It gives us and the Public Health Inspector great pleasure to present our report on the health of the district for the year of 1971.

Reorganisation of the Health Services will in the near future be implemented; this will unify the present tripartite system comprising the Local Authority Health Services, Hospital Services, and Executive Council. Services, under one Area Health Authority. The date of implementation is April 1st. 1974 simultaneously with Reorganisation of Local Government. The success of these new authorities will depend on the preparation, enthusiasm and diligence of all concerned now and after April, 1974.

The Social Services Act 1970 was implemented in April, 1971 and brought the social care of the deprived child, the adult handicapped (both mentally and physically) and the elderly under the new Social Services Department of the County Council. Thus this new department has taken over the functions of the Children's and Welfare Departments of the County Council in toto and also certain functions of the County Health Department, namely the Home Help and Mental Welfare Services.

There were 52 deaths during the year compared with 55 in 1970; a 5% decrease in the total deaths. The crude death rate was 11.6 per 1,000 population which after adjustment for the age and sex distrubution of the population gives a corrected death rate of 7.5 which is better than that for 1970 (9.4) and compares very favourably with that of England and Wales (11.6).

No deaths occurred in the 0-15 year age group and only one death in the 15-24 year age group. 42% (22) of the total deaths occurred in persons over 75 years of age and 37%(19) of the deaths occurred in the 65-74 year age group; thus of all the deaths 79% occurred in persons over 65 years of age.

28 deaths were due to disease of the heart and circulation, this is over half (54%) of the total deaths. Cerebrovascular disease was the largest single cause of death accounting for ten deaths; followed by ischaemic heart disease and other heart disease each of which caused 6 deaths.

Malignant disease (cancer) caused 13 deaths (25%) of the total deaths with the stomach being the commonest site of origin (4) followed by intestine (2) breast (2) and uterus (1). There were no deaths from cancer of the lung this year compared with 2 deaths in 1970.

Diseases which have been associated with cigarette smoking namely ischaemic heart disease (6 deaths), cancer of the lung (no deaths) and bronchitis and emphysema (2 deaths) caused 8 deaths i.e. 15% of the total, this compares with 21 deaths in 1970 i.e. 38% of the total. It is extremely gratifying to note this reduction and it is hoped that a further reduction will occur in future years as people appreciate the folly of the deadly pleasure of cigarette smoking.

Influenza caused one death in an elderly lady. Pneumonia caused one death in a lady in the 65-74 year age group and cirrhosis of the liver caused one death in a man in the same age group.

One death occurred in a man aged in the 45-54 year age group from disease of the kidneys. It is hoped, with the establishment of the Renal Dialysis Unit at the Royal Alexandra Hospital, Rhyl and the increasing use of kidney machines in the home that fewer deaths from this disease will occur. It is also to be hoped that more people will be prepared to donate their kidneys on death to alleviate the present shortage of kidneys for transplantation.

There was one accidental death in a lady in the 65-74 year age group and one suicidal death in a young man.

Infant Mortality

For the second year in succession there were no infant deaths giving an Infant Mortality Rate of Nil per thousand live births compated with 18 for England and Wales.

Stillbirth Rate

There were two stillbirths during the year, one in a premature male infant due to a congenital abnormality and the second in a full term baby. This gives a stillbirth rate of 33 per thousand births compated with Nil for 1970 and 12 for England and Wales. The peri-natal mortality is the number of stillbirths and deaths in the first week of life per thousand total births and for 1971 was 33 compared with Nil in 1970 and 22 for England and Wales.

Neo-natal and Early Neo-natal Mortality

There were no deaths in the neo-natal period giving an early neonatal mortality and neo-natal mortality of Nil per thousand live births compared with 10 and 12 respectively for England and Wales.

As can be seen from the table, no infectious diseases were notified during the year compared with 32 last year. This is the first year that no cases of infectious disease has been notified. It is gratifying to record this absence of notified diseases, but it is too early to be complacent and although many infectious diseases such as diphtheria, whooping cough, and poliomyelitis have been conquered, these diseases will recurr if immunisation procedures are relaxed. Continued vigilance is essential to control enterically transmitted diseases such as food poisoning, dysentery and infectious jaundice, and with increasing travel it is important to prevent the importation of diseases such as enteric fever, smallpox and cholera.

Anthrax

There were no cases of Anthrax reported during the year.

Brucellosis No human cases were reported during the year.

Milk from all producer/retailers who sell raw milk to the public are taken at least every quarter by the County Public Health Inspector. Measures are being introduced to eradicate this disease from cattle, and until this reservoir of infection is eliminated, those who drink raw (untreated) milk will run the risk of contracting this insidious disease, which can lead to chronic ill-health.

