Y mae'n frant i gael danfon yr arolwg tefynol atoch ar iechyd Ardal Wledig Rhuthun am y flwyddyn 1973.

Fe baratowyd yr ystadegau o ddogfennau a gadwyd gan yr Adran Iechyd, ac er nad ydynt yn hollol gywir, y maent yn ddigon agos i'n sicrhau fod safon cyffredinol iechyd wedi ei gynnal yn foddhaol yn ystod y flwyddyn ddiwethaf. Yn y gorffennol, bu'n arferol i aros am ystadegau'r Cofrestrydd Cyffredinol a oedd yn cynnwys manylion am enedigaethau a marwolaethau ymhlith babanod a mamau, ond fe fyddai aros am hyn wedi golygu gweithredu ar ôl ad-drefniad yr Awdurdod. Roeddem ni, eich syddogion, yn teimlo y dylid gwneud pob ymdrech i gyflwyno'r bennod olaf ar iechyd y ardal, cyn i'r llyfr recordiau gau am byth, Y mae'n wych o beth fod yr ystadegau am y flwyddyn olaf yn foddhaol, ac nad oes ynddynt urhyw o ostyngiad sydyn yn safonau iechyd, ond yn hytrach, pob arwydd o gynnydd amlwg.

Yn ystod 1973 fe ffurfiwyd cysgod Glyndwr, a'r canlyniad yw y bydd nifer o'ch swyddogion yn dod i ddiwedd eu gyrfan proffesiynol. Fe fydd Mr Rees yn dod i ben a'i ddyletswyddau ar 31 Mawrth 1974, ac yn encilio i'w ymddeoliad haeddiannol. Y mae wedi gwneud cyfraniad gwerthfawr i iechyd yr Ardal Wledig, ac y mae'r gwelliant graddol yn safonau iechyd yr amgylchedd yn deillio o'i ymdrechion diflino ef, i raddau helaeth iawn. Fe fydd Mr Wynne yn trawsnewid i'r Awdurdod newydd, ac wrth gwrs, fe fydd hynny yn sicrhau parhad mewn gwasanaeth a fydd o werth amhrisiadwy yn ystod blynyddoedd cynnar yr Awdurdod.

To the Chairman and Members of Ruthin Rural Council, Mr. Chairman and Councillors,

It is a privilege to submit the final report on the health of Ruthin Rural District for the year 1973.

The statistics have been prepared from records maintained by the Health Department and although they are not strictly accurate, they are sufficiently so, to be able to affirm that the general standard of health has been satisfactorily maintained during the past year. Previously, it was customary to await the Registrar General's returns which had taken into account the transfer in and out of deaths, births, infant and maternal mortality, but this would have meant waiting until after the dissolution of the Authority. We, your officers, felt that it was desirable to make every effort to include the last chapter on health before finally closing the record book. It is gratifying that the statistics for this final year are satisfactory and that there has been no sudden or serious deterioration in health standards, but rather that a steady progress has been maintained.

During 1973, the shadow Glyndwr took form and this has meant that various of your officers will end their professional careers. Mr. Rees will terminate his duties on 31st March, 1974 and retreat to a well-earned retirement. His has been a most valuable contribution to the health of the Rural District and undoubtedly the steady improvement in the standards of environmental health are in no small measure due to his indefatigable efforts. Mr. Wynne will transfer to the new Authority and thus ensure that continuity in service which unquestionably will be invaluable during the early formative years.

Dr. Lynn Williams and I wish to record our pleasure in having been allowed to serve Ruthin District Council and also our appreciation for the constant co-operation of all the officers. We also thank the members for their constant courtesy, help and guidance without which so much less would have been achieved. We hope that during the four years we have been allowed to serve Ruthin Rural District Council, the standard of the health services has been maintained and that this will form firm foundations for continued progress.

