The Death Rate is higher than that for the County of Pembroke or for the whole Country. More than half the deaths, 55%, were of persons over the age of 70 years, and of these 52% were over 80 years of age.

The Infant Mortality Rate shows a fall, but is still above the rate for the whole Country. There were two deaths of infants under 1 year, both due to prematurity.



NOTIFICATIONS OF INFECTIOUS DISEASES

The only notifications received during the year were of twelve cases of Whooping Cough.

TUBERCULOSIS

Six cases of respiratory tuberculosis were notified, of which four were admitted to hospital.

The Mobile Unit of the Mass Radiography Service visited the County in the Autumn, and spent three days in Tenby.

LOCAL HEALTH SERVICES

VACCINATION

Free vaccination against Smallpox is offered to all babies and any other persons for whom it may be advisable. This is carried out by the local doctors, who are paid by the County Council for notification of either successful vaccination or failure after the second attempt. Records were received of 13 primary and 12 secondary vaccinations during the year.

IMMUNISATION

This is also carried out by the local practitioners, who are paid by the County Council on receipt by your Medical Officer of the record cards. Record cards were received of the immunisation of 65 children, and of 129 reinforcing injections.

Other arrangements for Local Health Services are carried out by the County Council.

WATER

Water samples were taken monthly during the year, and with the exception of one, were all satisfactory.

The water supplied was solely from the Precelly Water Board, the Pumping Station and Ritec supply being used only as a standby source.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

An extensive length of the Eastern Outfall trunk sewer in Castle Square was re-laid, converting the existing defective brick culvert into a 12" cast iron main.

Considerable work of a repair nature was carried out in the branch sewer in Crackwell Street, where defects occurred in the old brick arch.

Beaches

Fewer complaints of beach fouling were received, and no evidence was collected of beach fouling by sewage outfalls. The particularly adverse weather experienced generally during the season might have had an effect of reducing the number of visitors using the beaches.

REFUSAL DISPOSAL

The views of the County Planning Committee made the use of the field opposite the existing refuse tip adjoining the main Tenby/Penally road impossible. Inspection of the disused Black Rock Quarry revealed an ideal site for refuse disposal by controlled tipping, but preliminary approaches to the owner of this land were not successful.

HOUSING

Tenders for the erection of 107 dwelling units and site works at the proposed Marsh Road Housing Estate were prepared, and the Council considered the tenders received.

FOOD

The Council will remember that the previous Sanitary Inspectors have reported on the failure of most premises in which meals are prepared and cooked, to reach the minimum standard of cleanliness required. Though most premises still fall short of the desired standard, improvements have been made to this end.
