YEAR 1972.

To the Chairman and Members of the Council,

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting to you the Annual Report on the health of your district for the year 1972.

HOUSING.

The total number of houses built in the rural district during the year was 77; ll of these were council dwellings and the remaining 66 were private houses and flats. The standard of the houses in the district is good and a total of 57 discretionary and 4 standard grants were approved by the Council in 1972. In addition to the houses which were completed, other council dwellings were under construction and a number of older council properties were modernised. Other schemes for the construction of council bungalows and flats in various parts of your district, were in the planning stage at the end of the year. There was a total of 150 applicants on the housing waiting list at the end of the year.

The Housing Finance Act became law in October 1972, instituting a system of rent rebates for tenants whose income fell below a certain level.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

Only a small number of infectious diseases were notified to me from your district during the year. These included 11 cases of measles, which occurred towards the end of the year - an outbreak of which started in October; no complications were reported among the children who contracted the disease. Summer gastro-enteritis was again prevalent throughout the whole of the rural district during the holiday season and made its appearance at the end of May. This illness was generally mild in character and was not confined to your area but occurred in all parts of the county. A small number of cases of influenza (English type) were reported during the winter months, with one death.

MILK SUPPLIES.

I am pleased to report that during 1972, the majority of producer/
retailers of milk had joined the Brucellosis Incentive Scheme and by the end of
the year a total of 13 retailers were accredited by the Ministry of Agriculture
Fisheries and Food. Sampling of milk from all herds has been carried out
and it was not necessary to issue any new Pasteurisation Orders because of
brucellosis infected herds during the year.

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CARAVANNING AND CAMPING.

This form of holiday continues to increase in popularity and a number of visits were made by your Public Health Inspector and myself to the caravan and tent sites during the year. Standards at established sites are generally good and improved facilities are being provided annually for the visitors.

DEATHS (General).

Again this year, heart disease accounted for the highest number of deaths - 34, with malignant conditions claiming 16 deaths; 2 male patients and 1 female patient died from cancer of the lung.

Approximately 20.7% of the total deaths occurred in persons aged between 70 and 80 years and approximately 33% in persons aged over 80 years.

TUBERCULOSIS.

I am pleased to report that there were no deaths from tuberculosis this year and only one new case of respiratory tuberculosis was notified-a male patient in the 55-64 years age group.

Prevention of Tuberculosis. B.C.G.Vaccination: The usual autumn visit was made to the two secondary schools in your area, when a total of 188 13 year old pupils received vaccination. Contacts continue to be investigated and vaccinated if necessary at the chest clinics held regularly at South Pembrokeshire Hospital and at Haverfordwest.

NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE ACT 1946.

Local Health Services: The monthly infant welfare clinic, staffed by a health visitor and medical officer, continued to be held at Pembroke during the year, where immunisations and vaccinations were carried out. School sessions were held for school entrants to receive booster doses in the Spring and Summer terms and also Rubella vaccinations were offered to 13 year old girls in the Secondary Schools.

The following details refer to all scoolchildren (under the age of 16 years) who received vaccinations and immunisations in the County during 1972:-

Although details of this scheme have been completed since 1971, authority to proceed has been withheld, probably due to the scheme being required eventually to be integrated with the Regional Sewerage Scheme.

Regional Sewerage Scheme

Further investigation continued, and discussions extended to include both Pembroke Borough Council and Narberth Rural District Council. The Catchment area was also extended to include Pembroke Borough, other surrounding villages within the Rural District, as well as the village of Saundersfoot.

As a result of a further hydrographic Survey, it was recommended that the most advantageous location for the submarine pipe line was situate at Manorbier.

However, local opposition to this proposal resulted in several meetings in the village when the Council's Consulting Engineers explained the scheme. Before the end of the year, a number of written objections were lodged at the Department of the Environment, and it was becoming apparent that the scheme would require a public enquiry to determine the issue.

SEWERAGE TREATMENT WORKS

Sampling

As in previous years, regular sampling continued as standard practice, and all results were reported to the Council and the South West Wales River Authority.

Out of a total of 24 samples, 22 of these satisfied Royal Commission Standards.

St. Twynnells Sewage Treatment Works

Negotiations were carried on with the Pembrokeshire Water Board in an endeavour to overcome possible objections, resulting from the abstraction of water downstream at Stembridge.

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PUBLIC CONVENIENCES

Once again, the year has been notable by the absence of vandalism, and this, it is believed, is due in no small part, to the Council's policy of providing free facilities.

Conveniences under Construction

Lawrenny Ferry

This convenience was completed shortly before the end of the Summer, and is situated in an area that is becoming increasingly popular with both holidaymakers and local residents.

St. Florence Village

Although not completed, it was confidently expected to be open to the public well in advance of the 1973 Summer season.

No works of construction commenced on any of these public conveniences, but at the end of the year, it appeared that tenders would be invited for Barafundle and Broadhaven during 1973.

It appeared unlikely that the new larger public convenience at Freshwater East would be built until the result of the public enquiry into the re-development of the area.

CARAVANNING AND CAMPING

For the third year running, the staff of the Wales Tourism Council at Kilgetty workedeextremely hard in helping to place campers on sites within the district.

Site owners also co-operated by telephoning daily and thereby enabling the staff to maintain a day-to-day assessment of availability of pitches.

Although no actual statistics are available, there are indications that the Spring Bank Holiday is becoming more popular with holiday-makers.

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REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

The service was again well able to cope with the inreased pressure during the summer months, and controlled tipping continued at the Council's tip at Pincheston.

The litter collection service was extended during the summer and the results were noticeable. A number of voluntary organisations helped to clean popular beaches and it is anticipated that this trend will continue.

Unfortunately, no progress was made during discussions with neighbouring authorities to provide a pulverisation plant to serve the south and east of the County, although a detailed study was carried out by L.A.M.S.A.C.

For the first time the Council introduced a beach litter collection service and this operated throughout the six summer months.

There is no doubt that the service was effective and was much appreciated by residents and holidaymakers alike.

In addition to litter, o'lly seaweed was also collected and removed to the Council's tip.

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AIR POLLUTION

The Pembroke Power Station which commenced operation at the end of September 1970, has now completed the commissioning stage and is in full operation.

Cosheston Station was closed down in February and transferred to Lawrenny as the results continued to be affected from Ammonia coming from a depot at Carew Cheriton.

As in other years the incidence of pollution gives no cause for alarm the results showing no increase.

Furthermore the level of pollution is very low in comparison with those of a similar rural area and a typical industrial area as shown in the tabulated results.

OIL POLLUTION

Once again, westward facing beaches were subjected to a continual pollution from oil and oily waste discharged at sea, making normal usage of these beaches by the public difficult, particularly on the high tide line and on pebbly beaches.

Unfortunately, there can be no practical solution, unless it be by prevention, which would need to be preceded by international public outcry.

Spillages continue unabated in the Milford Haven Waterway, though an ever-efficient control service prevented serious contamination of amenity beaches and foreshore.