The above table has been compiled from information available at the time of writing and this is not strictly comparable with figures from previous years as the latter have in the past been collected by the Registrar General. However, the figures show that ischaemic heart disease is by far the most important cause of death accounting for 42 deaths. The second most important cause of death was cerebrovascular disease which caused 25 deaths. Cancer caused a total of 17 deaths.

It is gratifying to record that very few deaths occurred amongst the young. There were no deaths under 25 years of age, only 2 deaths in the 25/44 year age groups both due to violence. At the other end of the age groups, 64 deaths occurred in residents 75 years and over and 28deaths in the 65/74 year age group thus 82% of the total deaths occurred in persons over 65 years of age.

The most common notifiable disease was again measles with 13 notified cases. There was no large outbreak of measles as occurred in 1972 but sporadic cases and small outbreaks occurred throughout the year.

An isolated case of dysentery due to shigella sonnei occurred in a school age child. No other cases were notified.

One case of salmonella food poisoning was detected by routine sweeping of food handlers. The family were investigated but no further cases detected.

A case of meningococcal meningitis occurred in a young child in November. There has been a considerable increase in the incidence of this serious disease throughout the country over the past two years and several outbreaks with some fatalities have occurred. The contacts in this case were given prophylactic treatment. No further cases were reported in the area.

#### TUBERCULOSIS

2 new cases, 1 male pulmonary and 1 female pulmonary, illustrates the fact that this disease which was such a scourge in the past is still with us and continued vigilance is essential.

## ANTHRAX

No human or animal cases of anthrax were notified during the year.

## BRUCELLOSIS

No confirmed human cases were reported during the year as was the same in 1972. Only one herd was found to be infected during the year and the infection was restricted to 2 cows.

It is gratifying to report the reduction in the incidence of this disease, but it is as yet too early to be complacent and until this disease is completely eradicated from cattle the risk of human infection remains, particularly for thosewhose work brings them into close contact with cattle.

Those found to be positive were followed up by chest x-ray examination at the nearest chest clinic. Members of the family were also investigated. The 4 positive reactors demonstrate the continuing presence of tubercle or closely related bacilli in the environment.

#### SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES IN THE AREA

#### HOUSING

Forty pre-war dwellings and 460 post-war dwellings have been built by the Council, making a total of 500 dwellings. No new Council dwellings were completed during the year, but a start has been made on the erection of 14 houses, and 23 bungalows.

34 privately owned houses were completed and occupied since 1972, an increase of 16 on the previous year.

36 discretionary grant schemes were completed during the year, Since the Housing Acts, 1949 - 1954 introduced the scheme, 376 houses have been improved at a cost to the Council of approximately £191,923.00.

During the year 11 standard grants schemes were completed. Since the House Purchase and Housing Act, 1959, introduced the system to supplement the discretionary grant scheme, 128 houses have been improved, at a cost to the Council of approximately £27,594.00.

## SCHOOLS

The school canteens in the district were being well maintained, and every effort is being made by the staffs to comply with the Food Hygiene Regulations. All staff are medically screened annually to ensure freedom from certain transmissible diseases.

## FOODS

Number of Food Premises in the area: 91

The food premises in the area are mainly family concerns and only a few employ assistants. Regular inspections revealed that conditions were generally satisfactory as regards compliance with the Food Hygiene Regulations and no statutory action was found necessary.

## REPORTS OF WATER SAMPLES TAKEN DURING THE YEAR

Samples of mains water are taken regularly from various parts of the district, and sent for bacteriological examination to the Public Health Laboratory, at Conway. In this way the Council are kept constantly informed on the standard of the supplies.

All unsatisfactory reports are brought to the attention of the Water Board, who have been very co-operative in their endeavours to improve the supplies.

117 samples of mains water were sent for bacteriological examination during the year, and were classified as follows:-

#### NEW SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL SCHEMES

## PWLLGLAS SCHEME

The new sewage disposal plant is now operational and produces a satisfactory effluent. There are a few minor items to be carried out by the Contractor in order to complete the whole scheme.

