ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR 1970.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the
Borough of Tenby

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting to you the Annual Report on the health of the Borough during 1970.

HOUSING.

Work had commenced on the building of 27 council houses at Tudor Way by the end of the year and in addition a considerable number of private dwellings were completed. However, there still remains a large number of persons awaiting council accommodation in the Borough, with a continued need to consider the provision of accommodation suitable for the elderly in the area. On the whole, the standard of all housing is good.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

During the year, although the number of notifiable diseases were few, there was an increase in the number of cases of measles, from 5 in 1969 to 23 in 1970, despite the fact that there is now a vaccine available for all children over 1 year of age. In the Spring, chicken-pox was prevalent in the Borough and following this a considerable number of cases of shingles were reported by the family doctors. In common with the whole of the country, there was an increased incidence of scabies in 1970 and, to a smaller extent, an increase in the number of V.D. cases, particularly during the summer season.

Considering the large number of holiday visitors to the town, only a small number of cases of "tourist diarrhoea" came to my attention this year.

REFUSE DISPOSAL.

This year, considerable attention was given to the problem of a site for a proposed new refuse tip for Tenby and a meeting of adjoining interested local authorities was held in July, to consider a combined refuse disposal scheme for the whole area. However, no definite decision had been made by the end of the year, but negotiations were proceeding with the Narberth Rural District Council and it was hoped that the matter would be resolved early in 1971.

WATER SAFETY.

One young university student was drowned at the South Beach in June; this was a most regrettable incident but unfortunately only one of many such tragedies which occur each year in coastal areas. It was pleasing to learn of the progress made by the Tenby Swimming Association in providing instruction on water safety on both beaches during the season, and also the success of the Tenby and District Swimming Pool Association in their fund raising efforts for the proposed new indoor pool for the area.

proposed new indoor pool for the area.



TUBERCULOSIS

Once again, I am pleased to report that there were no deaths from tuberculosis, nor were any new cases of the disease notified to us during the year.

Prevention of Tuberculosis.

B.C.G. vaccination was carried out as usual during the autumn term at Greenhill School (13-year old children and over) and a total of 145 pupils were vaccinated.

In the County of Pembrokeshire during the year, 1,048 school-children were vaccinated and also 50 contacts. Dr. D. Llewelyn Davies, the Chest Physician, continues to vaccinate contacts at the Chest Clinic.

MASS RADIOGRAPHY.

A survey amongst the general population of Tenby was carried out by the Mobile Unit of the Mass Radiography Service in January 1970. Out of a total of 712 persons examined (315 males and 397 females) 26 were found to have some abnormality of chest and 9 of these were referred for further investigations.

NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE ACT, 1946.

Local Health Services.

Vaccinations and immunisations were carried out regularly at the Infant Welfare Clinic and also at school sessions. Vaccination against Rubella (German Measles) was introduced at the end of the summer and initially 13-year old girls were offered protection - the acceptance rate by parents was almost 100%. It is hoped to continue school sessions annually, offering this form of vaccination to all girls aged between 11 and 14 years.

No increase in the number of dwellings inspected in 1970 compared with 1969. The reason for this is that the provisions of the Housing Act 1969 were applied. However, I feel that the full impact of the Housing Act of the Government has not yet been realised. There is no doubt in my mind that the Government fully intend to improve the existing stock of old houses throughout the country, in order to meet the demand for more comfortable dwellings and to provide a better standard of living for the people. It is my personal belief that the Grants will again be substantially reduced in an effort to financially stimulate the householder and home owner of the Country.

General Grant follow a programme of encouraging home improvements within the Borough area by Grant payments made in the district within the Act. A survey has shown that within the Borough there are 70 units of dwellings without standard amenities (hot-water under the Housing Act 1969). I sincerely hope that this will be greatly decreased if not cancelled out in the next few years aided by financial assistance offered by the Housing Act 1969.

FOOD HYGIENE REGULATIONS.

The general standard of food hygiene as practised in the Town by shops, hotels and guest houses continues to improve.

Unfortunately, it was necessary to institute legal proceedings against one of our Cafes in the Town. This resulted in a fine being imposed on the occupier of £200. This I hope will illustrate to all businesses engaged in the food industry that compliance with good food practise is essential in any town or area where its livelihood is based on the holiday trade, and that any person jeopardising the good name of this Town as a first class holiday centre, must be prepared to bear the consequences.

I am pleased to report that other than this establishment, I received few complaints during the year either regarding food or food premises. However, a constant watch is kept on all food establishments within the Borough.