The number of children completing primary courses of immunisation against diphtheria, tetanus and poliomyelitis are extremely satisfactory and this ensures such a high degree of immunity in the child population that no outbreaks of these diseases will occur. The number who received smallpox vaccinations was much fewer and will be even fewer in the future years, because of the declining world incidence of this disease. However, smallpox is still present in certain countries in Asia and South America and the eradication of the disease from Asia received a major setback with the outbreak of war in Bangledesh. Vaccination of health staff and travellers to endemic areas is still necessary.

The number of children receiving protection against measles is not as satisfactory and outbreaks of the disease will occur while a large proportion of children remain susceptable to the disease. Measles is now the most serious of the common childhood diseases and causes much misery. More important however, than the misery that infection causes are the complications, such as pneumonia, ear infection, and encephalitis (inflammation of the brain), which may occur as a result of measles. It is no longer necessary for any child to be exposed to the risk of these complications when such a highly effective vaccine is available.

The response to the offer of rubella vaccine to girls of secondary school age has been very encouraging and with the increasing supplies of vaccine which became available during 1971 it has been possible to offer the vaccination to girls in their first year at secondary school as well as to older girls. The procedure is simple and only involves one injection. A survey is in progress to asses the effectiveness of the vaccination programme in reducing the congenital abnormalities which result from infection with rubella during early programcy. It will of course be many years before the results are known.

Ice Cream

No samples of ice cream were taken for bacteriological examination. There is one manufacture of ice cream in the Borough and all the other ice cream sold is manufactured by large firms who sample regularly throughout the country. The registered premises are satisfactory.

Offices, Shops and Railway Premises Act. 1963

18 visits have been made to these premises during the year and there are 90 registed premises within the Borough.

Water Supply

The water supply to the town is the responsibility of the West Denbighshire and West Flintshire Water Board. The Board takes samples as a safeguard to ensure that their plant is working correctly and we, as a Public Health Authority, take samples so that the public are safeguarded against any error or breakdown which could not be foreseen.

Housing

During 1971 there were no Council Houses erected in the Borough, but there are 519 houses owned by the Council out of a total of 1683 rated houses.

The need for suitable houses for elderly people is increasing and a scheme should be considered for providing more bungalows. As well as this a way should be devised to encourage older people living on their own in large council houses to accept smaller accommodation, thus releasing more houses for the younger families who need 2 or 3 bedroomed houses.

When allocating houses more consideration should be given to the correct use of accommodation so that there is very little chance of under-occupation, picking and choosing low and high rented houses on different estates, and even individual houses. If the need is great enough provision should be made so that all applicants accept the first house that is available, unless there is a very good medical reason for not taking it.

Sewerage and Sewage Disposal

The Surveyor reports:-

The Sewage works was completed 4 years ago and is now showing signs of needing to be increased to cope with the expansion of the town. During the last 3 years almost 400 properties have been built within the Borough. The Planning Officer has mentioned that the Ruthin Farm Lands could be developed at a future date and I also envisage the Llanfwrog area opened up for development.

The settlement tank built at the auction mart has relieved the loading on the works. The sewage works were never designed to deal with the direct loading from this establishment when there are large marts, cleaning of lorries

and cleaning down in progress, and I would suggest that a sludge pump be used to pump humus and sludge on to the land at the sewage works.

May I point out that the Borough is not unique in the fact that a comparatively new sewage works will have to be enlarged. This pleasant town and many others like it are becoming the places where people want to live in, rather than the highly populated industrial areas. The town could increase its population again by half the present numbers without spoiling its beauty and character. The planning officer has produced a Town Plan which should make Ruthin into an ideal town. The purchasing of a sludge pump and governing trade effluent discharge could save the expense of enlarging the works at present.

Public Conveniences

These have been maintained in a satisfactory condition. They are cleaned every morning and damage and filthiness have occurred after a period of cleansing on numberous occasions. Public convenience artists and pornographic writers have been a nuisance, but these are found in all towns. During the summer months these toilets are cleaned twice a day, and every endeavour is made to keep the walls clean.

Refuse Collection.

The town is served with a regular weekly collection of house refuse and approximately 2,050 bins are collected weekly. The Council has a comparatively new refuse vehicle of a larger capacity to cope with the increased quantity of refuse collection and the increasing number of properties. A satisfactory collection of house refuse is being maintained.

Refuse Disposal

The refuse tip is being maintained in as clean a condition as possible and controlled tipping is carried out to the best of our ability, having regard to the covering material and plant available and the extra loads brought in from the Ruthin Rural District Council. During the year the Ruthin Rural District Council deposited 1244 loads at the tip. The large quantities of soil and rubble deposited at the tip is being used for covering materials and reclaiming land. The quantity of refuse is continually increasing, and unless a machine is purchased for covering it there will be problems ahead.

Offensive Trades

There are five fish frying establishments within the Borough, and no complaints have been received about them during the year.

Rodent Control.

During the year 26 properties were successfully treated against rats and mice, and all infestations notified to the Office are promptly dealt with.
