LIVE BIRTHS

The total number of births was 156, being 80 males and 76 females, 9 males and 5 females being illegitimate. Birth rate per 1,000 of estimated population being 15.6 as compared with 16.1 for the previous year and 20.5 for England and Wales for the present year.

STILL BIRTHS

The total number of still births was 3, being 2 males and 1 female. Rate per 1,000 total births equals 19 and 0.30 per thousand population, as compared with the rate of 18 and 0.30 respectively for the previous year, and 0.50 for England and Wales for the present year.

DEATHS

Sixty-five males and 53 females—total 118, equal to a death rate per 1,000 of estimated population of 11.8, as compared with 13.2 for the previous year and 12.0 for England and Wales for the present year.

The number of cases notified during the year was 21, as compared with 11 for the previous year.

Tuberculosis accounted for 6 deaths, 3 males and 3 females respiratory. The total number of deaths from this disease during the year was equivalent to 50 per 1,000 deaths registered.

Scarlet Fever.

Fifteen of the Scarlet Fever cases occurred at a large Children's School. The outbreak was of an exceptionally mild character. Two cases were in a Prisoner-of-War Camp, and the other two cases were in the Llanarmon locality.

Acute Poliomyelitis.

Five cases of the above disease occurred within the District during the year. Detailed report of each case was forwarded to the Welsh Board of Health at time of notification.

The first case was in August — a young child of 2½ years — in Llandegla. This was an exceptionally mild case, one leg only being slightly affected. There was no history of any acute illness previously.

Three cases were notified during September, one being a girl of 14, in a farm house in Llanelidan; the second being a farmer's wife, aged 28, in Gyffylliog; and the third was in Llanfair district, she was a married lady aged 41 from Liverpool, who had resided in the district for about five weeks previous to the illness.

The fifth case was a girl of 12 years of age who came from Manchester on a visit to Bontuchel. She was found to be suffering from the disease on her arrival.

These last four cases were of a severe type, and received Hospital Treatment. All eventually recovered.

All the cases were miles apart from each other, and there was no evidence that any had been in contact with other cases.

Whooping Cough.

An epidemic of this disease started in the previous year through one side of the District, particularly Llanfair, Derwen and Clocaenog areas, and continued during the early part of the year. A few other cases occurred in other localities during the remainder of the year.

Measles.

Twenty-seven cases of this disease were notified. These occurred in various parts of the district, and were not confined to any one locality.

DIPHTHERIA PROPHYLAXIS

It will be noticed on the report that not a single case of Diphtheria was notified during the year, which definitely proves the high efficiency of Immunisation against the disease, and it does also emphasise the great importance of continuing this prophylaxis without relaxation, and consequently the responsibility on the part of parents and all in charge of children to see that they are all immunised.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES IN THE AREA

Water Supply.

Schemes of water supply involving improvements in filtration, chlorination and storage, together with the laying of many miles of new water mains, are being formulated. These schemes are intended to give piped supplies to areas in the District which are now without such public supplies, and are also for the purpose of improving supplies to certain areas now inadequately served. Piped supplies are proposed for Waen and Geinas (Aberwheeler), Nantglyn, Gyffylliog village and farm areas to the west of the village; Farm areas in the Llanrhaidr and Llanynys Parishes; Bontuchel village (Llanfwrog and Llanynys); Farm areas in Derwen and Clocaenog Parishes; Graigfechan and Pentrecelyn, and farm areas in the Llanfair D.C. Parish, and areas between Llanarmon and Llandegla villages. Improvements to existing plant and piped supplies are proposed for Bryneglwys Parish; the Nant-y-Ne source (Llangynhafal); the Prion supply at Meifod (Llanrhaidr), and the Cricor supply (Llanfair D.C.). Existing sources of supply which are of poor quality or which fail in dry seasons will be abandoned in favour of reliable sources. Most of these schemes have now been submitted to the County Council and to the Welsh Board of Health for Approval, and revision of certain schemes has been undertaken. It is anticipated that the first of these schemes will be started next year.

During the year, 22 additional properties—dwelling houses and farms—were connected to the Council's mains, as well as 10 cattle troughs in fields.

Approximately 50% of the houses throughout the Rural District have a piped water supply; when the schemes already mentioned are in operation this percentage will be greatly increased.

Rivers and Streams.

Further revisions of the scheme for the abatement of stream pollution to which I referred in my last report have been necessary, and final details will be submitted to the Welsh Board of Health next year. When the work is completed, no further complaints should arise.

Drains and Sewerage.

Eleven cases of defective drainage were dealt with, and in four cases new drains were laid.

Closet Accommodation.

During the year, only three new water closets were provided for existing premises. The great difficulty in obtaining materials and skilled labour to carry out the work militated against greater improvements.

Scavenging.

The Council's Scheme for the removal of refuse continues to function well, but the provision of a new lorry is essential. All complaints were investigated and promptly dealt with.

Following inspections carried out during the year:—

37 nuisances existed.

Sewerage Disposal.

Considerable progress was made in the preparation of modern schemes of Sewerage Disposal for nearly all the villages in the District. A number of these schemes have now been submitted to the Welsh Board of Health for approval, and it is anticipated that the first of these schemes will be started next year.

There is one Authority in the District authorised to operate Milk Heat Treatment Plants. The Creamery treat from 8,000 to 22,000 gallons per day during peak periods. Regular samples were taken for **Phosphatase & Methylene Blue Tests**, and on no occasion was the milk found to be below standard.
