

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR 1970.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Tenby

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting to you the Annual Report on the health of the Borough during 1970.

HOUSING.

Work had commenced on the building of 27 council houses at Tudor Way by the end of the year and in addition a considerable number of private dwellings were completed. However, there still remains a large number of persons awaiting council accommodation in the Borough, with a continued need to consider the provision of accommodation suitable for the elderly in the area. On the whole, the standard of all housing is good.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

During the year, although the number of notifiable diseases were few, there was an increase in the number of cases of measles, from 5 in 1969 to 23 in 1970, despite the fact that there is now a vaccine available for all children over 1 year of age. In the Spring, chicken-pox was prevalent in the Borough and following this a considerable number of cases of shingles were reported by the family doctors. In common with the whole of the country, there was an increased incidence of scabies in 1970 and, to a smaller extent, an increase in the number of V.D. cases, particularly during the summer season.

Considering the large number of holiday visitors to the town, only a small number of cases of "tourist diarrhoea" cane to my attention this year.

REFUSE DISPOSAL.

This year, considerable attention was given to the problem of a site for a proposed new refuse tip for Tenby and a meeting of adjoining interested local authorities was held in July, to consider a combined refuse disposal scheme for the whole area. However, no definite decision had been made by the end of the year, but negotiations were proceeding with the Narberth Rural District Council and it was hoped that the matter would be resolved early in 1971.

WATER SAFETY.

One young university student was drowned at the South Beach in June; this was a nost regrettable incident but unfortunately only one of many such tragedies which occur each year in coastal areas. It was pleasing to learn of the progress made by the Tenby Swimming Association in providing instruction on water safety on both beaches during the season, and also the success of the Tenby and District Swimming Pool Association in their fund raising efforts for the proposed new indoor pool for the area.

DEATHS. (General)

There is a slight drop in the general death rate for the Borough this year, but it remains higher than both the national and county rates. 14 of the total deaths were due to malignant disease - 3 due to cancer of the lung, and heart disease accounted for 20 deaths.

Approximately 26% of the deaths occurred in persons aged between 70 and 80 years and approximately 33% in persons over 80 years of age.

TUBBROULOSIB.

Once again, I am pleased to report that there were no deaths from tuborculosis, nor work any new cases of the disease notified to ne during the year.

Prevention of Tuberculosis,

B.C.G. vaccination was carried out as usual during the autumn term at Greenhill School (13-year old children and over) and a total of 145 pupils were vaccinated.

In the County of Pembrokeshire during the year, 1,048 school-children were vaccinated and also 50 contacts. Dr. D. Llewelyn Davies, the Chest Physician, continues to vaccinate contacts at the Chest Clinic.

MASS RADIOGRAPHY.

A survey amongst the general population of Tenby was carried out by the Mobile Unit of the Mass Radiography Service in January 1970. Out of a total of 712 persons examined (315 males and 397 females) 26 were found to have some abnormality of chest and 9 of these were referred for further investigations.

NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE ACT, 1946.

Local Health Services.

Vaccinations and immunisations were carried out regularly at the Infant Welfare Clinic and also at school sessions. Vaccination against Rubella (German Measles) was introduced at the end of the summer and initially 13-year old girls were offered protection - the acceptance rate by parents was almost 100%. It is hoped to continue school sessions annually, offering this form of vaccination to all girls aged between 11 and 14 years.

One house was found unfit for human habitation which was made subject to a Closing Order in lieu of demolition due to its position in relation to the neighbouring houses.

The main complaints received from the occupiers of private houses and business houses was in the main concerning drainage. These matters were dealt with as they arose and no formal action was taken.

HOUSE IMPROVEMENT GRANTS.

No increase in the Applications for a Grant under the terms of the new provisions of the Housing Act 1969 were received. However, I feel that the full impact of the Grant policy of the Government has not as yet been realised. There is no doubt in my mind that the Government fully mean to improve the existing stock of old houses throughout the country, in order to ease the burden of mass substandard dwellings coming about within the next decade. It is my personal belief that the Grants will again be financially raised in an effort to financially stimulate the householders and house owners of the Country.

Council must follow a programme of encouraging house improvements within the Borough area by Grant payments made in its discretion within the Act. A survey has shown that within the Borough there are 70 units of accommodation without standard amenities laid down under the Housing Act 1969. I sincerely hope that this will be greatly decreased if not cancelled out in the next few years aided by financial assistance offered by the Housing Act 1969.

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T CONTROL.

As is shown by the following table, an increase in rodent infestation was reported to my department during the year. These figures in no way show that the rodent population in the Town has increased to any appreciable degree. In fact, I am pleased to report that our rodent problem is, in my mind, very small.

The policy to use only Warfarin anti-coagulant poison continues with good result and I have found no evidence of rodent immunity to this type of treatment.

The sewers of the Town were treated during the year.

Again, the refuse tip gave no undue problem and can be described under the classification of minimal infestation. Here again, we used only Warfarin type poisons.

CARAVAN SITES AND CONTROL OF DEVELOPMENT ACT 1960.

The control of touring caravans entering the County has shown itself to be the problem that was expected a year or so ago. There is no doubt that the introduction of Information Centres, such as exists at Begelly, has aided in the administration of the above Act, as well as provide a service to the general holidaying public.

The five licensed caravan sites were inspected by me regularly and I am pleased to report that the general standards of Public Realth amenity were found to be very good. The site operators appear to improve their site conditions from year to year, hence bringing about a better environment for the caravan holiday and improving Public Health in general. The standard of caravan units was found to be very good in their structure and generally well equipped and kept in a clean state.
