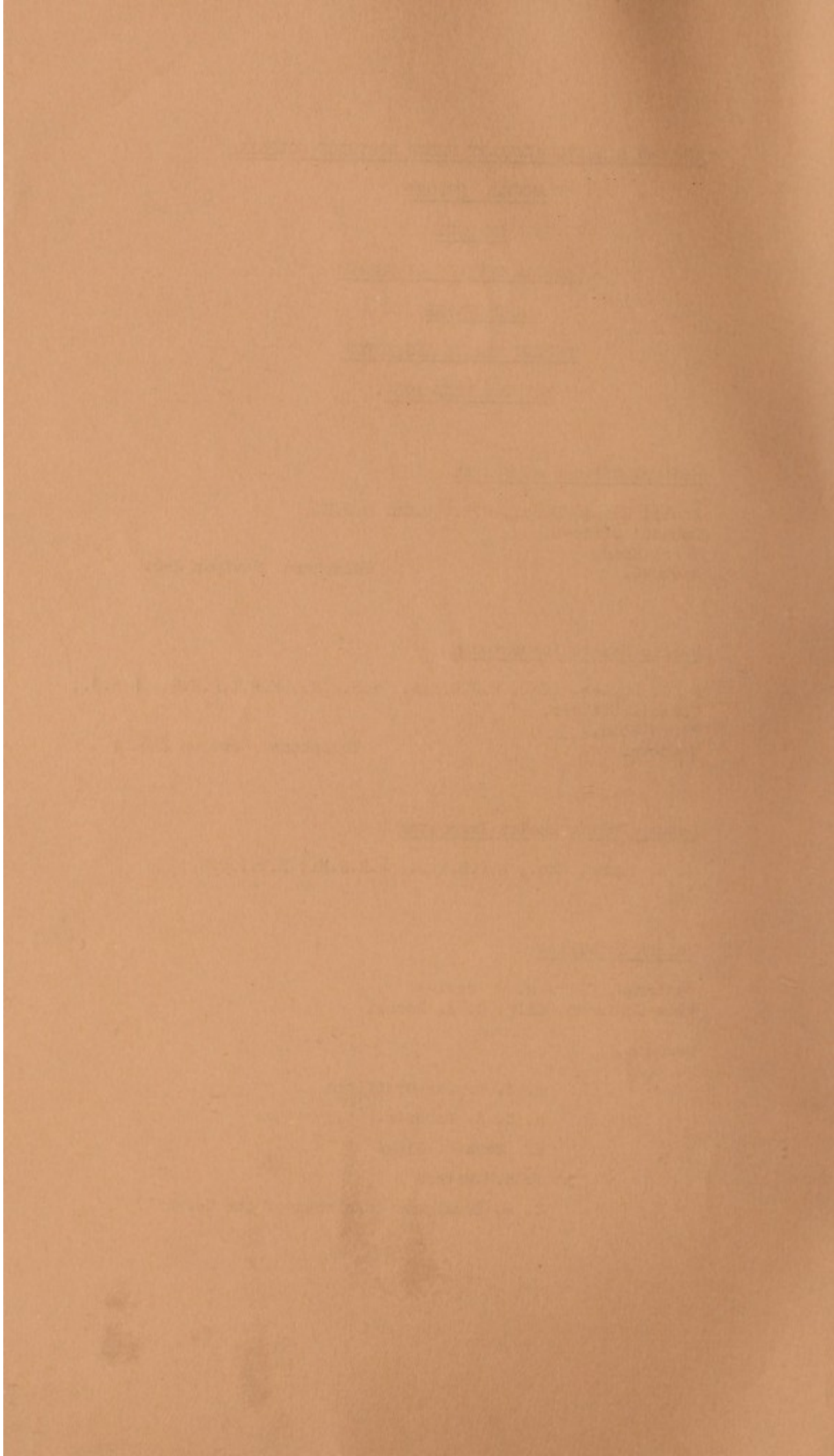

To the Chairman and Members of the Newtown and Llanllwchaearn Urban District Council.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

It is my duty to present to you the Annual Report for 1964 on the health and sanitary conditions in your area.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1947 Section 47

This deals with the removal from their homes of people, generally elderly, who are living in insanitary conditions and who are unable to look after themselves and who are not receiving help from others and are in such a state that their conditions are prejudicial to their health.

It was necessary to take such action this year in the case of an elderly gentleman, following the flood. He was removed on a Court Order to Y, Dolydd, Llanfyllin and remained there for three weeks. He has returned home to the deplorable conditions but will not accept help of any kind. He will not consider going to live in an old persons home.

VITAL STATISTICS.

There were 77 live births giving a rate of 14.03 per 1,000 population compared with 16.85 in 1963. Of these 2 were illegitimate. There were 4 home confinements, 5 still births and 4 premature births.

