LIVE BIRTHS

The total number of births was 159, being 81 males and 78 females, 4 males and 7 females being illegitimate. Birth rate per 1,000 of estimated population being 16.1 as compared with 14.6 for the previous year and 19.1 for England and Wales for the present year.

STILL BIRTHS

The total number of still births was 3, being 1 male and 2 females. Rate per 1,000 total births equals 18 and 0.30 per thousand population as compared with the rate of 33 and 0.51 respectively for the previous year and 0.53 for England and Wales for the present year.

DEATHS

69 males and 62 females—total 131, equal to a death rate per 1,000 of estimated population of 13.2, as compared with 12.5 for the previous year and 11.5 for England and Wales for the present year.

The number of cases notified during the year was 10 respiratory and 1 female non-respiratory. The respiratory cases consisted of 7 males and 3 females, as compared with 6 males and 12 females for the previous year.

Tuberculosis accounted for five deaths. Three males and one female respiratory and one male non-respiratory. The total number of deaths from this disease during the year was equivalent to 37 per 1,000 deaths registered.

11 cases of Sonne Dysentery were notified, 5 being in the Pwllglas district, and 6 occurring in two farms in Gyffylliog. Also 6 cases of Flexnor Dysentery occurred in a large children's school. Careful investigations were made respecting these outbreaks, but no definite cause was ascertained. The water supply, which was derived from a polluted stream, was considered a possible cause in the farm cases.

The two Diphtheria cases which were notified occurred in persons who had not been immunised.

The Scarlet Fever cases occurred in various localities, and were all of a mild nature.

An epidemic of Whooping Cough was prevalent in Llandegla, Llanelidan, and the adjoining localities. This commenced in July and continued until the end of the year.

DIPHTHERIA PROPHYLAXIS

Immunisation against Diphtheria has been efficiently carried out during the year, and the percentage immunised is probably as high as can be attained. Age group 0—5 is approximately 99.4, and age group 5—15 is 99.6. Approximately 600 repeat doses were administered.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES IN THE AREA

Water Supply

Schemes of water supply involving improvements in filtration, chlorination and storage, together with the laying of many miles of new water mains, are being formulated. These schemes are intended to give piped supplies to areas in the District which are now without such public supplies, and are also for the purpose of improving supplies to certain areas now inadequately served. Piped supplies are proposed for Waen and Geinas (Aberwheeler), Nantglyn, Gyffylliog village and farm areas to the west of the village; Farm areas in the Llanrhaiadr and Llanynys Parishes; Bontuchel village (Llanfwrog and Llanynys); Farm areas in Derwen and Clocaenog Parishes; Graigfechan and Pentrecelyn, and farm areas in the Llanfair D.C. Parish, and areas between Llanarmon and Landegla villages. Improvements to existing plant and piped supplies are proposed for Bryneglwys Parish; the Nant-y-Ne source (Llangynhafal); the Prion supply at Meifod (Llanrhaiadr), and the Cricor supply (Llanfair D.C.). Existing sources of supply which are of poor quality or which fail in dry seasons will be abandoned in favour of reliable sources. A number of these schemes have now been submitted to the County Council and to the Welsh Board of Health for approval,

During the year 20 additional properties—dwelling houses and farms—were connected to the Council's mains, as well as 12 cattle troughs in fields.

Approximately 50% of the houses throughout the Rural District have a piped water supply; when the schemes already mentioned are in operation this percentage will be greatly increased.

Rivers and Streams

The Scheme for the abatement of stream pollution to which I referred in my last report has had to be revised and is now in an advanced state of preparation. When the work is completed no further complaints should arise.

Drains and Sewerage

12 cases of defective drainage were dealt with, and in 8 cases new drains were laid.

Closet Accommodation

During the year only 4 new water closets were provided for existing premises. The great difficulty in obtaining materials and skilled labour to carry out the work militated against greater improvements.

Scavenging

The Council's Scheme for the removal of refuse continues to function well, and with the return from the Forces of the men in charge of the Plant, many difficulties have been overcome. The outstanding nuisances from the previous year were remedied, and all other complaints promptly dealt with.

Following inspections carried out during the year:-

51 nuisances existed.

Sewerage Disposal

Engineers were engaged by the Council during the year to prepare modern schemes of Sewerage Disposal for nearly all the villages in the District. The preliminary survey work was carried out and a number of schemes were prepared for submission to the Ministry. I sincerely hope that an early start will be made on these schemes.

Milk and Dairies Order

Number of farms—791, of which 41 are T. Tested and 65 Accredited, as compared with the numbers 749, 41 and 62 for the previous year.

There is one Authority in the District authorised to operate Milk Heat Treatment Plants. The Creamery treat from 8,000 to 22,000 gallons per day during the peak periods. Regular samples were taken for Phosphatase and Methylene Blue Tests, and only on one occasion was the milk found to be below standard.
