



MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1941.

To the Chairman and Members of the Newtown and Llanllwchaiarn Urban District Council.

Mr Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you my Annual Report for the year 1941. This is again curtailed considerably on the instructions of the Ministry of Health.

The Public Health Officials are: The Medical Officer of Health (part time), and Mr. A. Penbryn Roberts, who resigned his post on 1st November, and was suceeded by Mr. A. S. Benbow, who commenced duties in January, 1942. The duties of Sanitary Inspector, Surveyor, Water Manager and Meat Inspector are combined. The essential work under these four heads was carried out by Mr. A. S. Benbow during the past two months of the year.

There was one death from Diphtheria. The child was admitted to hospital and died there.

The County Council have undertaken the immunization against Diphtheria, and a very large percentage of parents of school children and younger infants have availed themselves of this service.

TUBERCULOSIS.

Sixteen new cases of Tuberculosis were notified during the year. Twelve of these were of the respiratory type and four non-respiratory. One case notified, a female aged 19 was later found to be non-tubercular. The Respiratory cases were females aged 18, 19, 19, 21, 26, 40 and 59. The males were aged 20, 40, 50, 50 and 66. The non-respiratory cases were all females, ages 1, 8, 11 and 31.

Deaths: Four from Pulmonary disease and one nonpalmonary.

Ages: Pulmonary: Females, ages 19, 31, 31; 1 male aged 66. Non-Pulmonary: 1 Female aged 29.

The Notification of Tuberculosis is efficiently carried out in the Area.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

MEAT INSPECTION.

During the past year. inspections were made at The Government Slaughter House, and carcases were found unfit for human consumption and these were condemned. Full details of the animals killed, &c. do not apear to be available.

WATER UNDERTAKING.

During the past year samples of water were submitted for Chemical and Bacteriological examination and were found satisfactory.

SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

The Sewage Farm has been inspected several times during the year and found in a fairly satisfactory condition.
