THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS of the RUTHIN RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL

I have the honour to submit my Annual Report upon the sanitary condition of the District, with various statistics, for the year ended 31st. December, 1943.

The total number of births was 153, being 78 males and 75 females, 4 males and 3 females being illegitimate. Birth rate per 1,000 of estimated population being 14.6 as compared with 11.8 for the previous year and 16.5 for England and Wales for the present year.

STILL-BIRTHS

1 male - 1 female - all legitimate.

Rate per 1,000 total births equals 15 and 0.19 per thousand population as compared with the rate of 39 and 0.45 respectively for the previous year and 0.54 for England and Wales for the present year.

DEATHS.

60 males and 66 females - total 126 equal to a death rate per 1,000 of estimated population of 12.08 as compared with 10.5 for the previous year and 12.1 for England and Wales for the present year. This is the lowest death rate recorded in the Area for a considerable time.

The number of cases notified during the year was 14, being 6 males and 8 females, as compared with 16 for the previous year.

The total number of cases suffering from Respiratory Tuberculosis was 10, being 4 males and 6 females, of these 5 did not belong to the District.

The number of Non-Respiratory cases was 4, being 1 male and 3 females, one of whom did not belong to the District.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES

The incidence of notifiable diseases has been remarkably low within the District during the year.

The following cases were notified :-

With regard to Scarlet Fever cases, nine of these occurred in Children's Camps and Public Institutions - 6 were evacuated persons. 8 cases occurred in Pwllglas District 5 being the same house. The remainder were sporadic cases occurring in various localities.

It is gratifyinh to observe that only 4 Diphtheria cases were notified in the District, one of which occurred in a Public Institution, the other 3 occurred in different localities.

An epidemic of Measles was prevalent throughout the District during the first 4 months of the year.

No deaths were attributable to any of the above infectious diseases.

DIPHTHERIA PROPHYLAXIS
