### LIVE BIRTHS

The total number of births was 156, being 80 males and 76 females, 4 males and 8 females being illegitimate. Birth rate per 1,000 of estimated population being 15.3 as compared with 14.6 for the previous year and 17.6 for England and Wales for the present year. This is the highest rate recorded in the area since 1930.

### STILL BIRTHS ...

1 male, 2 females - all legitimate.

Rate per 1,000 total births equals 19 and 0.29 per thousand population as compared with the rate of 15 and 0.19 respectively for the previous year and 0.50 for England and Wales for the present year.

# DEATHS

54 males and 58 females - total 112 equal to a death rate per 1,000 of estimated population of 11.08 as compared with 12.08 for the previous year and 11.6 for England and Wales for the present year. This is the lowest death rate recorded in the Ruthin Rural District.

The number of cases notified during the year was 10, being 2 males and 8 females as compared with 14 for the previous year.

The total number of cases suffering from Repiratory Tuberculosis was 9, being 2 males and 7 females, of these 3 did not belong to the District - (1 male and 2 females).

Only one Non-Respiratory case was notified.

29 cases of defective drainage were dealt with and remedied, in 10 cases of which new drains were laid.

# CLOSET ACCOMMODATION

During the year & new Water Closets were provided for existing premises.

### SCAVENGING

The scheme arranged by the Council for the removal of refuse continues to be very efficient, but owing to the shortage of drivers, a delay occasionally occurs.

As a result of inspection carried out during the year, 153 nuisances were found to exist. Of this number 147 were remedied, leaving 6 outstanding at the end of the year.
