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There were 102 deaths during the year compared with 122 the previous year, giving a death rate of 11.16 compared with 13.30 in 1965 and 11.7 for England and Wales. Of these 102 deaths, 75 occurred in persons aged 65 years and over.

There was 1 death due to tuberculosis compared with nil in 1965. Malignant diseases caused 20 deaths compared with 33 the previous year. Of these, 3 were due to cancer of the lungs compared with 2 the previous year.

Diabetes caused 2 deaths compared with 2 the previous year.

Vascular lesions of the nervous system caused 14 deaths compared with 23 in 1965. As is to be expected, these occurred mostly in the older age groups.

Coronary diseases and angina accounted for 23 deaths compared with 26 the previous year. Hypertension with heart disease accounted for 3 deaths and other heart diseases caused 15 deaths. Other circulatory diseases caused 3 deaths.

There were 3 deaths due to pneumonia compared with 4 the previous year. Bronchitis accounted for 2 deaths in people aged 75 years of age and 1 other death was caused by other diseases of the respiratory system.

Ulcer of the stomach was the cause of death in 2 people and congenital malformation, other defined and ill-defined diseases accounted for 6 deaths. There were 2 cases of suicide and 2 motor vehicle accident deaths. Three other deaths were caused by accidents, one was in a person aged 78 who died from bronchopneumonia following a fracture of left femur, one was due to bronchopneumonia following a fracture of the skull, and the third was caused by cardiac failure due to a fracture of the right femur sustained in a fall.

Still-Births.

The Still-Birth Rate (per 1,000 live and still-births) was nil compared with 7.5 in 1965, and 15.4 for England and Wales. The actual number of still-births was nil compared with 1 the previous year.

Infant Deaths.

The Infant Mortality Rate was 7.6 compared with 15.14 in 1965, and 19.0 for England and Wales. The actual number of deaths was 1 compared with 2 the previous year. This was in a baby aged 6 days who was born in hospital. Death was due to prematurity and respiratory failure. The Health Visitor reported that this death may have been prevented had the mother attended more regularly for ante natal care. She was not in good health.

Maternal Mortality.

There were no deaths due to causes related to maternity and the rate is again Nil compared with 0.26 for England and Wales.

The total number of cases notified in the area was 49 compared with 68 in 1965.

Measles accounted for 46 cases compared with 61 last year. There were 2 cases of whooping cough compared with 1 the previous year.

One case of scarlet fever occurred in a youth who was working on a farm. As the milk was sent for pasteurisation, there was no chance of its spread via consumption of milk and no other cases were notified.

There were no cases of dysentery notified compared with 4 last year. One case was notified as one of suspected dysentery, but bacteriological examinations proved negative. Contacts to cases from another area were also followed up but had returned home the same day as the notification was received.

Two cases were investigated as they were notified as contacts to cases of salmonella which occurred in hospital. Bacteriological examination proved negative in both instances.

Early in the year, a case was notified as a case of suspected diphtheria, but again the results were negative, the patient having suffered from tonsillitis.

Tuberculosis.

No cases of tuberculosis were notified during 1966. Thirteen cases were removed from the register during the year, 10 of which were pulmonary and were cured and 3 were non-pulmonary cases, the patients having died, two of them from other causes.

PREVENTION OF INFECTIOUS PISEASES

Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and Tetanus.

Injections to protect against these three are given together and referred to as the "Triple" injection. Three doses are given at monthly intervals from the age of three months. A booster is given at the age of 18 months followed by boosters against diphtheria and tetanus at school entry and at the age of 10 years.

In addition 3 children were given the Quadrilin injection as their primary dose.

Poliomyelitis.

Oral vaccine (Sabin) is used in all County Clinics. Three doses of 3 drops on a lump of sugar or in syrup are given from the age of 6 months and a booster dose is given at the age of 5 years. Salk vaccine (by injection) was only given to two children.

Care of the Aged.

No cases of persons in need of care and attention and not giving themselves the necessary care and attention were brought to my notice during the year, therefore, it was not necessary for the Council to take action under Section 47 of the National Assistance Act.

