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

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

## ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

### MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH

FOR THE YEAR 1956

To the Chairman and Members of the

Prestatyn Urban District Council.

I beg to submit my report for the year 1956 for your consideration. It appears in the form laid down in Circular 17/55 Wales.

Only 49 cases of Infectious Diseases were notified during the year, there being no outbreak of any of the common childhood illnesses during the year.

Diphtheria immunisation increased a little during the year. 83 children having received their primary immunisation and 55 their re-inforcing immunisation during the year. The corresponding total for 1955 were 75 and 85 respectively. I would strongly advise all parents to protect their children against diphtheria, for this disease, though rare at the moment, has killed many more children than has poliomyelitis in the past, and were the community not to be protected by immunisation it might well return in all its virulence, The record of vaccination is relatively high, 66 children under 5 years of age having being vaccinated for the first time. In all 75 people received their primary vaccination and 52 others were re-vaccinated.

Two isolated cases of food poisoning were notified and were investigated during the year. This is a very satisfactory state of affairs, and indicates that the standard of hygiene in the town is reasonable good. It is up to the public to co-operate with the shopkeepers by not taking their dogs into food shops, for all normal dogs sniff at food stuffs within their reach and occasionally forget their good manners in other ways. In conclusion

I would point out that the public get the standard of food hygiene they demand, or in other words, the standard they deserve.

#### **Statistics**

Our birth rate, though low, as might be expected in a town with an older than average population, is up on last year, being 11.3 births per 1,000 of the population, as compared with 10.9 births per 1,000 of the population in 1955. Our uncorrected death rate was 15.9 deaths per 1,000 of the population, last year's being 16.4 deaths per 1,000 of the population, so that there is also an improvement here.

Corrected for comparison with England and Wales our birth rate is 14 births per 1,000 of the population, and our death rate 10.9 per 1,000 of the population, which compare favourably with the national rates of 15.7 births per 1,000 of the population and 11.7 deaths per 1,000 of the population.

Two infants died under the age of one year, giving us an Infant Mortality rate of 19.2 deaths per 1,000 live births as compared with the National rate of 23.8 deaths per 1,000 live births. As we deal in small numbers as far as infant deaths are concerned, it is obvious that this rate can fluctuate considerably from year to year.

## Elderly People and Elderly Sick People.

This problem is still far from solved, though it is obvious that there is a considerable amount of interest being taken in the welfare of the old. In this district there has been less difficulty in finding accommodation during the past year and no cases were brought to my official notice.

#### Housing

The erection of 24 houses, forming the fourth development at Maes Hendre. Meliden was commenced on 16th April, and at the end of the year 14 houses were completed and occupied.

Tenders for the construction of roads and sewers at the Pendyffryn Estate, Prestatyn were received at the end of the year. Those works are preparatory to the erection of dwellings for aged persons.

Application for loan sanction was made to the Welsh Office of the Ministry of Housing and Local Government at the end of the year, to improve 19 of the houses at Ffordd Bryn Melyd, Meliden, by the installation of water systems, the fitting of lavatory basins in the bathrooms, and new fireplaces.

292 of these houses have been built since the war.

90 new houses were completed by private enterprise during the year and 39 houses were in course of construction at the end of the year.

The list of applicants for housing still remains heavy, but the position has now eased and the majority of applicants living under very bad conditions have now been housed.

All our essential services have been carefully supervised as you will note from the report, and the standard of milk and ice cream production has been most satisfactory.

Appended are the Reports of the Public Health Inspector, the Inspector under the Food and Drugs Act and the Climatology readings as taken by Mr Grant.

My Report would not be complete without an expression of thanks to the Health Committee for their keen interest, activity and co-operation and to the Public Health Inspector and Staff of the Public Health Department for their keeness and energy in tackling the problems which arose during the year. To the Clerk and my colleagues on the Council staff I express my gratitude for their helpful co-operation.