#### RHEWL AND GELLIFOR SCHEME AND LLANFAIR D.C. SCHEME

These newly extended sewage disposal plants are operating satisfactorily and are producing satisfactory effluents.

# LLANDYRNOG SCHEME (INCLUDING LLANRHAEADR)

A compulsory Purchase Order has been confirmed for the acquisition of the land necessary to extend the present sewage disposal works. It is hoped to invite Tenders for carrying out the work in the early Summer of 1974.

## TAFARN-Y-GELYN, MAESHAFN, LOGGERHEADS ETC., SCHEME

Progress on this Scheme is satisfactory and on schedule, the contract is due for completion in mid-February, 1974.

## LLANELIDAN SCHEME

The sewage disposal plant and the new sewers have been installed by direct labour. It is hoped to divert the flow of sewage from the village into the new plant shortly and to demolish the old sewage works.

## DERWEN SCHEME

A new scheme has been prepared providing for a new sewage disposal plant. It is hoped to invite Tenders by April, 1974.

# NANTGLYN SCHEME

A new scheme has been prepared, and delivery of the new disposal plant is expected from the manufacturers in March, 1974. It is hoped to invite Tenders for carrying out the work early in 1974.

## CLAWDDNEWYDD SCHEME

The work of installing the new sewage disposal plant has been completed and is ready for commissioning, as soon as the Contractor is in a position to hand over the new works.

#### GENERAL

The remaining sewage treatment plants and sewers are functioning satisfactorily, and an efficient organisation is ready to be handed over to the new Glyndwr District Council or the Regional Water Authority as the case may be, on the 1st April, 1974. One or two of the Housing Act Septic tank units are in need of replacement, and consideration should be given to this by the appropriate Authority in the not too distant future.

# CLOSET ACCOMMODATION

Forty two conversions from privies and pail closets to water closets were carried out during the year.

#### RODENT CONTROL

The Council has a rodent control service in operation and employs a part-time Rodent Operator, who carries out the practical work of destruction of rats and mice, under the supervision of the Public Health Inspector.

The collection of refuse in the District is undertaken mainly on a fortnightly basis except for a few commercial premises, where a weekly collection takes place. Three refuse vehicles, each with a crew of two operatives, are employed on this work.

## PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA

#### LABORATORY SERVICES

The Public Health Laboratory at Conway carries out bacteriological examinations of water, food, etc., to detect any contamination. Milk is also examined bacteriologically and biologically for the presence of tubercle bacilli and brucella abortus.

Examination of throat swabs, blood, faeces etc., are carried out to detect the presence of bacteria and viruses at Conway Public Health Laboratory and specimens have also been accepted at Rhyl Hospital Laboratory.

The Ruthin F.P.A. Clinic now holds only one session per month on the 4th Thursday evening from 7.00 p.m. to 8.30 p.m.

There were 40 new patients during 1973, of these, 21 were referred to the clinic by friends, 10 by the Family Doctor, 6 F.P.A. Transfers, 2 were officially referred, and 1 from other sources.

11 patients were within the age group 25/29, 10 with 20/24 years, 9 within 30/34 years, 5 were over 34 years, and 5 were under 20 years.

17 patients had had 2 pregnancies, 16 had had no pregnancies, 5 had 1 pregnancy, 1 had had 4 pregnancies and 1 had had 3 pregnancies.

The Denbigh F.P.A.Clinic which commenced in June, 1973, held one session per month on the 1st Tuesday between 2.00 p.m. - 3.00 p.m.

When the clinic first commenced, 16 females availed themselves of the services.

## MARRIAGE GUIDANCE CLINIC

The Marriage Guidance Clinic holds one session per week at Ruthin Clinic on a Friday afternoon by appointment only, and one session per week at Denbigh Clinic on a Monday, by appointment only.
