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



Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in submitting my Annual Report for the year 1959. It has been compiled in accordance with Circular 1/60 (Wales), issued by the Welsh Board of Health.

### POPULATION

The estimated population for the year 1959 was 31,110.

### BIRTH RATE.

The birth rate for the year was 14.17 per thousand of the population. This was a decrease of 1.64 per thousand of the population as compared with last year.

### DEATH RATE.

The death rate for 1959 was 13.84 per thousand of the population. This shows an increase of 1.28 per thousand on the rate for 1958. The actual number of deaths for all ages was 381, made up of 218 males and 163 females.

By far the largest number of deaths was due to diseases of the heart and blood-vessels. This was followed by cancer of the various organs and the third chief cause of death was in the category of diseases of the chest and respiratory system. Cancer of the lung and bronchus occurred in sixteen persons—fifteen male and one female.

### MATERNAL MORTALITY.

I am happy to report that there were no deaths as a result of childbirth during the year.

### INFANTILE MORTALITY.

There were 474 births in the Borough during 1959, made up of 245 males and 229 females.

Out of these 13 infants died before reaching the age of 1 year. This gives an infantile mortality rate of 27.43 per thousand live births. Ten infants out of the thirteen died within the first four weeks, giving us a neo-natal death rate of 16.88 per thousand live births.

The causes of death in the thirteen infants were: Congenital deformities (five), prematurity (three), asphyxia (two), difficult labour (one), bronchitis (one), cerebral hæmorrhage (one).

### INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

There were no large outbreaks of infectious disease again this year. Twenty-two cases of measles, 12 cases of scarlet fever and 17 cases of whooping cough were all that were notified to the Department. These were of a mild type and in no case was hospitalisation recommended.

I specially want to record that again this year no case of poliomyelitis was notified. I feel sure that the mass vaccination against poliomyelitis has played an important role in achieving this result. This is the second consecutive year that no case has occurred in the Borough. The position reminds me of the period immediately following the year 1941, when immunisation against diphtheria began on a large scale. Since that year no case of diphtheria has been reported in the Borough of Neath.

Up to the end of December, 1959, the following number of injections of poliomyelitis vaccine have been given:—

7,860 persons received one injection.

7,866 persons received two injections.

9,306 persons received three injections.

The scheme is being vigorously persued and special vaccination clinics are being heldevery week. Indeed, if the number of acceptances warrant it, places of employment are visited and the vaccine given to the employees during their working hours. Here I must say that I have had every assistance and encouragement from the employers, who have even put their own nursing staff and medical rooms at our disposal.

### TUBERCULOSIS.

Twenty-seven cases of pulmonary and three cases of non-pulmonary tuberculosis were notified during 1959. There were four deaths.

One is beginning to feel that with the introduction of the new drugs, improved chest surgery, earlier diagnosis, better housing conditions and a better standard of living that we are slowly getting the upper hand of this disease. The number of notifications are decreasing and the number of deaths from tuberculosis has been decreasing for the last few years. Still, there is no room for complacency. We must still be very active in following up all contacts and attempt to trace every possible source of infection.

### B.C.G. VACCINATION.

One very important preventive measure about which I feel the public is not as enthusiastic as it might be is B.C.G. Vaccination.

At present B.C.G. is offered to all children of 13 years of age and over who are attending our Grammar, Technical and Secondary Modern Schools, and indeed, any private school where children of this age attend.

The report of the Medical Research Council on the protection conferred by vaccination with B.C.G. is most promising and I can only advise parents to complete the consent forms when their children are offered it.

### HOUSING.

During 1959, 293 houses and flats were completed and occupied.

The progress made in re-housing families from slum clearance and individual unfit houses continues.

Our difficulty now is that we are ahead of the building programme, but we hope by the end of next year most of the families will have been re-housed.

There still remains much antipathy to being in flats. They are not at all popular. Community life, because that is what it is on a small scale, is not one which appeals to the people in the Borough. They miss the privacy and the garden of their own dwelling house. Maybe the next generation will think nothing of it and be well inured to flat life.

