I beg to submit the Annual Report for the year 1951.



The Death Rate was considerably higher than in 1950, and slightly higher than that for the County of Pembroke, and for the whole of the country.

It must be pointed out that 47% of the deaths were of persons over the age of seventy, including 12% over the age of eighty years.



20% of the deaths were due to cancer, 27% to various diseases of the heart, and 8% were caused by accidents of various kinds.

The case of Poliomyelitis was admitted to the West Wales Isolation Hospital, Tumble, and made a good recovery. There was one death due to Acute Poliomyelitis. This was a young man taken ill in November 1950, who had been in an "iron lung" for three months, but died during the influenza epidemic in March 1951.

TUBERCULOSIS

Six cases of Tuberculosis were notified, of which five were respiratory. Two of these cases were admitted to Hospital during the year, as well as three other cases notified the previous year.

The Mobile Unit of the Mass Radiography Service visited the County in May. Residents in the Pembroke Rural area had the opportunity of being X-rayed at Tenby or Pembroke Dock. It is unfortunate that the Radiography Service consider it impossible both on technical and economic grounds to visit each village in a scattered rural community, and that few persons from the villages make the effort to attend the urban centres.

LOCAL HEALTH SERVICES

VACCINATION

Free vaccination against smallpox is offered to all babies, and any other persons for whom it may be advisable. This is carried out by the local doctors, who are paid by the County Council for notification of either successful vaccination or failure after the second attempt. Records were received of 19 primary vaccinations, and 10 secondary vaccinations.

This means that only approximately 18% of the babies are now vaccinated.

IMMUNISATION

This is also carried out by the local doctors, who are paid by the County Council on receipt by your Medical Officer of the record cards. 47 children were immunised during the year, and 19 received reinforcing injections.

This means that approximately 45% of the children are immunised against Diphtheria, a regrettable decrease in the high percentage recorded when immunisation first became a free service. The fact that Diphtheria has been almost wiped out by the mass immunisation of children does not mean that it cannot occur again, if the level of immunisation falls, and it is therefore very important that parents should be urged to have their babies immunised before their first birthday, if possible.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948

REMOVAL TO SUITABLE PREMISES OF PERSONS IN NEED OF CARE AND ATTENTION.

No action was found to be necessary in this respect during the year.

WATER SUPPLY

During 1951, water-main extensions were completed in the following areas:-

Stackpole to Bosherston, Cosheston to Stoor Lake, Warren Common to St. Twynnels, and a small pumping scheme to supply Hundleton village and new housing site.

Approval was given for extensions from St. Florence to Ivy Tower, Hodgeston to West Moor, and Redberth to Knapp.

Work upon the Public Sewerage Scheme at Milton is proceeding satisfactorily, and will be completed early next year. Up to December 31st, the outfall works have been completed, and the main sewer laid up to Milton Bridge.

Sewage disposal plants from seven completed Housing sites are being well maintained and are functioning satisfactorily.