There was 1 infant death at 4 months giving an infant mortality rate 13.0 compared with 32.6 in 1963.

There were 71 deaths giving a rate of 12.94 per 1,000 population compared with 11.72 in 1963. Of these 55 occurred after the age of 65 29 after the age of 75yrs. There were 2 deaths from lung cancer.

WATER SUPPLY

The Montgomeryshire Water Board is responsible for the provision of water to the Urban District. All samples taken from the Board's supply have been satisfactory.

During the summer the level of the reservoir at Mochdre fell rapidly, preparations were made for a temporary pipeline to be laid in anticipation of pumping from the River Severn. However, the much needed rain fell and these preparations were not necessary.

SLAUGHTERHOUSES.

There are two privately owned slaughterhouses in the Urban District. Both are satisfactory and all the meat is inspected.

REFUSE TIP

There is constant trouble with unauthorised persons entering on the tip and breaking the fence between the tip and the adjacent farm with the inevitable result that farm animals wander on to the tip. Incineration is carried out daily to prevent a fly menace.

The present tip will probably last a further four years. The Surveyor has reported on alternative sites but it was felt by the Council that no action be taken at that time. I feel now that we ought to start looking for other sites since the tip is surrounded on three sides by houses and the High School grounds on the fourth side. It is an attraction to children a target for vandalism and a risk to public health.

PUBLIC CONVENIENCES.

Concern was felt during the year regarding the vandalism which frequently occurred at both public conveniences. Holes have been torn in doors, W.C. pans smashed and general misuse of the premises. The Chairman of the appropriate Committee has appealed on several occasions at the Council meetings to the Public to stop this vandalism, but with little effect.

It is a pity that this element occurs in the town as many people passing through in cars and buses use these conveniences and one feels they base the standard of this district on the condition of the conveniences.

SEWERS

Routine maintenance of the sewers was carried out during the year. Various schemes were presented to the Council by the Consultant Engineers to improve the sewers especially the outfall sewer and the commencement of work was awaited at the end of the year.

GRANTS.

During the year the Council approved 7 Improvement Grants and 21 Standard Grants for the improvement of domestic property.

HOUSING.

20 houses were built by private enterprise. Preparation on the Maes yr Handir Site for roads and sewers was started in February, 1964 and the building of the first 51 houses was commenced in May and just before the end of the year 3 houses were ready.

However on the night of December 12th a disastrous flood hit the town and for the second time in four years the River Severn changed its course and rushed right across the town in a raging torrent for some 12 hours. Extensive damage was done and the Secretary of State for Wales Mr. James Griffiths, visited the town the next day to see the extent of the damage for himself.

Over 200 houses were flooded to a depth of from a few inches to 7 ft. and more than 80 business premises were flooded.

Tremendous amounts of food stocks had to be destroyed owing to the possibility of damage by sewerage contaminated water. Extensive damage to roads, pavements, telephones, gas and electrical installations and sewers occurred.

The Water Board advised people living in the flooded areas to boil drinking water as a precaution against any damage to water mains. After the flood subsided it was found that 56 families were occupying dangerous or unfit houses. With the co-operation of many Officials from the Welsh Office arrangements were made to have 30 mobile homes brought to Newtown for the temporary accommodation of flood victims, and drainage. These were sited at the Pavilion and water and electricity were connected to the mobile homes. In connection with the urgent need for new houses a crash building programme for the erection of 91 houses at Maes yr Handir was commenced.

Tributes have been paid to everyone who worked together to relieve the conditions in the town after this terrible disaster, occurring so soon after another awful flood. It is to be hoped that some remedy can be found to prevent a third such disaster.

I would like to express my appreciation for the co-operation and help from all the members of the Council Staff and to the Council for its continued interest in the public health of the Town.

Once again I submit my contribution to the Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health.

Responsibilities have been increased by new legislation, particularly the Offices, Shops and Railway Premises Act, 1963. As shown in the report, a start has been made in the implementation of the Act which came into operation during August of the year under review.

Slum Clearance is now really getting under way and it is hoped that during the coming year the bulk of the Slum Clearance proposals will have been dealt with.

The whole town is conscious of the ever threatening fear of floods, particularly after December and it is evident to all that something will have to be done in this respect by the responsible Authorities. During such floods as we experienced in December there is always the extreme possibility of collapse of buildings, rupture of sewers and water mains, contamination of food supplies with resultant peril to the public health.

WATER SUPPLY

Of the 24 samples of water taken for bacteriological examination, 15 were reported to be unsatisfactory. Follow up action on the unsatisfactory samples, which were from private supplies, was taken.

INSPECTION OF FOOD AND FOOD PREMISES

During the year 14 cwts. 87 lbs. of foodstuffs, including canned foods, were condemned as unfit for human consumption.

This does not include food etc. destroyed in the flood which was many tons but due to the emergency was unable to be weighed.