### Water Supply

The Water Supply has been maintained at a high standard of purity.

All samples of treated water submitted for bacteriological examination were reported on as being satisfactory, with the exception of six samples, which were not quite up to the standard for treated water. The cause was found to be faulty working of the chlorination apparatus.

New mains were laid in Fern Avenue, back Warren Road, Service Roads fronting Victoria Road West, Roy Avenue, Green Lanes and Woodland Park, Prestatyn, Maes Hendre, Meliden, and Maes Glas, Dyserth.

A short length of steel main in Allt y Graig, Dyserth was relaid in spun iron pipes.

#### Sewerage

The sewerage scheme for the area, excluding Meliden, consists of a gravity scheme on the higher levels to which sewage is raised by Ejectors from the low lying areas, and the whole of the sewage is discharged untreated into the sea. The system has worked satisfactorily during the year. There is also a pumping station serving Y Ffrith which has operated satisfactorily.

Meliden Sewerage is also partly on the gravity system and partly pumped. The sewage is purified at a

disposal works and discharged into a watercourse. The system is satisfactory.

The surface water sewerage system is separate from the foul water system and is satisfactory except during abnormal rainfall. In the past flooding has only occurred to a small extent, largely due to the unsatisfactory state of land drainage south of the main railway line. Exceptional rainfall was experienced during August and substantial flooding occurred in lower High Street, Prestatyn. The cause of this flooding was still under investigation at the end of the year.

No major alteration or additions have been carried out during the year, and the proposed works referred to in last year's report are still awaiting loan sanction.

#### Food Supplies

Careful supervision has been maintained over the premises of retailers, especially those of Butchers, Bakeries and Dairies. For number of inspections and details of shops, etc., see Public Health Inspector's report. All meat sold in the area is killed and inspected at the Public Abattoir, Rhyl.

The need for the greatest care in the preparation and handling of cooked meats, pies and pastries cannot be too strongly stressed in view of unfortunate experiences in past years. Inspection of premises has revealed a high standard of cleanliness in most premises and the department's advice has been readily accepted when tendered.

#### Food Poisoning Outbreaks

Three cases of suspected food poisoning were notified during the year. No cause for the upset was found in any of the three cases notified.

## National Assistance Act, 1948

No formal action was taken under Section 47 of this Act during the year.

## Refuse Collection and Disposal

This service was operated under considerable difficulties during the year and it became impossible to guarantee a weekly collection during the whole of the year. The number of houses in the area is increasing annually and the Council will have to consider increasing the number of vehicles employed from two to three throughout the year if a weekly collection is to be maintained in the future.

## Swimming Pools

There are two privately owned swimming pools. in the district. Samples of water are taken for Bacteriological examination regularly during the summer season and are satisfactory in the main,

## GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA

#### Laboratory Facilities

These remain unchanged.

Pathological and bacteriological examinations of discharges, throat swabs, etc., are done at the Ministry of Health Laboratory, Conway. During 1956 they numbered 57.

In addition 124 samples of water, 46 samples of milk and 9 samples of ice cream were reported upon by the laboratory.

#### Ambulance Service

This service is now provided by the County Council through its Ambulance and Sitting Car Service. The Service has its Headquarters at Holywell. the 'phone number being Holywell 3373.

## Home Nursing

This is now a County Council Service, the Queen's Nurses being under the direction of the County Health Services.

There is the equivalent of three full time Home Helps available in this district. Further particulars can be obtained from the County Health Office, Mold.

#### Clinics

Ante-Natal and Child Welfare Clinics are under the control of the County Medical Officer of Health. Infant Welfare Centre held at the Prestatyn School Clinic, Kings Avenue, every Friday 1-30 to 4-30 p.m. A Medical Officer attends every first and third Friday.

Orthopaedic Clinic at the Old Emmanuel School, Rhyl every second and fourth Tuesday mornings 10-30 to 12-30, Orthopaedic Nurse attends every session. Surgeon attends every two months.