### JOHN TAYLOR CHARITY.

Christmas time is now regarded as the time when gifts, in money and kind, are distributed to the 'sick poor' of the Borough from the Fund left by the late John Taylor. So it was again this year when the Committee allocated to me £200 for distribution. There is no doubt that it brought some little extra comfort to the sick and aged during the festive season.

I am grateful to the Committee for their generosity, and also to my nursing and administrative staff of the Health Division for distributing it.

### NEATH & DISTRICT SPASTICS AND HANDICAPPED PERSONS FUND.

Once again this organisation, under the Chairmanship of Alderman W. T. D. Phillips, did a tremendous amount of work in helping spastic and handicapped persons resident in the Divisional Health area.

The Committee responsible for the administration of the Fund is representative of most of the organisations in the Borough. Their enthusiasm can be gauged by the fact that eighty-four cases were assisted by grants which, in all, amounted to £768.

I would like to express my thanks to you, Mr. Mayor, the Chairman of the Health Committee and all members of the Council for your encouragement during the year and to all Members of my Staff for their loyal support at all times.

### BOROUGH ANALYST

Mr. D. Evans Jones, of the Public Health Laboratory, Cardiff, who was appointed the Public Analyst for the Borough as from the 12th October, 1950, continued in office.

### ADULTERATED SAMPLES

There were no adulterated milk samples. Three of the milk samples were deficient in non-fatty solids, but tests showed no evidence of any added water.

No stock remained of the pork sausages.

### ARTIFICIAL CREAM

All artificial cream sold in the Borough was in unopened receptacles, as received from the manufacturers. It is mainly used in the preparation of cakes, fancy pastries and trifles.

### CONDENSED AND DRIED MILK REGULATIONS

On inspection of stocks held in various food premises no case of incorrect description was found.

### MERCHANDISE MARKS ACT, 1926

### INSPECTION OF DAIRY CATTLE

Routine inspection of dairy cattle in the Borough is the responsibility of the Animal Health Division of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food. Any matters of particular interest, including information relating to carcases found during inspection at the Borough Abattoir to be affected with tuberculosis, are reported to the Divisional Veterinary Officer.

### EXAMINATION OF MILK FOR TUBERCLE BACILLI

During the year 8 samples of milk were taken and submitted to the Public Health Laboratory, Swansea, for examination for Tubercle Bacilli and all showed negative results. The samples which were taken from farms in the Borough were also tested for the presence of Brucella Abortus, and one of these samples was found to be positive. Details were given to the Divisional Veterinary Officer.

### WATER SUPPLY

Water samples were taken monthly over the year for bacterioligical and chemical examination at the Public Health Laboratories, Cardiff and Swansea, and copies of the results were submitted to the Borough Engineer. They were taken from the town supplies which are drawn from the Gnoll, Briton Ferry and Ystradfellte Reservoirs, after treatment. The first two supplies are filtered and chlorinated, but the latter is only chlorinated.

The unsatisfactory results were followed up and check samples were taken with satisfactory results.

In addition to the above, two chemical and 23 bacteriological samples were taken at various sources in conjunction with the Engineer's Department with the object of augmenting the town supply. Of these samples 24 were unsatisfactory and one bacteriological was satisfactory.

### SWIMMING POOL

The Gnoll Open-Air Swimming Pool is municipally owned and is the only one in the Borough. During the warm dry summer very little water was entering the pool so that it was virtually stagnant, and samples taken were not satisfactory. A mobile pump was used to aerate the water, and chlorination was increased. The pool remained open throughout the year, but gave rise to considerable concern.

Work is now proceeding with the building of a new indoor swimming pool at Dyfed Road.

### MEAT INSPECTION

Meat Inspection was regularly carried out in the Borough Slaughterhouse during the year and, when necessary, in the butchers' shops and stalls.

