

### 1968.

To the Chairman and Members of the Council

Mr. Chairman, Mrs. Wisbey and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting to you my Annual Report on the health of the district for the year 1968. As this will be my last Annual Report, I feel it will be of interest to members to compare it with my first full report in 1956.

### Housing.

There has been a considerable increase in the number of council houses and private houses since 1956, so that the number of dwellings overcrowded is now almost nil and, in addition, a number of the older houses have been modernised.

### Infectious Disease.

I am pleased to be able to report a marked reduction in the incidence of infectious disease during this period. In 1956, there were 71 notifications and in 1968 there were 21, as follows:

In the autumn of 1955, vaccination against tuberculosis was commenced in the schools and clinics and since that time vaccination against polionyelitis and measles has also been introduced and improvements have also been made in the vaccination against diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus.

### INFANT DEATHS.

Two infants died during the year, both male children. The first died at 2 days from prematurity and respiratory failure - weight at birth being 51bs.5ozs; the second died at 2 months from interstitial pneumonia.

### DEATHS (General).

The general death rate for your district remains lower than both the county and national rates. Of the 63 deaths, 10 were due to malignant disease - 2 of these, both male patients, died from cancer of the lung, but their smoking habits are not known. Heart disease accounted for 25 of the total deaths.

Approximately 44% of the deaths occurred in persons aged between 70 and 80 years and approximately 32% in persons over 80 years of age.

### TUBERCULOSIS.

### Prevention of Tuberculosis.

B.C.G. Vaccination: Vaccination of contacts and school-children (13 years and over) continued during the year, at Clinics and at school sessions. 739 school-children in the county were skin tested and 694 of these required vaccination; 61 contacts were also vaccinated.

Dr. D. Llewelyn Davies continues to vaccinate contacts at the Chest Clinic.

### MASS RADIOGRAPHY.

As from January 1968, the Mobile Unit of the Mass Radiography Service discontinued its frequent short visits to towns in Pembrokeshire, but commenced an annual visit to Pembroke and Pembroke Dock in the autumn. This re-arrangement was made because of the steady decline in the cases of tuberculosis found and the better facilities available to general practitioners to refer cases for X-ray.

The total number examined at Penbroke in October was 380, 201 males and 179 females, and of these, 1 female required further observation and 2 females and 2 males were found to have some other abnormality of chest.

At Penbroke Dock, 162 persons were examined, 52 males and 110 females, 1 female here required further observation and 6 persons (2 males and 4 females) were found to have other abnormalities of chest.

### CARAVANNING AND CAMPING

All caravan and tented camping sites were satisfactorily operated during the year.

However, the fine weather brought out many touring caravans and it was decided that notwithstanding planning problems, steps would be taken to ensure that sufficient pitches would be made available for the 1969 season. At the same time, a joint meeting between members of the Council and all operators was arranged in the Council Offices to discuss amendments to the existing Site Licences. These amendments included provision of fire extinguishers in each caravan, trapped gulleys with a drainage system to each caravan, and permitting caravans to remain on their pitches during winter. The meeting was considered by all to have been a success and it was expected that further meetings would be arranged thereby ensuring a better understanding of the various problems involved.

### MILK SUPPLIES

#### REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

During the year, a lease was obtained on a large quarry at Pincheston, Carew. The whole area was enclosed with a stockproof concrete post and chain-link fence before controlled tipping was commenced. The quarry is capable of receiving refuse for at least 20 years, and may in fact last considerably longer.

A tracked machine was also purchased and a garage to house it built within the quarry.

As in previous years, the collection of refuse during the summer involved additional collections, including regular collections on the beaches and surrounding areas. In fact, it has become obvious that additional litter bins are required for this purpose and the Council resolved to provide better coverage by providing a Land Rover to patrol beaches and return filled litter sacks to a central collecting point. It is however a sad reflection on the community that little or no concern is shown by the vast majority to place litter in receptacles.

Furthermore at no time during the year does the sulphur dioxide or smoke content of the air present a hazard to health.

### OIL POLLUTION

Pollution of the coastline continues unabated, though not to any greater degree than in recent years. Generally speaking, pollution is most serious on West-facing beaches and is in the form of oily weed and jetsam together with balls of semi-solid oil residue, which make such beaches unfit for public recreation and pleasure.

One serious oil spillage occurred from a storage tank in an oil refinery in Milford Haven causing considerable pollution of the sea shore near Angle, and immediate steps were taken by the Company to remove polluted weed and gravel.
