To the Chairman and Members of the Neath Rural District Council.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

The birth-rate of your district has increased and is the highest recorded since 1935.

The still-birth rate is the lowest recorded since 1934.

There is nothing remarkable about the death-rate, little fluctuation having occurred each year during the past 10 years.

The infantile mortality rate which is 48 is the third lowest in the County of Glamorgan and is lower than that for England and Wales, which is 55. This low infantile mortality rate is a good indication of the standard of health maintained during the year and especially so in view of war-time conditions.

Housing schemes during the year were brought to a standstill, but II3 houses were erected by the Council and by Private Enterprise. Since 1918 the Council have built 800 houses.

I wish to put on record that the Engineer and Treasurer of the Council have furnished me with information relating to their Departments for the purpose of this report.

The number of notifications of live-births received from Medical Practitioners and Midwives during the year amounted to 635. This figure read in conjunction with the number of first visits of children under I year (see Table above) shows that 84% of the babies born were brought to the Clinics.

During the year, Cod Liver Oil was given in 75 instances; the total number of bottles supplied amounting to 133, the cost of which was £11 6s. od.

Assisted Milk Scheme.

Under this Scheme both fresh and dried milk were supplied under the following circumstances. On the 1st July, 1940, the administration of this work in respect of both fresh and dried milks was transferred from local authorities to the Ministry of Food. :—

- (1) One pint of milk per day to expectant mothers in the last three months of pregnancy.
- (2) One pint of milk per day to nursing mothers for a period of nine months when they are actually suckling their children.
- (3) One pint of milk per day to babes (if not breast fed) and infants up to the age of five years, except in such instances where there is more than one child between the ages of three and five years, unless they be twins, when only one pint of milk is provided between them—where the family income comes within the following scale:—

The total cost of fresh milk supplied during the year under review was £634 6s. 3d.

In such cases where it was requested dried milk was supplied instead of fresh milk.

V .- INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

- (a) Milk Supply.—249 visits were paid to farms and dairies during the year. The registered number of milk producers in the area is 146 and the registered number of milk vendors who are retailers only is 43. There are two producers of Tuberculin Tested Milk. One retailer is licensed to produce Pasteurised Milk, whilst four other retailers are licensed to sell Pasteurised Milk within the area which has been pasteurised outside the area.
- (b) Meat and Other Foods.—On January 15th, 1940, the control of all meat supplies was taken over by the Government, with the result that the five small slaughter-houses situated at Glyn Neath, Cwmgwrach, Resolven, Seven Sisters and Crynant were closed and the remaining larger slaughterhouse at Court Herbert, Neath, was taken over by the Government as an "Export Slaughterhouse," the majority of the meat thereat being exported to other parts of the country, chiefly for manufacturing purposes.

VI.—PREVALENCE OF AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

The largest number of notifications of notifiable diseases during the year were in respect of Measles, Diphtheria, Pneumonia and Cerebro-Spinal Fever. The Parish distribution of these diseases is given in a Table below. The greatest number of Measles cases occurred in Coedffranc, Diphtheria in Baglan Higher and Cerebro-Spinal Fever in Dulais Valley.

During the year, on account of cases being sent in almost immediately to the Tonna Isolation Hospital, a smaller amount of Diphtheria Antitoxin has been supplied to Medical Practitioners.

During the year very little Diphtheria Immunisation was done and applications for immunisation were chiefly made after an appeal had been made by the Minister of Health. During 1941 this work has been carried out in earnest.

Diphtheria.—During the year 92 cases of Diphtheria were notified as compared with 99 for the previous year. The parishes chiefly affected were Baglan Higher, Coedffranc, Neath Higher and Blaenhonddan. 4 cases terminated fatally. The attack-rate was 2.30 per 1,000 of the population and the death-rate 0.10.

Puerperal Pyrexia.—4 cases were notified during the year. I case was admitted to Hospital.

Ophthalmia Neonatorum.—2 cases were notified during the year and were treated at home. In neither case was the vision impaired.

Erysipelas.—12 cases occurred as compared with 9 the previous year. The attackrate was 0.30 per 1,000 of the population.

Pneumonia.—63 cases were notified as compared with 70 the previous year. There were 19 deaths compared with 25 the previous year. The attack-rate was 1.57 and the death-rate 0.47 per 1,000 of the population.

Cerebro-Spinal Fever.—24 cases were notified during the year. 22 cases were removed to Hospital. I case died in Hospital outside the area of the Council, I died at home and 3 at the Tonna Isolation Hospital. The attack-rate was 0.60 and the death-rate 0.12 per 1,000 of the population.

The method of treatment adopted in respect of these cases has been lumbar puncture and anti-meningococal serum introduced into the Thecal Cavity, together with M. & B. (soluble) intramuscularly.

Tuberculosis.—There were 42 Pulmonary and 33 Non-Pulmonary cases of Tuberculosis notified during the year, as compared with 41 Pulmonary and 35 Non-Pulmonary for the previous year. During the year there were 27 deaths from Pulmonary and 7 from Non-Pulmonary Tuberculosis as compared with 19 from Pulmonary and 2 from Non-Pulmonary during the previous year. The death-rate per 1,000 of the population for Pulmonary Tuberculosis was 0.68, for Non-Pulmonary Tuberculosis 0.17, and for total Tuberculosis deaths (all forms) 0.85.
