ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR

1968.

To the Chairman and Members of the Council

Mr. Chairman, Mrs. Wisbey and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting to you my Annual Report on the health of the district for the year 1968. As this will be my last Annual Report, I feel it will be of interest to members to compare it with my first full report in 1956.

Housing.

There has been a considerable increase in the number of council houses and private houses since 1956, so that the number of dwellings overcrowded is now almost nil and, in addition, a number of the older houses have been modernised.

Infectious Disease.

I am pleased to be able to report a marked reduction in the incidence of infectious disease during this period. In 1956, there were 71 notifications and in 1968 there were 21, as follows:

Prevention of Infectious Disease.

In the autumn of 1955, vaccination against tuberculosis was commenced in the schools and clinics and since that time vaccination against poliomyelitis and measles has also been introduced and improvements have also been made in the vaccination against diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus.

There has been an increase in the resident population (Registrar General's estimates) from 6,390 to 7,700.

Water and Sewerage Schemes.

The number of properties supplied with a main water supply and main drainage shows a considerable increase on the 1956 position.

#### INFANT DEATHS.

Two infants died during the year, both male children. The first died at 2 days from prematurity and respiratory failure - weight at birth being 5lbs.5ozs; the second died at 2 months from interstitial pneumonia.

#### DEATHS (General).

The general death rate for your district remains lower than both the county and national rates. Of the 63 deaths, 10 were due to malignant disease - 2 of these, both male patients, died from cancer of the lung, but their smoking habits are not known. Heart disease accounted for 25 of the total deaths.

Approximately 44% of the deaths occurred in persons aged between 70 and 80 years and approximately 32% in persons over 80 years of age.

#### NOTIFICATIONS OF INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

During the year, the following notifications were received in respect of cases of infectious disease in the rural district:

- 1 Scarlet Fever
- 18 Measles
- 1 Food Poisoning
- 1 Respiratory Tuberculosis.

As a result of the new Public Health (Infectious Diseases) Regulations 1968, which came into force on 1st October, certain infectious diseases ceased to be notifiable and others, including Infective Jaundice, were added to the list of diseases to be notified.

#### TUBERCULOSIS.

I am pleased to report that, once again, there were no deaths from Tuberculosis during the year, but one new case of respiratory tuberculosis was notified - a male patient in the 35-44 years age group.

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1 Respiratory Tuberculosis.

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#### TUBERCULOSIS

I am pleased to report that, once again, there were no deaths from Tuberculosis during the year, but one new case of respiratory tuberculosis was notified - a male patient in the 25-44 years age group.

### Prevention of Tuberculosis.

B.C.G. Vaccination: Vaccination of contacts and school-children (13 years and over) continued during the year, at Clinics and at school sessions. 739 school-children in the county were skin tested and 694 of these required vaccination; 61 contacts were also vaccinated.

Dr. D. Llewelyn Davies continues to vaccinate contacts at the Chest Clinic.

### MASS RADIOGRAPHY.

As from January 1968, the Mobile Unit of the Mass Radiography Service discontinued its frequent short visits to towns in Pembrokeshire, but commenced an annual visit to Penbroke and Penbroke Dock in the autumn. This re-arrangement was made because of the steady decline in the cases of tuberculosis found and the better facilities available to general practitioners to refer cases for X-ray.

The total number examined at Penbroke in October was 380, 201 males and 179 females, and of these, 1 female required further observation and 2 females and 2 males were found to have some other abnormality of chest.

At Penbroke Dock, 162 persons were examined, 52 males and 110 females, 1 female here required further observation and 6 persons (2 males and 4 females) were found to have other abnormalities of chest.

### NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE ACT, 1946.

Local Health Services: Vaccinations against smallpox, poliomyelitis and measles and immunisation against diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus continued to be carried out at Clinics and at school sessions during the year. The following figures relate to the whole county for the year, as separate district figures are not available:-

# Prevention of Tuberculosis.

B.C.G. Vaccination: Vaccination of contacts and school-children (15 years and over) continued during the year, at Clinton and at school sessions. 737 school-children in the county were skin tested and 694 of these required vaccination; 61 contacts were also vaccinated.

Dr. D. B. Bawelby Davies continues to vaccinate contacts at the Chest Clinic.

Furthermore at no time during the year does the sulphur dioxide or smoke content of the air present a hazard to health.

The data which is being recorded is obviously essential to provide a base line to compare the level of pollution when the Pembroke Power Station is operational.
