
Infectious Diseases.

Vaccination of contacts and school children, (13 years and over) continued during the year, sessions being held at School and at the Clinic. 146 school children were skin tested and 144 of these were vaccinated; 5 contacts were skin tested and all of these required vaccination. Dr. D.Llewelyn Davies, the Chest Physician, also vaccinates contacts at his Chest Clinic.

MASS RADIOGRAPHY.

The annual visit of the Mobile Unit of the Mass Radiography Service took place in December, when a total of 286 persons (general population volunteers) availed themselves of this service. This is a slightly higher attendance than last year and the results are as follows :-

NOTIFICATION OF INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

There were 27 cases of infectious disease notified during the year; 24 of these were of Measles and the remaining 3 were of Scarlet Fever.

NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE ACT 1946.

Local Health Services: Vaccination against Smallpox and Poliomyelitis and immunisation against Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and Tetanus continues to be carried out at The Clinic. Children entering school are given 'Booster' doses at School sessions.

From 1st April 1967, all immunisation and vaccination records of work carried out by general practitioners, have to be sent direct to the Executive Council for payment, instead of to your Medical Officer of Health as before. These figures are, therefore, only available annually and are added to the Clinic figures for the year. Details which follow are total figures for the County of Pembroke for the year 1967 :-

AMBULANCE SERVICE.

The County Council is responsible for the running of this service and there are ten ambulances based at various points throughout the county - two at Tenby.

Tenby No. 1 Ambulance conveyed a total of 1,841 sitting cases and 344 stretcher cases during the year, travelling 22,486 miles in all; an average of 10.2 miles per patient.

I commenced my duties as your Public Health Inspector and Housing Officer on the 1st August, 1967. To accurately report on the environmental Public Health of this Borough, having only had a period of five months in which to assess the position would be, to say the least, presumptuous. However, the five months has shown me that there is room for improvement in all aspects of the work appertaining to my duties.

To do this will mean propogation of food hygiene education and perhaps it may be necessary to prosecute traders who continue to practice poor food hygiene and undoubtedly cause a serious risk to the holiday name of Tenby.

REFUSE DISPOSAL.

The refuse disposal of the town is second to none in South Wales as the service entails an almost daily collection from the town's premises and twice weekly in the surrounding area. However, it is obvious that the question of fly nuisance must be solved before the coming of the next summer season.

My plan is to institute a "tip and cover policy" which, to my mind, is the only answer in the fight against this fly nuisance. The use of insecticides is a second line of defence and can only be relied upon in certain cases to control flies harbouring in newly tipped refuse. To discharge this plan satisfactorily it is essential to engage an earth moving vehicle and be provided with sufficient covering material to satisfactorily bury the town's refuse.

RODENT CONTROL.

The rodent population of the town is in my opinion small and can be controlled by a part time Rodent Operative working one day a week.

The sewers are treated twice annually and the refuse tip itself approximately every month.

It is my policy to use only a Warfarin type of rodenticide as we find that this poison serves to destroy rats satisfactorily and no evidence of immunity has shown itself.
