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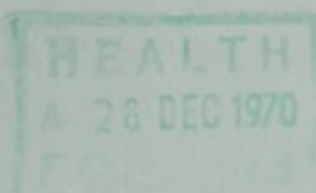

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR 1969.

To the Chairman and Members of the Council,

Mr. Chairman, Mrs. Wisbey and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting to you the Annual Report on the health of the district for the year 1969.

Housing.

A total of 44 private dwelling houses and 8 council dwellings were completed during the year. Approximately 90 applicants were on the housing waiting list at the end of the year.

Infectious Disease.

As a result of measles vaccination, the number of cases of measles occurring in the district has fallen markedly. A total of 19 children contracted the disease this year and enquiry revealed that none of these children had received the vaccine.

In common with the whole of the county, your district was involved in the outbreak of Influenza (Hong Kong type) which started at the end of the year. Three deaths from influenza were notified in the rural district by the 31st December.

Water Supplies.

On the whole, the quality of the water supplies in the district was satisfactory during 1969. Routine samples were taken by the Pembrokeshire Water Board and any unsatisfactory results received from the Public Health Laboratory were immediately dealt with by the Board, who took the necessary remedial action.

Caravanning and Camping.

The number of holiday caravanners and campers continues to increase each year. Despite this, the standards of Caravan and Camping Sites in the rural district remains good. Generally, excellent liason and co-operation exists with site operators and your Public Health Inspector continues to press for improved standards and conditions at all sites. Special arrangements were necessary to accommodate the increased number of touring caravans during the summer.

I have pleasure in presenting to you the Annual Report on the health of the district for the year 1929.

Residence.

A total of 44 private dwelling houses and 8 communal dwellings were completed during the year. Approximately 30 applications were in the housing waiting list at the end of the year.

Infectious Diseases.

As a result of measles vaccination, the number of cases of measles occurring in the district has fallen markedly. A total of 19 children contracted the disease this year and enquiry revealed that none of these children had received the vaccine.

In common with the whole of the county, your district was involved in the outbreak of influenza (Hong Kong type) which started at the end of the year. Three deaths from influenza were notified in the rural district by the first December.

Water Supplies.

On the whole, the quality of the water supplied to the district was satisfactory during 1929. Routine analyses were taken by the Poughkeepsie Water Board and any unsatisfactory results received from the Public Health Laboratory were immediately dealt with by the Board, who took the necessary remedial action.

Sanitation and General.

Generally, excellent liaison and co-operation exists with site operators and your Public Health Inspector continues to press for improved standards and conditions at all sites. INFANT DEATHS.

One male child died at the age of a few hours, from prematurity, during the year; his birth weight was only 2lbs.6ozs.

DEATHS (General).

The general death rate for the rural district again remains lower than both the county and national rates. 8 of the total 62 deaths were due to malignant disease - 3 due to cancer of the lung. Coronary thrombosis accounted for 13 deaths.

Approximately 30% of the deaths occurred in persons aged between 70 and 80 years of age and approximately 35% in persons over 80 years of age.

CARAVANNING AND CAMPING

For the second year, a joint meeting was held between members of the Council and Caravan Site Operators. Undoubtedly these meeting lead to greater understanding and co-operation, and all sites maintained a relatively high standard.

As a result of previous known demand for touring pitches, a concession was granted to all sites with available space, subject to a maximum of ten pitches. Generally speaking the scheme was highly successful, although several unauthorised sites sprang up during the peak period due to the lack of licensed accommodation. As a result, it was decided to make additional touring accommodation available during 1970.

The Pembrokeshire County Council confirmed its intention to set up a touring site at Carew, the site being able to accommodate 50 caravans.

OIL POLLUTION

Once again, westward facing beaches were subjected to a continual pollution from oil and oily waste discharged at sea, making normal usage of these beaches by the public difficult, particularly on the high tide line and on pebbly beaches.

Unfortunately, there can be no economical solution, unless it be by prevention, which would need to be proceeded by international public outcry.

Spillages continue unabated in the Milford Haven Waterway, though an ever efficient control service prevented serious contamination of amenity beaches and foreshore.
