To the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee.

I have the honour to present my Annual Report as Medical Officer of Health for the year 1952.

The tables are self explanatory.

It will be seen that once again there have been no cases of Diphtheria notified annually.

These figures are proof of the efficacy of active immunisation combined with general public health measures. It is fervently hoped that similar results will be obtained with B.C.G. vaccination in the case of Tuberculosis.

Regarding Tuberculosis the Nantyglo and Blaina District is served by the Chest Clinic at Blaina Hospital held on Tuesdays. This clinic is for the clerical examination, X-raying skin testing of suspected cases and for the contacts of known cases.

All newly notified cases of Tuberculosis are visited by the Medical Officer of Health and Sanitary Inspector and a complete environmental report is sent to the County Medical Officer and the Chest Physician. Continual contact is made with the latter particularly where it is felt that bad housing conditions and other factors make it necessary for some cases to receive priority in admission to sanatoria. Where housing defects are found the Sanitary Inspector takes up the matter with the owner of such premises.

Advice is given on the Medical Officer's visit re prevention of spread of infection in the home and this is further enlarged by the visit of the Health Visitor.

The members of the household where a case has occurred are advised to attend the Chest clinic for skin test and X-ray.

The Public Health Department supplies a liberal quantity of disinfectant for use in cleaning sputum receptacles and infested linen of the patient and terminal disinfection is carried out by the Sanitary Inspector as required.

There is also the availability of skin testing of all children up to age 5 at the Infant Welfare Centres and it is hoped that in the very near future the same will be available for school children. This latter is available for school leavers and any suspicious case is referred after preliminary X-ray to the Chest Physician.

SANITARY IMPROVED ANNUAL REPORT

The Chairman and Members of the Nantyglo and Blaina Urban District Council.

Chairman & Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting to you my Annual Report for the period ended December 31st, 1928.

WATER SUPPLY.

The water supply of this district is supplied by the Nantyglo Urban District Council. The surface reservoir is situated at Llwynyddol, near the town. The water is chlorinated and is filtered by high speed filters.

I must express satisfaction at the work carried out generally in the Nantyglo and Blaina Urban District Area during the period covered by these reports, and take this opportunity of thanking Members of Council, fellow officials, and my Colleagues for generous co-operation.

SEWERAGE.

At present there are no publicly or privately owned sewers in the area.

During the summer months the ponds in the district are used for the disposal of the refuse which they are to receive and the water is to be used as manure.

SEWERAGE.

Effluent-coverage is on the water supply system. The effluent is discharged into the Nantyglo Valley (Nantyglo) at the town, which discharges into the sea at low water level the north of the river Nantyglo.

SANITARY INSPECTORS ANNUAL REPORT.

To the Chairman and Members of the Nantyglo and Blaina Urban District Council.

Mr. Chairman & Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting to you my Annual Report for the year ended December 31st, 1952.

Water Supply.

The water supply of this district is supplied by the Ebbw Vale District Council. The surface reservoir is situated at Llangynidr Mountain. The water is chlorinated and is filtered by slow sand filters.

The supply of water to some parts of the district is still not satisfactory. Each day the water has to be turned off in the lower part of the area to allow a supply to the upper part of the district.

Work has commenced on a scheme prepared by Sir Alexander Gibb and Partners. This scheme consists of renewal of most of the existing water mains and the construction of a service reservoir, and a break pressure tank. This work is now near completion.

SWIMMING BATH.

At present there are no publicly or privately owned swimming baths in the area.

During the summer months the ponds in the district are still used, in spite of the fact that they are dangerous and are quite unfit to be used as swimming pools.

DRAINAGE

Drainage-sewerage is on the water carriage system. The subsidiary sewers are connected up with the Western Valley (MON) Main Trunk Sewer, which discharges into the sea at low water west of the mouth of the river Usk.

I have pleasure in presenting to you my annual report for the year ended June 30, 1922.

WATER SUPPLY

The water supply of this district is supplied by the State Water Supply Commission. The various reservoirs in this district are operated by the State Water Supply Commission and the water is delivered to the various cities and towns in this district.

The supply of water for the district is still not satisfactory. Each day the water has to be pumped into the river and the cost is high. It is hoped that the district will be able to obtain a supply of water from the river.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

Public Cleansing and refuse collection is controlled by the Council's Engineer & Surveyor.

Refuse is deposited at the Boot Tip site, Nantyglo.

Although there is a collection of refuse three times a week, householders in the area, despite warning, still deposit their refuse on open spaces near their homes. This, in my opinion, will not be remedied until there is more co-operation between all concerned, and each householder has refuse prior to collection.

The Council during the year again spent considerable time in removing dumps of ashes which had been tipped on unauthorised sites.

INSPECTION OF MEAT AND OTHER FOODS.

Meat Inspection.

An additional Sanitary Inspector is employed by the Council on full-time meat inspection at the Brynmawr Ministry of Food Abattoir. Slaughtering at this abattoir is carried out for the Urban Areas of Brynmawr, Blaenavon, Nantyglo and Blaina, Abertillery and Abercarn.

The following table shows the number of animals slaughtered and inspected and the amount of meat and offal condemned.

INSPECTION OF MEAT AND OTHER FOODS

Meat Inspection

An additional 8 Councils will be formed in the Ministry of Health, Department of Health, to carry out the work of inspection, supervision and control of the meat trade.

The following table shows the number of inspectors assigned to each district and the amount of meat to be inspected. It is estimated that the total amount of meat to be inspected will be 1,000,000 lbs. per week.

The Councils during the year will be responsible for the removal of meat which has been found to be unfit for human consumption. It is estimated that the total amount of meat to be removed will be 1,000,000 lbs. per year.