Ante-natal Clinics are conducted by the Obstretician and are held at the School and M. & C. W. Clinic, Kings Avenue on the first and second Friday in each month, at 9.30 a.m.

The Tuberculosis Clinic, in charge of the Medical Officers of the Welsh Regional Board has now removed to the Royal Alexandra Hospital, Rhyl and is held there every Friday morning at 10 a m.

Free Hospital, Sanatorium, Clinical and Domiciliary treatment is available to all persons suffering from tuberculosis by arrangements made with the Welsh Regional Board.

#### Venereal Disease

St. Asaph General Hospital Out Patients Departments. All forms of venereal disease are examined and treated under conditions of strict secrecy. Cost of travelling to The Infimary is paid, if patients cannot afford to do so the tracing of contacts and the follow up of defaulters is undertaken by the County Medical Officer's Department. The Clinic at St. Asaph General Hospital is held on Tuesdays, from 5.15 p.m.

#### Hospitals

There are none in the Urban Area

Infectious cases are treated at the Hawarden or Colwyn Bay Isolation Hospitals.

### Notification of Births, Maternity & Child Welfare

This service is entirely under the control of the Flintshire County Council and their health visitors.

#### Maternity Facilities

There are two private Maternity Homes in the area, and one, Chatsworth House, under the control of the Clwyd and Deeside Hospital Board,

There are four registered midwives practising in the area.

### Opthalmia Neonatorum

No cases have been reported during the year.

#### Scabies

No cases have been notified during the year.

#### **Tuberculosis**

For number of new cases, etc. see Table II.

No action required to be taken under the Public Health (Prevention of Tuberculosis) Regulations 1926 (relating to persons suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis employed in the milk trade) or under Section 172 of the Public Health Act, 1936 (relating to the compulsory removal to hospital of persons suffering from Tuberculosis)

The aftercare of persons suffering from Tuberculosis is dealt with by a special Committee, who meet quarterly to consider the needs, financial or otherwise of each individual case.

All patients are visited in their homes by specially appointed nurses under direction of the County Medical Officer and Tuberculosis Physician.

All dwellings are disinfected as and when required. A register is kept of all cases in the area.

#### **Zymotic Diseases**

The number notified during the year was 41 (fortyone). Of these one received treatment at an Isolation Hospital. Care is taken to see that all necessary disinfection of premises and clothing is carried out.

#### Immunisation

The above service was inaugurated in June, 1940. During the year 1956, 83 children received their primary immunisation, 36 of these were under 1 year of age, 40 between 1 and 5 years of age, and the remaining 7 were between the ages of 5 and 15 years. In addition 55 children received a boosting dose.

Since 1940, 2459 children have been immunised against diphtheria.

Immunisation is carried out either by the family doctor, or at the Welfare Clinic, Kings Avenue on the fourth Wednesday in each month, from 2 p.m to 3.30 p.m.

#### Vaccination

55 children under 1 year, 6 children aged 1 year, 5 children between the ages of 2 and 4 years, and 5 children aged 5 to 14 years were successfully given a primary vaccination during the year. 4 people aged 15 years and over were similarly treated.

52 people were revaccinated. 1 was aged between 2 and 4 years, 12 between 5 and 15 years, and 39 were 15 years of age or more.

## Rag Flock and Other Filling Material Act 1951

Premises on Register—Nil. No action necessary.

## Public Places of Entertainment

As required by Ministry of Health Circular 120/1920, all places of entertainment requiring Singing, Music and Dancing licences have been inspected for fire fighting apparatus, exits, general cleanliness, conveniences, etc., and except for minor defects, found to be satisfactory.

## Smoke Abatement

It has not been necessary to take any action as a result of smoke nuisances. This is largely due to the ready co-operation of the owners of fuel burning plant in the area.

#### Schools

Are under the control of the County Council Authority. The Heads of Schools are immediately notified of any cases of infectious diseases occuring amongst the scholars or in their homes.