Complete inspection is maintained and one or other of your Public Health Inspectors is engaged on a full time basis on this work. It will be appreciated that this involves working on evenings, Saturday and Sunday as well as Bank Holidays

Some butchers brought their own animals in for slaughter, but the majority are obtaining their supplies from wholesale dealers.

Most of the stock slaughtered was for butchers' meat and proved of good quality.

Regulations for the prevention of cruelty to animals and the provisions of the Memo 3/Food were complied with.

Condemned carcases, parts of carcases and offal, were detained in the condemned room pending collection by the disposal contractors, and were coloured before being released.

### SLAUGHTER OF ANIMALS ACTS, 1933 TO 1954

Renewal of licences under the provisions of the above Acts were granted to 12 licensed slaughtermen during the year.

### FOOD HYGIENE REGULATIONS, 1955

Premises and vehicles are regularly inspected to ensure the proper handling of food, protection against contamination and to ensure compliance with these Regulations.

### BUTCHERS' SHOPS

There were no changes reported in the number of butchers' shops and stails. They remain as 33 shops and 10 stalls, mostly owned by individual butchers. No major alterations in the premises took place but keener interest in the display of their products was visible. This brings emphasis upon the cleanliness of the premises and quality in the goods sold.

All these shops and stalls are periodically visited, mainly to determine the general conditions of the premises, equipment, cleanliness and disposal of waste. The visits were also made to examine their products and issue certificates where unsound goods were voluntarily surrendered.

### OTHER PREMISES WHERE FOOD IS SOLD, STORED OR PREPARED FOR SALE

### 1. BAKEHOUSES:

There were 14 premises used in the production of bread and flour confectionery. No alteration or improvement was noted during inspection, but efforts were made to obtain a good standard of cleanliness. No complaint of vermin was received during the year in respect of any of these premises. Additional water closet accommodation was provided in one instance.

### 2. AERATED WATER WORKS:

Three factories were engaged in the production of soft drinks, vinegar and gravy browning.

Samples of their products and the water supplies were taken during the year, with satisfactory results.

### 3. ICE CREAM:

Ice cream production in the area was made by the Cold Mix Method and supplied to businesses associated with the producers.

The main ice cream supply in the Borough is obtained from national firms but small quantities are procured from suppliers in neighbouring towns-

### 4. FISH FRYING BUSINESSES:

Sixteen premises were used in the sale of fresh fish and chipped potatoes. No change in the structure or major alterations to equipment was noticed but they were kept clean, waste was suitably stored and disposed of and no complaints received.

### 5. FISH SHOPS AND HAWKERS:

There were 7 premises used for the sale of fresh fish Conditions were satisfactory and no complaint was received.

Three persons used their vehicles for hawking fresh fish in the Borough, two of them being residents in the Area.

### 6. HOTELS, RESTAURANTS, CAFES AND CANTEENS:

There were 28 hotels, restaurants and cafes catering for the needs of the public. On inspection some minor improvements and redecoration were carried out in some of these premises. No complaints were received during the year.

Canteens are provided in the schools and factories and are equipped with modern equipment and appliances. Twenty canteens operated during the year in the Borough.

### 7. HOSPITALS:

Periodical visits were made to Neath General Hospital in order to carry out examination of foodstuff, so as to ascertain its fitness for human consumption.

### GENERAL INSPECTION

1, Duties imposed upon the local authority in the administration of the Shops Acts and Regulations are mainly carried out by the Weights and Measures Department, but certain provisions as sanitary conveniences, heating, lighting, ventilation and drainage that bring them within the provisions of the Public Health, Food and Drugs and Factory Acts are dealt with by the Public Health Department.

The two Departments co-operate in dealing with matters arising in the administration.

### 2. HAIRDRESSER'S ESTABLISHMENTS:

Inspections of these premises were carried out during the year to determine the conditions of the premises, cleanliness and removal of waste. Conditions were found to be satisfactory and no complaints were received. There are 32 of the premises used, 12 gentlemen, 18 ladies and 2 for mixed sexes.

