increased attention will have to be given to the causes of peri-natal mortality, i.e. stillbirths and deaths during the first week of life.

Infant Welfare Centres:

Two new Clinics came into use at the beginning of this year at Machynlleth and Llanfyllin. These premises have been very well adapted from schools and greatly improve the facilities available for infant welfare work. The new premises are much appreciated by the medical and nursing staff and also by the mothers attending these clinics. Another centre was inaugurated at Llanfair Caereinion in October.

The voluntary workers play an important part in the running of the Infant Welfare Clinics and I should like to take this opportunity of thanking them for their valuable assistance.

Home Help Service:

Care of the aged is becoming an increasing factor of this service. Part-time help for old people, which enables them to stay in their own homes, covers approximately 80% of the help given. For this purpose a number of part-time workers are employed as, in view of the difficulties of rural travelling, it is usually more convenient to employ one woman for one or two cases near her own home. Resident helps are employed for family cases, and occasionally for the chronic sick, where daily help cannot be provided.

Welfare Foods:

The arrangements made for the distribution of welfare foods in 1954, following the transfer of this work to the County Council from the Ministry of Food, have continued in the main throughout 1957. The Council will appreciate that the local distribution has been carried out mainly by the voluntary organisation, such as the British Red Cross Society, and a large number of individuals in many cases since the transfer to the County Council in 1954. The local distribution involves regular attendance at specified hours at a distribution centre, the receipt of welfare foods, the cancellation of coupons and receipt of payments in stamps, together with meticulous book-keeping. But for the very willing co-operation which has been received throughout these years from those volunteers, the Council would be involved in considerably increased expenditure. I, personally, am very grateful for this voluntary co-operation.

A number of commercial taxi owners undertake this Service at the same mileage rates as the volunteer car drivers.

It is a pleasure to record my thanks to the numerous voluntary organisations and individuals, including the County Branch of the British Red Cross Society, the St. John Ambulance Divisions, the R.V.S., the two Chest Physicians and the Heads of Departments of the County Council, and particularly to the staff of the County Health Department for their co-operation throughout the year.

One hundred and seventyfive samples were purchased during the year. 144 were samples of milk and 31 were samples of miscellaneous articles of food.

The action taken with regard to milk samples found to be "not genuine" is given under:

Sample No. 70. Benjamin Corfield, Cunroog Dairy, Welshpool, was prosecuted for selling milk containing added water and was convicted. He was fined £10 and ordered to pay £2:2:0 costs.

With regard to the remaining samples of milk found to be "not genuine" by reason of deficiency in fat, no further action was advisable. Where the solids-not-fat were below standard no further action was possible as there was no evidence of added water being present.