No action was taken under this section during the year.

Darby and Joan Clubs.

At Llandyrnog there is a very active Club - the Ivy Club - which has 80 members who meet once a month. A Committee of 21 run the Club, each member looking after its own section and taking care of cases who are sick by collecting prescriptions etc. and seeing they have coal delivered during bad weather, especially if they live alone. An "outing" is arranged once a year and there is a Christmas party. The Club was founded from a Ladies Club in 1947, and in 1962, a mixed Club was formed and the members themselves chose the Club's name.

Llanfair D.C. This Club has about 30 members and is run by 8 members of the Womens Royal Voluntary Service, who help to look after the aged. The Club meets once a month and arrangements are made to bring people to the monthly meetings in four cars. Apart from an excellent social side, an annual outing and a Christmas party, birthdays of members are remembered and any member who is in hospital is visited. If members are given the tenancy of a new bungalow, advice is willingly given on modern equipment etc.

It appears there are about 25 Clubs functioning in the area, including one in Llandegla. In Pwllglas, the Evergreen Club is run by members of the Red Cross.

Meals on Wheels.

The question of forming a "Meals on Wheels" service has been considered further by the Council, but no action has been taken. It appears that in most villages the elderly citizens are catered for on the "good neighbour" basis, but the extent of this is not known.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES IN THE AREA.

Housing.

Forty pre-war dwellings and 413 post-war dwellings have been built by the Council, making a total of 453 dwellings.

Of the above total of post-war dwellings 8 one-bedroom bungalows and 24 two-bedroom bungalows were completed and occupied during the year. A further 3 dwellings are now in coarse of erection for the Council.

26 privately-owned houses were completed and occupied during 1966, an increase of fifteen on the previous year.

Regular inspections of the council houses were carried out, and with very few exceptions, they were found to be in a satisfactory condition.

Fifteen discretionary grant schemes were completed during the year, and since the Housing Acts 1949-1954 introduced the scheme, 239 houses have been improved at a cost to the Council of approximately £74,896.

The improvement of these properties has provided a standard of accommodation which compares very favourably with that of new duellings, and at an appreciably lower cost.

Fourteen standard grant schemes were completed during the year, and since the House Purchase and Housing Act, 1959, introduced the system to supplement the discretionary grant scheme, 48 houses have been improved at a cost to the Council of approximately £6,682. The changes made by Part III of the Housing Act, 1964, have greatly increased the attractiveness of the standard grant scheme, and created an added interest in the advantages of house improvement.

Schools.

Inspections of the schools in the district revealed that some

very satisfactory improvements were being effected to provide modern amenities.

School Canteens.

The standard of hygiene and cleanliness in all the school canteens was found to be generally high. The new canteen at Llanrhaeadr School was completed and brought into use during the year. Of the eighteen school canteens in the district, there are now only three which are not of good structural standard.

At Llanelidan the canteen is also used as a Village Hall kitchen. The building is in very poor structural condition, and a new canteen is required which will provide exclusively for the needs of the school.

In the remaining two canteens, situated at Graianrhyd and Derwen Schools, the main need is for additional space and improved ventilation. The existing working area in these two canteens is very restricted, and on account of lack of adequate ventilation the kitchens become very hot, and steam and cooking odours enter the classrooms.

Food.

The food premises in the area are mainly family concerns and only a few employ assistants. Conditions were generally found to be satisfactory as regards compliance with the Food Hygiene Regulations, and it is pleasing to report that no statutory action was found necessary.

Of the twenty-six samples submitted, only three received adverse reports. These samples were found to contain extraneous water to such an extent as to warrant legal proceedings being instituted against the seller. The defendant, who plea'ed guilty, was fined £1 together with £15. 4s. 6d. costs. In addition to the usual tests for quality, seven of the milk samples submitted were examined for the presence of anti-biotics with a negative result in each case. All other samples were certified by the Public Analyst to be genuine and free from all prohibited preservatives and colouring matter.

Poultry Processing Premises.

There are no poultry processing premises within the district.

Milk Supplies - Brucella Abortus.