#### Lodging Houses

There are no Common Lodging Houses within the district.

#### GENERAL STATISTICS & SOCIAL CONDITIONS

#### Social Conditions

The district is purely urban, and as a seaside resort its chief interest is the catering for and entertainment of visitors. There is a large amount of residential property which would have greatly increased but for building restrictions during the war. The population largely consists of retired people.

giving a rate per 1,000 population of 11.3 compared with the rate for England & Wales of 15.7. Corrected for strict comparison our rate would be 14.0 per 1,000 of the population. The correction is required because we have an older than average population.

Deaths of infants under the age of 1 year were 2, giving a rate of 19.2 per 1,000 live births. The rate for England and Wales was 23.8 per 1,000 live births.

#### Still Births

Total-nil.

#### Death Rate

The total number of deaths of residents credited to the area was 147. The number of deaths of residents and non-residents registered by the local Registrar was 95. To this total there has to be added 61 deaths of residents who died outside the area and from this total of 156 deaths have to be subtracted 9 deaths of non-residents who died in the Prestatyn U.D., which leaves us with our final figure of 147 deaths of residents.

These 147 deaths in ratio to our population of 9210 gives the district a crude death rate of 15.9 per 1,000 of the population. Corrected for comparative purposes our rate is 10.9 deaths per 1,000 of the population which compares favourably with the rate of 11.7 deaths per 1,000 of the population for England & Wales.

The outstanding feature is that 43 deaths were those of persons between 70 and 80 years of age, 46 those of persons between 80 and 90 years of age, and 5 deaths of persons over 90 years of age.

Heart diseases accounted for 51 deaths, Intra-

cranial haemorrhage for 33 deaths, and cancer for 18 deaths. All essentially diseases of elderly people.

Tuberculosis accounted for 1 death.

For a complete list of causes of death see Table iii.

#### Cemetery

There have been 66 interments in Coed Bell Cemetery during 1956 as compared with 73 in 1955.

The maintainence of a weekly collection with existing lorries and staff is becoming increasingly difficult. The town is growing in size each year and the service is greatly overtaxed during the summer season by the occupation of the camps and the influx of visitors into the area.

Serious onsideration will have to be given to the question of splitting up the area into three districts in the near future if the efficiency of the service is to be maintained.

Householders can assist by disposing of garden refuse themselves, and by keeping waste paper and rags out of the bin for salvage.

The work of operating a controlled tip on the newly acquired land is progressing satisfactorily and an area of approximately two acres of marshy ground has been covered to a depth of six feet'

A word of appreciation must go to the refuse collectors for their loyalty and cheerfulness in carrying out their duties in all kinds of weather.

Sick leave taken by the refuse staff (12 men) during the year totalled 223 days as compared with 106 days last year.

2562 loads weighing 5529 tons were collected and disposed of, also, 26 nightsoil pails are serviced each week.

No charge is made for disposal of refuse at the Refuse Tip by private persons residing within the Urban Area.

The work of salvage disposal was seriously curtailed during the summer by a fire which occurred in June and completely destroyed the baling shed and all the equlpment, including the baling machine. However, thanks to the good offices of the Chief Public Health Inspector of Rhyl, we were able to dispose of limited amounts. Two new sheds have been built and a new baler put into operation to replace those destroyed.

The introduction of a system of quotas by the Mills also contributed to the lower output during 1956.

It is hoped that efforts will continue to be made to salvage as much material as in the past, since the revenue from such a source can make a considerable contribution to the rate fund.

Salvage paper is sold to The Thames Board Mills, all other materials such as rags and iron being disposed of locally.

The saving of tipping space, together with the improved conditions of the Refuse Tip fully justifies the cost of separating and bailing.

(III) 254 visits of inspection have been paid to Food premises in general, and 183 to those premises which are registered under the above mentioned Act and Regulations.

The year under review saw the advent of the Food Hygiene Regulations 1955—1956, which applied to all food premises.

