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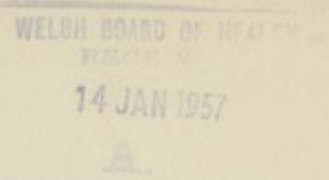

The Birth Rate and Death Rate are lower than that for the County of Pembroke. Approximately 31% of the total deaths were of persons over the age of 70 years and approximately 19% were of persons over the age of 80 years.

The Infant Mortality Rate is higher than that for the last two years. There were five deaths of infants under one year. One due to prematurity, one to bronchopneumonia, one to congenital heart disease, one to renal and one to spina bifida.

VACCINATION

Records were received of 27 primary vaccinations and 21 secondary vaccinations

PREVENTION OF TUBERCULOSIS

B.C.G. Vaccination

The B.C.G. Vaccination of contacts has been carried out in the District by Dr. Llewelyn Davies, the Chest Physician since 1950. During the Autumn Term, B.C.G. Vaccination of school leavers was commenced, that is, the children who have reached the age of thirteen years, written consent having been obtained from the parents.

25 children were skin tested and of these 3 were vaccinated

It is hoped that it will be possible to complete the skin testing and vaccination of all the thirteen year olds whose parents so wish during the school year. It will be necessary to repeat the skin testing annually and vaccinate the negative reactors

IMMUNISATION AGAINST DIPHTHERIA

44 children were immunised during 1955 and 8 were given re-inforcing injections.

Both Vaccination and Immunisation are carried out free of charge by local practitioners and records are paid for by the County Council.

was commenced, that is, children who have reached the
age of thirteen years, written consent having been obtained from
the parents.

It is hoped that it will be possible to complete the
testing and vaccination of all the thirteen year olds within the
year. It will be necessary to repeat
the testing annually and vaccinate the negative reactors.

EXAMINATION AGAINST DISTRICT

and the children were vaccinated during 1955 and 1956.

REFUSE DISPOSAL

Full consideration was given by the Council to the present system of refuse collection and disposal and the Council decided to adopt scavenging powers as provided for under Section 72 of the Public Health Act 1936. Reports of various types of refuse disposal vehicles together with suitable disposal sites were deliberated and the necessary action was taken to expedite the operation of the service.

RODENT CONTROL.

One of the Council's workmen, normally engaged on refuse collection, is employed part time on rodent control. Particular attention is given to the Council's refuse tip at Hodgeston, and also to the Council's refuse bins. The Infestation Control Division of the P.A.E.C. have negotiated a large number of contracts with individual Farmers within the district. Where infestations are found on farms not covered by the above mentioned contract, full particulars are immediately forwarded to the Pests Officer, who then endeavours to complete an agreement with the owner to carry out the disinfection by contract.

It would appear that the rat population has greatly decreased, as complaints of infestation are considerably less than in previous years.
