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
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EXTRACTS FROM VITAL STATISTICS OF THE YEAR

#### ZYMOTIC DEATH RATE

Only one death attributable to Zymotic Diseases has occurred, this being caused by Diptheria.

#### BIRTHS

The total number of Births registered during the year was 124, being 59 males and 65 females, including 3 males and 11 females illegitimate. This number based upon a population of 9497 is equivalent to an Annual Birth Rate of 13.05 per 1000 as compared with 13.4 for the previous year and 14.6 for England and Wales for the present year.

#### DEATHS.

During the year 128 Deaths were registered, these being 67 males and 61 females, equal to an Annual death rate per 1000 of 13.5 as compared with 15.7 for the previous year and 14.3 for England and Wales for the present year. This is the lowest rate recorded in the district for some years.

#### CANCER

16 persons died from Cancer within the year, being 9 males and 7 females.

Seven were cancer of Stomach and Duodenum, one of Oesaphagus and eight of all other sites. The total is equivalent to 1.8 per 1000 of the population and at the rate of 125 per 1000 deaths registered. This compares favourably with the rates of the provious year which were 3.02 and 191 respectively.

A mild opidemic of influenza was provalent in the district during Fibruary and March and also a number of cases of German Measles occurred during the summer months. A severe opidemic of measles was provalent during the latter part of the year and this spread throughout the District.

With the exception of Measles, the incidence of infectious diseases in the District was again comparatively low. Of the total number of Scarlet Fever cases, 9 occurred in Children's Camps and 2 in Public Institutions, leaving 15 out of the number which occurred amongst the resident population. Also 6 of the Diphtheria cases occurred in Camps and 2 Public Institutions, leaving only 2 which occurred among the normal population, one of these being masal.

#### DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION

The number of children immunised against Diphtheria up to the end of the year was 450. This added to the number completed in 1939 gives a total of 1,225. It is gratifying to observe that not a single case of Diphtheria has occurred in any of the children who have so far been immunized. In addition, a number of children were immunised at their own homes, of which no record is available.

#### GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

There have been no changes during the year in the services provided under the following headings except the establishment of the "INCERCENCY FUBLIC HEALTH LABORATORY SE VICE" at CONMAY which is exceptionally efficient and helpful:-

## SANITARY CIRCUNSTANCES IN THE AREA

Mater Supply. The existing water schemes which practically supply the whole of the district continue to be satisfactory and every effort is always made to remody defects which may arise in any locality.

37 dwellings, including a number of farms have received a new supply during the year.

9 samples of water were sent away for chemical and bacteriological analysis and any which required durther purification were dealt with.

Rivers and Streams. No cases of stream pollution occurred during the year.

Drains and Severage. 23 cases of defective drainage were dealt with and remedied, in 18 cases of which new drains were laid.

Closet Acconnodation. During the year 38 new Mater Closets were provided for existing premises.

Scavenging. The scheme arranged by the Council for the removal of refuse continues to be very efficient.