A resumé of the provisions of the Regulations was circularised to all food traders, the majority of whom have taken steps to comply with requirements. The services of the Department have frequently been called upon in an advisory capacity by occupiers who wished to bring their premises up to standards and conditions generally have improved.

Although the Food Hygiene Regulations have laid down certain standards which are expected to be reached, the customer can obtain more far-reaching results by refusing to accept anything less than the cleanest of conditions, not only in shop premises, but in the way foodstuffs are handled generally, and I am pleased to observe a growing tendency on the part of the public to demand these better conditions.

## Rodent Infestation Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949

The duties of the Rodent Officer are carried out by the General Assistant in the Health Department.

The sewers were testbaited during the year. 45 manholes were baited at various points on the sewerage system. There were 3 "part-bait takes" which indicates that the rat population of the sewers at that time was practically nil.

Small infestations, chiefly in private dwellings are dealt with as they arise, but those inhabitants who keep poultry or are bird lovers could assist in keeping down the number of infestations by taking tare that no unconsumed food is allowed to remain on or near the ground.

Residents are extremely co-operative in reporting the presence of rats or mice, and the Department endeavours to take prompt action on receipt of such reports.

The disinfestation service is free to householders and a small charge is made for work done on business premises.

The Refuse Tip and Sewage Works are treated regularly, and there is no "resident" rat population, but numbers sometimes increase at harvest time.

The use of "Wafarin" has proved to be very effective and it has been possible to clear up all infestations, both major and minor, with safety as far as other animals are concerned.

Tan-y-Don is a Caravan Club Site.

The sites are very well conducted and the owners co-operate fully with this Department in keeping the sites clean and tidy. Bastion Road Camp has a Camping Association with a form of "self government" of the site.

The district is very popular with organisations such as Boy Scouts, Boys Brigade, etc., and individual Campers. During the month of August several fields are occupied by these camps. Inspections are made and I find that, almost without exception, they are maintained in good condition.

#### Talacre Warren

There are 78 hutments within the district, 24 of which are permanently occupied. The remainder are occupied during the summer months only.

The area is not sewered, nightsoil is disposed of by chemical closets and sullage water is drained to soakaways. Owing to the fact that much of this land is very low-lying, if is frequently flooded in winter, causing excessive dampness in many of the dwellings.

The water supply is provided by the Holywell Rural District Council and is not always sufficient to meet the very great demand made upon it during the summer months, when the population is very much increased by holiday makers.

Household refuse is collected once weekly by this Department, but difficulties are arising due to the indiscriminate dumping of refuse in the area by residents living elsewhere.

The standard of housing in this area is very low, the majority being suitable for inclusion in the Council's rehousing programme. It is possible that this area may revert to its original use for camping in the not too distant future, but if this scheme does not reach fruition, the Council will be obliged to take action.

#### Public Conveniences

There are eight public conveniences in the town, and are situated at the Parking Ground, near the Palladium Cinema, Coronation Gardens, two at the Central Beach, near the Golf House Hotel, at the Hillside Gardens, at Meliden, and on the Ffrith Beach.

It is with regret that I have to state once again, that although every effort is made to keep the conveniences clean they are often sadly misused and much wanton damage is done.

The conveniences at the Central Beach, Barkby Avenue and the Hillside are not of the standard which is desired. and it is hoped that the question of the provision of adequate new facilities in these areas will be considered in the near future.

The foregoing figures may give the impression that there is but a small overcrowding problem. It must, however, be remembered that these figures refer to "legal over-crowding" in which the standard is very low compared with the normal standards in this area.

The legal standard recognises living rooms as sleeping rooms, so that an ordinary 5 roomed house (2 living rooms and 3 bedrooms) could house 10 adults without been legally overcrowded.

In considering the cases of applicants for houses the Council recognises a "bedroom standard" for over-crowding and this has helped to relieve many cases of near legal overcrowding.