The sampling of milk supplies to determine whether Brucella Abortus is present forms part of the functions of the Denbighshire County Council, who are the Food and Drugs Authority for the area.

The Council's Public Health Inspectors have been co-operating with the County Public Health Officer in procuring samples of milk from the various milk retailers throughout the district. Arrangements for the analysis of the milk samples and the keeping of records, etc. is undertaken by the Food and Drugs Authority. Action under Section 20 of the Milk and Dairies Regulations had to be taken in one case following notification of cases of Brucellosis in an adjoining Borough. results of sampling are as follows:-

Ice Cream.

There are no manufacturers of ice cream in the district.

49 premises are registered for the sale of pre-packed ice cream, and vehicles from adjoining districts retail ice cream in the area. Premises were periodically inspected and found to be satisfactory.

Slaughterhouses.

There are no licensed slaughterhouses within the district.

Reports on Water Samples taken during the year.

Samples of mains water are taken regularly from various parts of the district, and sent for bacteriological examination. In this way the Council are kept constantly informed of the standard of the supplies. All unsatisfactory reports are brought to the attention of the Water Board who have been very co-operative in their endeavours to improve the supplies.

106 samples of mains water were sent for bacteriological examination during the year, and were classified as follows:-

During the year, 20 samples of raw water from private supplies were taken, and sent for bacteriological examination. All unsatisfactory reports were followed up, and the owners advised as to the steps to be taken to bring about an improvement in their supplies.

Sewerage arrangements at Penstryt (Llandegla), Loggerheads-Maeshafn-Tafarn-y-gelyn, Pwllglas and Llanelidan are reaching an advanced stage in design, and it is hoped that these contracts will be commenced 1967 early 1968.

Extensions to the Sewage Treatment Works at Llanbedr, Llanfair and Rhewl-Gellifor are likely to be commenced in 1967-1968.

Sewerage & Sewage Treatment Schemes and Extensions at Derwen, Graianrhyd (Llanarmon T.I.), Nantglyn, Clawddnewydd, Llandyrnog and Llanferres will be proceeded with when the above-mentioned schemes have been completed or &re under construction. Details of flows and samples of effluent taken from the various Disposal Works are set out below:

PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

Laboratory Service.

The Public Health Laboratory at Conway carries out bacteriological examinations of water, food, etc. to detect any contamination. Milk is also examined bacteriologically and biologically for the presence of tubercle bacilli and brucella abortus.

Examination of throat swabs, blood, faeces, etc. are carried out to detect the presence of bacteria and viruses at Conway and at Rhyl Hospital.

Mental Health Service.

Orthopaedic Clinics.

A clinic is held at the Clinic, Middle Lane, Denbigh, on the first and third Wednesday morning in each month. Surgeons from Gobowen

Orthopaedic Hospital attend once a month.

Patients from the Rural District also attend Orthopaedic Clinics held weekly at Wrexham and Rhyl hospitals.

Venereal Diseases Clinics.

These clinics are held at H.M. Stanley Hospital, St. Asaph, on Tuesdays between 4.30 and 6.30 p.m. and at the War Memorial Hospital, Wrexham, on Mondays between 5 and 7 p.m. (males) and Vednesdays between 5 and 7 p.m. (females).

School Ophthalmic Clinics.

Sessions are held at the Clinic, Middle Lane, Denbigh, by appointment, and children also attend ophthalmic clinics held at Denbigh, St. Asaph, and Wrexham hospitals, and locally at Ruthin.

Child Guidance Clinics.

Clinics are held as follows:-

At Bod Difyr, Cefn Road, Colwyn Bay, on Wednesdays and Fridays.

At Gatefield Clinic, King's Mills Road, Wrexham, on Thursdays and by appointment on Fridays.

At Mercier House Clinic, Russell Road, Rhyl, every Monday.

Chest Clinics.

Patients attend Chest Clinics held every Wednesday morning at the Denbigh Infirmary and at the weekly clinics held at the Chest Clinic, Grosvenor Road, Wrexham, and at the Royal Alexandra Hospital, Rhyl.

Family Planning Clinics.

Clinics are held as follows:-