### 3. TENTS, VANS AND SHEDS:

No case of unauthorised occupied dwelling was discovered during the year. The Fairfield was used by persons associated with the Fairs and Circus, and it is provided with adequate water supply and sanitary conveniences.

### 4. OFFENSIVE TRADES:

Applications were received from Three persons to continue the established offensive trades in the Borough, and consent was given. These were for three Rag and Bone Dealers: Messrs Foner and Co., The Latt. James Street; Mr. Daniel Price, 5 Bankside; and Mr. W. Waters, 7a Allens Court, The Green, Neath.

Frequent visits are made to these premises and considering the nature of the trades they were found to be satisfactory.

### 5. CINEMAS AND BILLIARD HALLS:

The three cinemas in the Borough (Empire, Windsor and Lodge) and one Theatre (Kinema, Briton Ferry), were inspected to determine the condition of the sanitary conveniences and the general state and cleanliness of the premises.

Inspections were made of the one Billiard Hall and one Billiard Club in the Borough. Each was found to be satisfactory as to cleanliness and general maintenance.

### 6. SCHOOLS AND NURSERIES:

Public Schools and Nurseries in the Borough are controlled by the Glamorgan County Council.

During the year 38 Milk Samples were taken for examination from these premises and were found satisfactory. The water supply which is obtained from the town mains was also tested at intervals.

### 7. LICENSED PREMISES:

There were 63 licensed premises and 15 registered clubs in 1959 situated within the Borough. On inspection conditions were found to be satisfactory.

### 8. PET ANIMALS ACT:

Three licences were granted under the above Act to persons trading in pet animals. The premises were visited and the conditions of the licences complied with.

### 9. THE RAG FLOCK AND OTHER FILLING MATERIALS ACT, 1951:

The re-registration of two premises under this Act was granted in 1959. On inspection of these premises the filling materials were found to have been obtained from licensed factories.

### ATMOSPHERIC POLLUTION

### CLEAN AIR ACT, 1956:

Routine visits were made to boiler houses in the area and observations made of chimneys from time to time to ensure compliance with the above Act.

The Council have made a building byelaw requiring the provision of smokeless heating and cooking appliances in new buildings and where mprovement grants are made in this respect.

After the investigation of complaints of a nuisance caused by the burning of paper and cardboard waste, etc., at a local factory, an incinerator was installed the use of which has eliminated the nuisance. Difficulty has been experienced in another factory in the disposal of waste comprising a mixture of paint, lacquer, white spirit, etc., and equipment for the refining and recovery of as much of this material as possible was installed. After some initial success this has proved a failure, and a leading firm of incinerator manufacturers are now considering this problem with a view to the erection of plant which can dispose of this waste without smoke.

Complaints of the emission of coal "fines" arising during the unloading of coal from lorries into railway trucks were investigated during the year, and on representations being made the Operator concerned reduced considerably the amount of coal dealt with at this particular siding. Despite this reduction the nuisance continues and further steps are to be taken. Similarly, complaints were received from residents of houses near a recently established Coal Grading Depot, of a nuisance from coal "fines." At the instigation of the Department steps were taken to minimise the nuisance by the installation of water sprays, paving of yard area, erection of screens, etc., but the nuisance continues and the Council are to give further consideration to this matter.

### NEW FURNACES:

No applications were received for prior approval during the year, and no notice of new installations.

### MEASUREMENT OF ATMOSPHERIC POLLUTION.

Records of the Rainfall and deposited matter in the gauge kept on the roof of the Public Health Offices, Dyfed Road, Neath, as well as of the sulphation of the standard "lead peroxide candles" exposed in the approved louvred box placed near the gauge, were kept during the year. Examination was carried out by the Public Analyst in Cardiff, and the result of the analysis recorded on the standard forms supplied by the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research who summarise the results from various parts of the country and circulate them to the Co-operating Bodies.

The Council is a Member of the two national bodies in this field, the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research and the National Society for Clean Air.


