**ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1950
of the Medical Officer of Health.**

*To the Chairman and Members
of the Nantyglo and Blaina Urban District Council.*

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

The Annual Report for the year 1950 has been prepared to conform with Articles 6 (3) and 17 (5) of the Sanitary Officers (Outside London) Regulations 1935 and also in accordance with circular 2/50 (Wales d/d 25.130) of the Ministry of Health (Welsh Board of Health).

Prior to January, 1950, the Urban District of Nantyglo and Blaina was served by a part-time Medical Officer, but on January 1st, 1950, a full-time Medical Officer of Health was appointed to act as District Medical Officer to the combined Nantyglo and Blaina and Abertillery Urban Districts, and as Area Medical Officer to No. 5 Area under the Local Health Authority, which is the Monmouthshire County Council. This appointment also included the duties of School Medical Officer under the Divisional Executive for the same area.

The Medical Officer's time was apportioned as follows :

4/11ths to Abertillery Urban District.

2/11ths to Nantyglo and Blaina Urban District.

5/11ths to the Monmouthshire County Council.

In his capacity as District Medical Officer of Health he became responsible for the environmental hygiene of the combined areas, whilst as Area Medical Officer he became responsible for the decentralised Health and School Medical Services of the Local Health Authority, under the direction of the County Medical Officer of Health, Monmouthshire.

Before commencing my Report, I would like to pay tribute to my predecessor, Dr. F. M. Wallen-Gunn, who was part-time Medical Officer of Health for this district for twenty-two years prior to my appointment.

There can be no doubt that Dr. Wallen-Gunn did a tremendous amount of excellent work as Medical Officer; this can be seen in view of the fact that during her twenty-two years service there were very few outbreaks of epidemic infectious disease in this district. This is a credit to her. I would say that the records which Dr. Wallen-Gunn left have been of the greatest value to me.

At the time of writing I understand that Dr. Wallen-Gunn is retiring from her position as a Medical Practitioner. I would like to take this opportunity of wishing her a very long and happy retirement.

SANITARY INSPECTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT.

*To the Chairman and Members of the Nantyglo and
Blaina Urban District Council.*

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting to you my Annual Report for the year ended December 31st, 1950.

WATER SUPPLY.

The water supply of this district is supplied by the Ebbw Vale Urban District Council. The surface reservoir is situated at Llangynidr Mountain.

The water is chlorinated and is filtered by slow sand filters. During the first part of the year the supply of water to some parts of the district was very unsatisfactory, but during the last few months the pressure did slightly improve. Each day the water has to be turned off in the lower part of the area to allow a supply to the upper part of the district.

Due to the turning off, and the softness of the water, service pipes become corroded in a much less time than if conditions were normal.

The Council have taken all possible steps to improve the matter, and have a scheme prepared by Sir Alexander Gibb and Partners. Work will be commenced as soon as the necessary materials are available.

Swimming Bath—At present there are no publicly or privately owned swimming baths in the area.

During the summer months the ponds in the district are still used, in spite of the fact that they are dangerous and are quite unfit to be used as swimming pools.

Drainage—Drainage—Sewerage is on the water carriage system. The subsidiary sewers are connected up with the Western Valley (Mon.) Main Trunk Sewer, which discharges into the sea at low water west of the mouth of the river Usk.

The sewers are in quite good condition, but there are a few lengths which should be relaid, due to insufficient gradient, such as portions of the sewer at Winchestown, Nantyglo and Surgery Road, Blaina.

Public Cleansing—Public cleansing and refuse collection is controlled by the Council's Engineer and Surveyor.

Refuse is deposited at the Boot Tip site, Nantyglo, and at the lower end of the Duffryn Park, Blaina. Controlled tipping is exercised at both sites.

Although there is a collection of refuse three times a week, householders in the area, despite warning, still deposit their refuse on open spaces near their homes. This, in my opinion, will not be remedied until there is more co-operation between all concerned, and each householder has a suitable covered dustbin for the storage of domestic refuse prior to collection.

Housing still remains a very major problem in this district. During the last few years many of the occupiers of dwelling

houses in the area have become owner occupiers, and in many cases have carried out essential repairs, in order that they may become reasonably habitable. It will be realised that many of these houses fall short of the present standards, but unless extensive structural alterations are carried out it is impossible to reach present-day housing standards.

Unfortunately we still have houses or blocks of houses such as Humphrey Hughes', parts of Solomon's Tump, and back-to-back houses which are in a deplorable and unsatisfactory state of repair. The tenants in the majority of these cases do not pay any rent, only rates, and it is difficult to get even the minimum of essential repairs carried out.

Since the war, tenants for Council properties have in the main been taken from places where there are more than one family living in one house.

Personally I feel that the time has arrived when consideration should be given to the demolition of unfit houses in the area.

Council Houses—Repairs to these properties are carried out by the Surveyor's Department. During the year a major repair scheme was commenced.

SHOPS ACT, 1934.

No action has been found necessary during the year under provisions of the Shops Act, 1934, relating to the ventilation and temperature of the shops.

A part-time Shops Inspector officiates in the area.

MARINE STORES.

There are four registered Marine Stores in the district. These are inspected periodically. No rag flock is made or sold in the area.
