Housing

During 1962 good progress has been made to increase

Infectious disease

Apart from food poisoning little anxiety has been caused  
by infectious disease during recent years, but the outbreaks of  
smallpox which occurred during 1962 make one realise how imp-  
ortant it is that all infants are vaccinated so that some defin-  
ite immunity exists in the community as a whole.

Again I should like to emphasize how important a part

Hygiene regulations and conditions have improved in the shops,  
boarding houses and hotels.

The general death rate remains higher than that for the County and for the country as a whole. Of the 6 deaths from cancer, 2 were due to cancer of the lung. Heart disease again accounted for the highest number of deaths from any one cause it having caused 27 of the 67 deaths. Approximately 46.3% of the total number of deaths occurred in persons aged over 70 years and of these, 54.8% occurred in persons aged over 80 years.

## TUBERCULOSIS

There were no deaths from tuberculosis this year but 4 new cases of respiratory tuberculosis were notified. One was an old relapsed case which was re-notified and two were transferred from other areas.

## PREVENTION OF TUBERCULOSIS

B.C.G. Vaccination B.C.G. Vaccination of contacts and school leavers continues to be carried out in the Borough. Clinic sessions are held at Warren Street Clinic for this purpose and the schools are also visited. During 1962, 9 contacts and 59 school leavers, (i.e. pupils aged thirteen years and over) were vaccinated. The Chest Physician, Dr. Llewelyn Davies, also vaccinates contacts at the Chest Clinic.

## VACCINATION AGAINST POLIOMYELITIS

During 1962, the County Health Authority changed over from using the Salk vaccine to the Sabin vaccine, which is given orally. This method has been found to be effective and is much appreciated by patients and their parents.

There were no deaths from tuberculosis this year but a few cases of respiratory tuberculosis were notified. One case on the island was noted as a notified case and was considered from that year.

During 1951, the District Officer reported one notified case of the notified cases in 1951. The notified cases are as follows:-

## NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE ACT, 1946.

### LOCAL HEALTH SERVICES

Vaccination Records were received this year of 740 primary and 1,107 re-vaccinations against smallpox.

Immunisation Records were received of 69 complete immunisations and 23 reinforcing injections against diphtheria, and also of 63 complete immunisations against whooping cough.

Both vaccination against smallpox and immunisation against diphtheria and whooping cough are carried out at the Clinic and also by the local practitioners, who are paid by the County Council for records received each quarter by your Medical Officer.

### Ambulance Service

This is the responsibility of the County Council, which now has eight ambulances in the County and an arrangement for the provision of cars for "sitting cases". The Tenby Ambulances are operated on a garage arrangement basis by Jeremy's Garages Limited and the British Red Cross Society is most helpful in providing voluntary attendants.

The opening of the South Pembrokeshire Hospital at Pembroke Dock necessitated the establishment of an additional ambulance in this area to deal with the increasing number of patients being treated there. The great increase in the number of patients from the south of the County now receiving treatment at the West Wales General Hospital, Glangwili has also aggravated the situation.

The second ambulance, which has been in operation since the 1st of March, 1962, and is also based in Tenby, deals with patients in this area while the first travels between Tenby and the South Pembrokeshire Hospital. This vehicle regularly makes two journeys a day and is away all day, so that the Tenby district with its large influx of visitors during the summer months would be unprovided with a service had the new ambulance not been introduced.

During 1962 Tenby ambulance No.1 dealt with 2,337 patients, 374 of whom were stretcher cases and 1,963 sitting cases. The total number of miles travelled was 23,167 in 552 journeys, an average of 9.9 miles per patient. Ambulance No. 2 dealt with 581 patients; 131 stretcher cases and



450 sitting cases. It travelled 7,105 miles in 173 journeys, a total of 42.2 miles per patient.

### New Houses

Work commenced during the year on the construction of 36 two bedroom flats at Churchill Close and Newell Hill by the Corporation, to rehouse tenants of 50 Arcon type prefabricated bungalows at Heywood Court. A feature of these flats is that space heating is by gas.

Plans are well advanced for the construction of a further 40 flats at the Heywood Court site.

The development on the Lady Park Estate continued during the period under review and by the end of the year 6 houses and 11 bungalows had been erected on the site.

GENERAL

The Corporation has during the year on the construction of a new building at Church Hill Street and Newell Hill by the Corporation, the amount of 50,000 was paid for the same.

## REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

As in previous years the amount of refuse to be collected showed a further increase in volume and the service was further stressed by the addition of the Lady Park and Hill Park Estates.

From October a reduced service to thrice weekly was operated in the town and this resulted in a small financial saving over the same period last year.

Now that the Council have adopted a policy of central heating in the flats now under construction, it follows that there will be an increase in the volume of refuse from these dwellings in the coming year.

The field at Clickett's Lane, used continuously as a tipping site since 1955, has now been filled and tipping was commenced on the adjoining field at the end of the year.

Every effort was made to introduce the paper sack system of refuse storage in hotels and cafes, but the response was so poor that the idea had to be abandoned for the time being. The scheme is an excellent one, especially on premises where there is a large quantity of waste food in the refuse, and there are obvious advantages, both from the aesthetic and public health viewpoints. It is hoped that these factors will over-ride the objection that the cost is too high.

## RODENT CONTROL

One part-time operator is employed on this work, under my general direction. There was an increase in the number of complaints this year but all were speedily dealt with. The sewers received two treatments and the refuse disposal site four. The following table shows the number of treatments carried out during the period under review:-

52 inspections were made during the year of hotel and restaurant kitchens. The majority were maintaining a fairly high standard but it was necessary to issue three warnings where conditions were unsatisfactory.

As is common in most old towns many catering establishments in the town centre are small and on congested sites, especially lacking in kitchen space, yard space and secondary access.

Fortunately, in new establishments consultation between the developer and the Department has resulted in the satisfactory provision of equipment and fittings and it has been possible to emphasise important points relating to hygiene from the outset.

However, the Local Authority has no power to refuse to allow a food business to be commenced in premises which

are considered to be unsuitable for the purpose; we can only enforce the Food Hygiene Regulations, which doesn't solve the problem of how to conduct a business in a hygienic manner on premises which are inadequate for the trade carried on.

It is not uncommon to see the coffee bar or milk bar type of establishment, catering for the youth of the community, run by persons of limited experience of the catering trade. These businesses commence by serving beverages and snacks and therefore do not require properly equipped kitchens. After a while, however, light meals involving the preparation and cooking of food are introduced, and it is not long before food is being prepared under extremely congested and unsatisfactory conditions. The need for legislation to require the registration of catering establishments is long overdue, giving Local Authorities the power to refuse or withdraw registration where premises are unsuitable for the purpose.

A new building comprising toilets, car park attendant's office and bus shelter is being constructed in the Municipal Car Park and will be completed in 1963.

There is an increasing need for toilet facilities adjacent to the South Beach, especially now that the Jubilee Gardens conveniences have been demolished following condemnation.

Means of escape in case of fire.

Since a general survey of hotels and boarding houses was commenced in 1961, 64 premises have been surveyed under the above Section.

It is gratifying to report that work has been carried out in 21 premises to satisfy the requirements of the Act and it would appear that proprietors are now paying much more attention to this very important question. It is hoped that the general survey will be completed during 1963 and all premises subject to their regulations will have received reports and recommendations.
