ZYMOTIC DEATH-RATE

It is satisfactory to observe that not a single death was accounted for by Zymotic Disease.

BIRTHS

The total number of Births registered during the year as 115, being 65 males and 50 females (including 3 males illegitimate). This number, based upon a population of 8546 is equivalent to an Annual Birth Rate of 13.4 per 1,000, as compared with 12.8 for the previous year and 15.0 for England and Wales for the present year.

DEATHS

During the past year there were 141 deaths registered as having occurred in the District, these being 73 males and 68 females, equal to an Annual death-rate per 1,000 of 15.7 as compared with 15.2 for the previous year, and 12.1 for England and Wales for the present year.

CANCER

27 persons died from the above disease, 18 being males and 9 females. This is equivalent to a mortality of 3.02 per 1,000 of the population and at the rate of 191 per 1,000 deaths registered.

MORTALITY AMONDST PURSONS OVER 65 YEARS

78 of the total number of deaths (141), viz.:- 45 males and 35 females, occurred in persons who were over 65 years of ago. This is equal to a death-rate of 553 per 1,000 deaths registered, as compared with 478 for the previous year.

16 were between 65 and 70 years. 34 : : 70 and 80 years. 22 : : 80 and 90 years. 6 were over 90 years.

INFANTILE MORTALITY

Six deaths of infants under one year were registered, being 4 males and 2 females. This equals a rate of 52 per 1,000 births registered, as compared with the rate of 90 for the previous year and 50 for England and Wales, for the present year.

There were no deaths from Diarrhoea and Enteritis under 2 years of ago, while the rate for England and Wales for the present year was 4.6 per 1,000 live births.

TUBERCULOSIS

During the year, only one death from this disease occurred, this being due to Pulmonary Tuberculesis, and is equivalent to the low mortality of 0.1 per 1,000 of population or at the rate of 7 per 1,000 deaths registered as compared with a rate of 0.4 and 31 respectively for the previous year. This is the lewest rate recorded in the district.

Four cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis were notified, these being four females; also five non-Pulmonary Tuberculosis, being three males and two females.

It will be observed from the above table that Scarlet Fever case were distributed throughout the district and not due to any epidemic. Many of these cases were due to infection from cutside the district and not any could be accounted for by any local insanitary conditions.

It is gratifying to observe that only three cases of Diphtheria were notified during the year. One contracted the infection in another district, the two others were Masal Diphtheria one of which was an Evacuee. This freedom from Diphtheria is a record in the district and undoubtedly attributable to the immunisation against Diphtheria of practically all the children of school age and also of those under five years.

It is also satisfactory to note that not a single death was caused by any of the infectious discases.

POLIOMYELITIS

Two cases of this disease were notified, one being in Clawddnewydd and the other in the Llanrhaiadr District. The source of infection could not be ascertained in either case. Both of the cases were treated at the Isolation Hospital.

DISINFMOTION OF CLOTHING

Arrangements have been made to have all infected clothing in cases of notifiable infectious diseases disinfected at the Isolation Hospital, and those in cases of Tuberculosis at the North Wales Sanatorium.

DIPHTHERIA IMMUNIZATION

Immunisation of School Children against Diphtheria was commenced during the latter part of 1938 and completed in March 1939. The number immunised in the Schools was 785; also a fair number were done at their own home. As will be observed in a previous paragraph the beneficial result has been most gratifying.

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES IN THE AREA

Water Supply

The Prion Scheme, which was carried out as far as Pantpystynog,
Llanrhaiadr by the end of 1938, was completed in October 1939 and supplies a
large area of the district where a supply was very much needed. This and the
Llanarmon Scheme, which was completed at the end of last year, are proving
highly satisfactory and much appreciated in the various localities supplied.
The Water Supply at Brynoglwys has been under consideration by the Council and
undoubtedly a new scheme would have been constructed except for the abnormal
conditions which caused the difficulties of obtaining the necessary material

Seventy dwellings, including a large number of farms have received a new supply during the year.

Several samples of Water were sent away for chemical and bacteriological analysis, one of which only proved unsatisfactory and necessitated further purification.

Rivers and Streams.

One stream was polluted by whey from a Milk Factory; as the new Factory has now been completed and which has a most efficient drainage system, it is assumed that no further pollution will take place.

Drains and Sewerage

Twenty seven cases of defective drainage were dealt with and remedied, in 19 cases of which new drains were laid.

Closet Accommodation

During the year 35 new Water Closets were provided for existing premises.

Scavenging.

A highly satisfactory scheme has been arranged by the Council for the removal of refuse throughout all the district.

A Dump has been provided in 6 localities into which the refuse is conveyed by Motor Lorries.

SANITARY INSPECTOR'S REPORT

Propared under the Sanitary Officers Order, 1928.

As a result of inspection carried out during the year, 154 muisances were found to exist. Of this number, 146 were remedied, leaving 8 outstanding at the end of the year.

HOUSING

The number of new houses erected during the year was 11 and 5 were re-conditioned under the Rural Workers Act.

As mentioned in my last Annual Report, there is still a scarcity of houses and especially those containing three Bedrooms in the District, consequently over-crowding still exists and owing to the present conditions existing it has been very difficult to remedy this condition, although the Council is making every effort to deal with the question. In four instances the condition was remedied.

There are about 540 Farms under supervision and 62 Registered Milk Sellers (Dairies) 47 of which supply Grade "A" Accredited Milk and Tuberculin Tested.
