Infant Deaths

Two deaths of infants aged under 1 year occurred during the year and the cause of death in both cases was congenital malformations. One infant died at the age of 15 minutes and the other at 24 hours. The infant mortality rate this year is higher than the rate for the County and for the country as a whole.

Deaths (General)

The general death rate is again a little higher than the rate for the County and for the country as a whole. Heart disease accounted for 23 of the 71 deaths. Only one of the 12 deaths from malignant disease was due to cancer of the lung. Approximately 57.7% of the total number of deaths occurred in persons aged over 70 years, and approximately 29.5% in persons aged over 80 years.

TUBERCULOSIS

No deaths from tuberculosis occurred this year but three new cases were notified. Two were cases of pulmonary tuberculosis, a girl aged 15 and a man aged 48, and the third was a case of tuberculosis of the genito-urinary tract in a woman aged 61.

PREVENTION OF TUBERCULOSIS

B.C.G. Vaccination B.C.G. Vaccination of contacts and school leavers continues to be carried out in the Borough. Clinic sessions are held at the Clinic, Warren Street, for this purpose and the schools are also visited. During the year 1964, 104 school leavers (i.e. pupils aged thirteen years and over) were skin tested and 94 vaccinated, and 14 contacts were skin tested and 12 vaccinated. Dr. D. Llewelyn Davies, the Chest Physician, also vaccinates contacts at the Chest Clinic.

MASS RADIOGRAPHY

The Mobile Unit of the Mass Radiography Service again visited the town during December and carried out a survey amongst the general population. The attendance was higher than it has been for the past two years and the results are as follows:-

Vaccination of contacts and school leavers continued to be carried out in the Borough Clinic sessions and held at the Clinic, Warren Street, for this purpose and the schools are also visited, during the year 1954, 109 school leavers (i.e. pupils aged thirteen years and over) were skin tested and 94 vaccinated, and 15 contacts were skin tested and 12 vaccinated. Mr. D. Llewellyn Davies, the Chest Physician, also vaccinated contacts at the Chest Clinic.

The County Council is responsible for the running of the Ambulance Service, and in addition to the eight ambulances based at various points in the County, it also has an arrangement for the provision of cars for "sitting cases". The Tandy ambulances are operated on

During the year 1964 Tenby Ambulance No.1 dealt with 3,154 patients, 424 of whom were stretcher cases and 2,730 sitting cases. The total number of miles travelled by this vehicle was 29,324 - an average of 9.29 miles for each patient.

Ambulance No.2 dealt with 343 patients, 86 of whom were stretcher cases and 257 sitting cases. It travelled a total of 4,071 miles, an average of 11.87 miles per patient.

Re-housing

60 families were re-housed by the Corporation during the year and 13 names were added to the register during the period.

At the end of 1964 the number of applicants on the Council's housing list was 42. A further 64 require Old People's Bungalows.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

The demolition of the 50 Arson type pre-fabricated bungalows was completed during the year and the two bedroom flats were erected and occupied. A further 11 flats and 27 one bedroom bungalows were commenced at the Heywood Court site and will be completed by the summer of 1965. 19 dwellings were erected by private enterprise during the year.

Re-housing

60 families were re-housed by the Corporation during the year and 13 names were added to the register during the period. At the end of 1964 the number of applicants on the Council's housing list was 22. A further 24 require Old People's Bungalows.

HEALTH COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

However, to maintain the efficiency of service a considerable amount of overtime had to be worked, and it is inevitable that on the completion of the private housing projects now planned

for the Narberth Road area it will be necessary to man two vehicles for the whole period of twelve months.

The disposal of refuse by controlled tipping continued on the Clickett's Lane site and over five acres have now been re-claimed.
